Miss Gibbs is a graduate of the Vt. State Normal School and has given a good year's service here. The drill in some of the classes was equal to any in town. The teacher's illness cut the winter term short two weeks. During the year 14 scholars have come from Mason and 7 from Greenville. Mason has paid 60 per cent. of the cost of maintaining the school and Greenville 40 per cent.

The whole number of pupils registered in town during the year is 208, the average number belonging to the schools at any one time is 140 with an average daily attendance of 125. All of the schools during the year have been in charge of experienced teachers who have been faithful in their work. Some of these teachers will remain with us another year if we can make their pay equal to what they can get in similar schools elsewhere. Other teachers of equal or greater experience can be had to fill vacancies only by making our pay roll fully up to that of our neighbors. We shall very soon have to face the question of increased wages in some or all of our schools or select a grade of teachers to fit the grade of our salaries.

Patrons of our public schools and other citizens ought to visit the school room oftener and observe the work that is being done. Aside from the visits made by the school board and members of their families and visits made by young people, there have been but 76 visits made by citizens of this town in a total of 152 weeks of school with 208 different scholars.

The east school house is in fair repair but may need some new windows before long. The south school house is hardly worth extensive alteration but is in need of a new black board and some minor repairs. The village school house needs a couple of coats of paint, some new black boards and some new flooring in the wood shed. Many of the desk books are worn out and will have to be replaced.
