TRUSTEE'S REPORT.

The Library has been open for the exchange of books, according to its rules, every Saturday during the year. Miss Cora B. Robbins was continued in office as librarian until her resignation, Sept. 5th. Miss Hattie L. Robbins was then employed until the opening of the Reading Room with magazines and papers for the further accommodation of the public. This was done Oct. 27th and its advantages have been continued every secular evening since, with few exceptions, the whole under the charge of Mr. Charles T. Wheeler.

The action of the town in accepting the provisions of the act concerning Free Public Libraries was promptly reported to the State Board of Library Commissioners. Application was duly made for the State grant of books and all the requisite forms complied with. We have hoped that under a liberal construction of the statute our request might receive favorable response, and we have still reason for cherishing such hope. On this

account the purchase of new books has been delayed, but a list of desirable works has been carefully prepared and valuable additions may soon be expected.

The seventy-seven volumes sent away for rebinding near the close of last year were early in the season returned to their places, and two new books have been

presented by Mr. James B. Fry.

The trustees wish to express gratitude to their fellow citizens for such generous answer to their appeal for contributions in aid of the Reading Room. Over one hundred dollars were cheerfully pledged. Our list of monthly magazines has included The North American Review, The Review of Reviews, The Century, Harper's, Scribner's, Good Words, Outing, The Cosmopolitan and The Quiver. The Weekly Tribune, The World, Puck and The Judge have been regularly put before their readers, also the daily issues of the Boston Journal, Herald and Globe. Our recent esteemed townsman, Dr. G. F. Munsey, during his stay contributed Harper's Weekly and the Manchester Daily Union. Mrs. H. I. Whitney has put The Popular Science Monthly upon our reading table. Others have gratuitously furnished such papers as The Household, The Independent, The Congregationalist, The Christian Union, The Farmer's Cabinet, The Peterborough Transcript, The Fitchburg Sentinel and The Statesman.

The Selectmen have kindly given the use of their room and favored us with numerous other courtesies. The place is now well provided with chairs and all other needful furniture, and affords an attractive evening resort for our youth as they seek the culture of larger acquaintance with current literature. Besides, the magazines are soon given out and are as eagerly sought as any books. Some of them when bound will become a valuable addition to the Library. Your trustees believe the matter of importance and hope for far reaching results. They recommend that the enterprise be permanently sustained by the town. Let us be liberal in the equipment of our children for a good fight in the battle of life.

TOWN WARRANT.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town, on the fourteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1st-To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2nd—To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors or Committees, or Officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

3rd—To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, for the maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways and building and repairing bridges, and for the necessary charges arising within the town.

4th—To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum not exceeding fifty dollars for decorating soldiers' graves.

5th—To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money for the use of the town. 6th—To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money not exceeding fifty dollars for the use of the Library.

7th—To see if the Town will vote to extend the water-pipe for fire purposes on Pleasant Street to the house occupied by W. W. Stevenson, and raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray the expense of the same.

8th—To see if the Town will vote to purchase additional hose for fire purposes.

9th-To see if the Town will vote to adopt any measures to increase the efficiency of its fire department.

roth—To see if the Town will vote to pay Adron Winship his bill, as presented to the School Board, for tuition and transportation of his children to and from school.

11th—To see if the Town deem it advisable for the Selectmen to lay out and build a road from near the depot to the bridge near Eben Richardson's, as petitioned for by Alfred C. Woodward and others.

REPORT.

The School Board would report as below:

The East School has been kept for 36 weeks during the past year and the town of Mason has paid one-half of the expense. This has seemed a fair adjustment and to the advantage of both towns. The school has done good and satisfactory work. The average attendance in this as well as in the South School is remarkable in view of the fact that the school-houses are at long distances from the homes of some of the pupils.

The South School has been open for the summer and fall terms. It did not seem wise to maintain it during the winter for a probable attendance of three or four pupils only. It may even be well in the future to close this school for a portion of the year, at least, and transport the pupils to Greenville.

The graded schools in the village have passed a successful and pleasant year. There has been nothing to seriously interfere with the studies, and they have gone on with marked steadiness and spirit in all the rooms. It has been necessary to add new subjects for a class of advanced pupils in the upper room. English and American Literature, English History and Algebra

are not usually found in Grammar Schools, and the course as at present conducted takes pupils at least two years into the work of the average High School. Where the number of pupils is small this arrangement is the best that can be made, but the variety of studies in our so-called Grammar grade is too great. It crowds the scholars and overworks the teacher. So soon as the number of possible pupils justifies the expense, a distinct and separate High School should be opened. The Intermediate and Primary Schools are graded more closely than before and are in good condition.

The Board have had the rooms painted, the ceilings whitewashed and the whole inside of the building made

neat and comfortable.
