

THE CHAMBERLIN FREE PUBIC LIBRARY.

TRUSTEE'S REPORT.

Early in the past year, one hundred and three volumes were added to the library and an alphabetical catalogue of the new books printed. Soon after, one of the trustees, Mr. William C. Greene, left the state and his associates wish to put upon record their testimony to his generous and valuable services. Upon invitation of the state board of library commissioners, the application of the town for the state grant of books was presented at Concord by a trustee in person and the authority of precedent urged for liberal interpretation of the law in our behalf.

It has been the effort of those in charge to make the library as useful as possible. Since the first of June it has been open for the exchange of books Wednesday evenings, as well as every Saturday of the year. With enlarged privilege, the volumes taken out for home reading have considerably increased. In accordance with the town's vote, a free reading room has continued to offer its advantages to all with leisure and disposition to improve them. Until the beginning of summer this was done every secular evening, unless the place was needed by the selectmen. During subsequent months

the room has been opened as a resort for reading but four days each week. Experience inclines your trustees to recommend this plan for the year before us. Then the town officers have two evenings left, free from intrusion, for their weekly or bi-weekly meetings.

While two daily papers are still provided for the open evenings, the popular interest is rather in the local weeklies, or illustrated journals and monthly magazines. Hence, alternate evenings and the large opportunities of Saturday afternoon and evening will serve our present needs and the expense becomes light. The magazines are soon permitted to go out and made to pass round as rapidly as possible. They are more in demand than the books and remain an important contribution to the future growth of the library. We think it a matter of great importance that our youth should feel the constant stimulus of the freshest thought in literature and artistic illustration. No other investment will yield us such profitable returns as that which is wisely adapted to the best culture of those who are so soon to be in the places of power.

Our magazine list, with but few changes, remains the same as last year, but should be further enlarged. Many papers and some magazines have been gratuitously furnished, for which special thanks are due. Those whose names were mentioned in our last report as donors of books and other literature have continued their good habit. Mr. James B. Fry has added another volume to his previous gifts and Mrs. Henry I. Whitney still places the *Popular Science Monthly* and the *Woman's Journal* upon the reading-room table.

Particular reference should be made to a contribution from Dr. George F. Munsey, of Suncook. It is a very grateful token of kind remembrance, as well as a most meritorious public service, when those who have been associated with us are in their absence still moved to such generous gifts. Let our own liberality make our library a living power for the community and in due time, as in other favored towns, munificent friends may appear, to give it a more commodious home.

TOWN WARRANT.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the town of Greenville qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1st—To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2nd—To hear the reports of agents, auditors or committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

3rd—To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, for the maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways and building and repairing bridges, and for the necessary charges arising within the town.

4th—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum not exceeding fifty dollars for decorating soldiers' graves.

5th—To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to borrow money for the use of the town.

6th—To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to appoint a night watchman agreeable to chapter 249, section 8, of the public statutes, and raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary to defray the expense of same.

7th—To see if the town will vote to adopt any measures to increase the efficiency of its fire department.


8th—To see if the town will vote to adopt some modern method of heating the town house and raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray the expense of same.

9th—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the use of the library.




REPORT

REPORT.

The school board hereby submit their annual report according to custom. The past year has been notable in several particulars: the frequent change in teachers, necessitated by illness and other causes, and the prevalence of the epidemic measles, during the fall term, rendered the work of public instruction less profitable than usual, by causing irregularities of attendance on the part of the pupils, and by diminishing their attendance to such an extent as to compel the closing of the grammar school two weeks earlier than we had intended.

The south school has been open only one term during the past year. Before the winter term we could find only two or three scholars who would attend under any circumstances. We therefore deemed it advisable to to pay for transportation to the village rather than attempt to have a school there.

The east school has been open thirty-five weeks during the year and the same financial arrangement made with the town of Mason last year has been continued this year. This school shows a larger percentage of attendance than any other school in town. The board

thought best to freshen and brighten the interior of the building, which has added to the comfort of both teacher and pupils.

The village schools, as has been suggested before, have been considerably broken up and have suffered more or less in consequence. The average number of pupils has been less than usual, and the average attendance much less.
