TOWN WARRANT.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum not exceeding sixty dollars for decorating soldiers' graves.
5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow money for the use of the town.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the use of the library.

7. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation for a term not exceeding ten years the capital used in operating the factory owned by the Chamberlin heirs in said town for manufacturing purposes.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the reduction of the town debt.

9. To see what action the town will take with regard to using the hearse out of town.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to repair River street from Main street to New Ipswich line.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the repair of sidewalks.

REPORT OF FIRE WARDS.

In submitting our annual report to the citizens, we are very glad to state the fact that no serious fires have occurred during the past year. The company has responded to four alarms on the following dates: March 30, 1899, at the house of Hugh Doyle; April 10, at the Columbian Mfg. Co. boarding house; July 20, at the dust room, No. 1 mill; and Sept. 9, at John Foley's house on Main street. These fires were all small affairs, and our pony fire extinguishers were used on three occasions with satisfactory results. At our last town meeting, the town voted to raise and appropriate \$1,000, with which to purchase a chemical engine.

This matter was left in the hands of the fire wards, who made a thorough examination of several machines and finally purchased one from C. N. Perkins & Co. of Lawrence, Mass. This chemical is thoroughly up to date in every respect, and is equipped with two 35-gallon tanks, one roof and one extension ladder, also two Star Fire Extinguishers. Before accepting the engine two public trials were given, the last of which proved very satisfactory. Since these public trials, we have tested it on two occasions with good results. We also purchased a new quick hitch harness to be used with the chemical. We have reduced the number of the company from 28 to 25 members. The company appeared in one public parade on Memorial Day, by invitation of the G. A. R.

The old hand engine was sold during the year, as its useful days were ended.

While our town is better protected than formerly from fire, it is well to bear in mind that in times of deep snow, we should be obliged to depend largely on our hydrants, and the extension of our water pipes, would afford still better protection to the property not already covered by them.

This matter is mentioned that it may be fresh in the minds of the voters.

REPORT OF CEMETERY TRUSTEES.

Some expense has been requisite for the renovation of a broken bier, the painting of the iron work in the town tomb and minor repairs upon the hearse.

Through the whole season effort has been made to keep the cemetery as clean and in as fitting condition as possible. Every loose headstone has been reset in the best of cement. All the income from the trust funds has been expended upon the several lots for whose care they were given, except the interest upon the Scripture bequest, which is of more general application, only "particular attention" being required and given to the generous donor's own lot with that of his father's. Another gift for the "perpetual care" of a specified lot has been received from Mrs. Jane S. Davis and loaned to the town.

Special courtesies from Morton L. Barrett, of the Mason Board of Cemetery Trustees, are deserving of special acknowledgement.

With the swift passage of the years, the burial of the fathers and mothers of the town and the erection of monuments sacred to their memory, "God's Acre" is ever becoming dearer to our hearts and should receive corresponding care at our hands, while we remember that its hallowed enclosure is being rapidly occupied. Soon, very soon, we must enlarge or secure other suitable grounds.

Two lists of new books have further been added by purchase. All this has called for more room so that new shelves and bookcases, one of revolving pattern, have been provided. The periodical list has been continued with little change from last year, including all the most popular illustrated monthlies with the leading pictorial weeklies.

The librarian, Miss M. Elisabeth Merriam, re-elected at the beginning of the year, has found herself unable to be much in attendance upon her duties, but

her place has been efficiently filled by assistants: Miss Josephine M. Taft and Frederick C. Marsh.

We again advise the same generous support of its library by the town as in the last two years. After the requisite outlay for running expenses of the room, every additional dollar of appropriation or contribution represents a corresponding increase of the choicest literary provision to furnish a most attractive table for the nourishing of our common life.

SCHOOL REPORT.

The school board submits the following report:

The schools in the village have kept thirty-six weeks during the past year, and the work of teachers and progress of pupils has been on the whole satisfactory.

Miss Hawkesworth, teacher in the primary department, resigned just after the fall term was fairly started, which necessitated filling the vacancy with a new teacher. This upset the school for a time, but it soon recovered from the disturbance and has done good work since.

Several new families having moved into the South district, it seemed best to open the school, and we have had thirty-two weeks of school there with favorable results.

The pupils from the East district have been brought into the village the same as last year, Mason paying its proportionate part.

Not having any high school pupils, we have dispensed with an assistant in the grammar school, and have only the three grammar grades in that room.

The primary room became so crowded, and the confusion caused by moving classes into the recitation room so great, that we decided to divide the room by a partition and make a first and second primary grade, which has proved very satisfactory in its results.

There have also been added some new maps and charts, in an attempt to keep pace with the changes constantly taking place in the geography of the world.
