

TOWN WARRANT.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville, N. H., in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow money for the use of the town.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money not . exceeding sixty dollars for decorating soldiers' graves.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the use of the library.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to build a sidewalk from the end of present sidewalk opposite the Catholic church to the New Ipswich line on High street, or take any action thereon.
- 8. To see what action the town will vote to take with reference to supplying water to the Parochial school.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to purchase a snow roller, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

- 10. To see what action the town will vote to take with reference to wiring town house building and procuring suitable fixtures for lighting the same with electricity, and see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the same.
- 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to liquidate the School Fund.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure state aid for the permanent improvement of highways, under the law passed by the January session of the legislature, 1905.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to adopt by-laws regulating the speed of automobiles in the village of Greenville.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to repair and paint town house building, and raise and appropriate money for same, or take any action thereon.
- 15. To see what action the town will vote to take with reference to the liquor license fee in the Town of Greenville, or take any action thereon.

in each side of the basement and a drinking fountain in each hall with the most approved sanitary arrangement.

Each room, also the vestibule and basement, is equipped with intercommunicating telephones so sensitive that a whisper can be heard distinctly. An electric gong on the rear of the building is operated from the principal's room.

Each room is amply provided with slate blackboards of the best quality, those in the primary rooms being several inches lower than in the upper grades.

We found it necessary to exchange our heater for a larger size Walker & Pratt, as the heat requirements demanded the change. There is now reserve heat in case at any future time a room on the third floor is required. This, of course, meant an extra expense, but the winter through which we have just passed has proved the wisdom of reserve heat.

All plumbing supplies were of the James Barrett & Co. manufacture, which is a sufficient guarantee of their quality.

The committee can say that the efforts of Mr. Chapman to provide plans for an artistic and commodious building, and the faithful and superior quality of labor furnished by Mr. Laflamme and Mr. Barber, are fully appreciated.

We give below an itemized cost of the new building, briefly described as follows:

Every voter is urged to vist the school and make a thorough inspection of the building, thereby satisfying himself that the town has received full value for money expended.

the supervision and only at certain times called on the architect for advice and approval. The faithful work of all the contracting parties was fully appreciated by the committee. Many suggestions of value were received from our local mechanics, and where possible were made use of. As the building progressed certain changes were made where deemed necessary to make a substantial building. Two steel eye beams running directly through the building and the iron columns in the cellar are two of the extras referred to in our financial account.

The system of heating and ventilating is unsurpassed, and a supply of fresh, warm air is always to be had with a proper handling of the registers. There are two complete systems of heat and each is wholly independent of the other. On two sides of each room there is a row of pipes for the direct steam. There are two radiators in each hall, also a radiator just above each ventilator in the ventilator stack, so that the bad air is actually pulled out The fresh air is obtained directly from outside, and of the room. after passing through the indirect coils is carried directly to each room, where it can be regulated to obtain the desired temperature. On each lower floor is a rotating register which connects directly with the indirect chamber below. When school is dismissed for the day, these registers are opened, the ventilators are closed and the warm air passes around and around on an endless journey, thus saving fuel.

All of the sanitary arrangements in the basement are ventilated directly into the chimney. All clothing is hung in the basement, and it is an absolute impossibility for impure air to reach the schoolrooms.

The ventilating and lighting are in acordance with the requirements of the state of Massachusetts. The seats are arranged so that the light reaches the pupil from the back and left side, and as all the rooms are equipped with shades having the Allen holder, the manner of lighting is ideal.

A pure water supply is obtained from the town reservoir and is carried to the building in wooden pipes. There is a lavatory

REPORT OF BUILDING COMMITTEE.

The Building Committee respectfully submit the following report:

Attention is first called to the vote passed at the last March meeting, which will be found recorded in the school report, and under the authority of which vote this committee was authorized to proceed in the erection of a new school building. Mr. Frederick W. Ely, Mr. Stephen H. Bacon and Mr. Henry I. Whitney were appointed by the School Board to serve on the building committee with them. A meeting was held on the evening of March 17 at the Columbian Mfg. Co.'s office. Mr. Victor L. Parker called the meeting to order and the committee proceeded to organize as follows: Frederick W. Ely, chairman, and Charles A. Preston, secretary.

On April 5 the services of Mr. E. R. B. Chapman, architect, 101 Tremont street, Boston, were engaged to prepare and submit plans for a four-room building. Mr. Chapman submitted plans and specifications April 23, and after a few alterations they were accepted.

Invitations for bids were immediately sent out and in response four bids were received. The bids ranged from \$9,985.00, the highest, to \$5,779.00, the lowest. Mr. F. X. Laflamme of Manchester, N. H., was awarded the contract for \$5,779.00 on May 13, and on May 16 the contract was signed.

There were three bids received for plumbing; highest \$884.20, lowest \$528.35. The contract was awarded to Mr. H. H. Barber of Milford, N. H., for \$528.35, on July 20, 1904.

The heating was to be paid for by the day, in order to use all available material in the old building.

Our local contractor, Mr. Roy J. Nault, installed the intercommunicating telephone system.

The fall term of school opened October 3, and both teachers and pupils appreciate their improved surroundings.

There is no better way of raising the tone of a school than by insisting that all property connected with it be kept in repair, and present at all times a neat and tidy appearance. Each child should be a self-appointed committee of one to see to it that his school property is not unnecessarily damaged in any way.

The erection of the new building necessitated the shortening of the school year to thirty-one weeks. One hundred and twentythree different pupils have been registered the past year.

The schools have been the recipients of the following gifts: Two pictures from the W. C. T. U., four flags from Mr. and Mrs. V. L. Parker, and an oleograph from the W. R. C. of New Ipswich.

The Werner arithmetic has been substituted for the Wentworth in all the grades. A series of Rand McNally maps has been put in the grammar and intermediate rooms.

. We should be glad to see a special instructor in drawing at no distant day, for drawing trains the eye as music trains the ear.

In summing up the work of the year we believe there has been an advance along the lines of better school accommodations, better text books, a better understanding between teachers and pupils, and last but not least, a better spirit of coöperation among all those interested in the welfare of the schools.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

We herewith submit our annual report to the citizens of Greenville.

The year has been a busy one for all connected with the conduct of the schools.

An article was inserted in the warrant of 1904 relating to the need of increased school accommodations. At the school meeting the following action was taken:

"Voted that the School Board is directed by the district to tear down or remove, or otherwise dispose of, on best terms possible, the old schoolhouse, and build a new building containing four or five school rooms and necessary entries, anterooms, basement, etc., at an expense not exceeding \$7,000.00, and have the same ready for use with opening of fall term, 1904.

"Also that the School Board be authorized to appoint a building committee, if they saw fit, from themselves and voters of the town, who shall assist them and, under their direction, have charge of erecting the building."

The following action was taken by the town:

"Voted that the Selectmen be authorized by the town to borrow a sum of money not exceeding \$7,000.00 at lowest possible rate, and on condition that it may be paid off in annual payments of \$500.00 each, to erect a new school building as voted by the school district. This money to be known as School Fund, and that each year at least \$500.00 shall be paid off on this loan, besides interest, until fully paid. This amount paid off to be raised with the taxes unless there is money on hand from other sources that can be used for the purpose."

In accordance with the vote of the district, F. W. Ely, H. I. Whitney and S. H. Bacon were chosen to act with the School Board as a building committee. A detailed report of the work of this committee is given by the secretary.


