THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville, N. H., in the
County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote
in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to borrow money for the use of the town.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to decorate soldiers' graves.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to liquidate the school house debt.
7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure state aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the library.

9. To see if the town will take any action to improve town water supply from artesian well and to raise and appropriate any money for same.

10. To see if the town will take any action towards securing a town water supply, and raise and appropriate any money for same, or appoint any committee to get information, estimate of cost, method of securing same, and raise and appropriate any money to defray expense of securing such information, etc.

11. To see if the town will take any action towards purchasing a street sprinkling cart and decide what streets shall be sprinkled, and how same shall be paid for, whether by subscription or appropriation or tax on property holders on streets sprinkled or raise and appropriate any sum of money for same.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for improvement of the plot of land around the fountain facing the town hall or take any action thereon.

13. To see what action the town will take in regard to the estate of the late Kate McGary or take any action thereon.

On July Fourth the park was used as a center in connection with the elaborate local observance of the holiday.

Thanks are due to the Greenville Woman's Club for generously defraying part of the expenses of the improvement and maintenance of the park.

As ordered by vote of the town, Representative Metcalf introduced at the present session of the General Court, a bill authorizing the annexation of the park to Greenville. This measure, which was referred to the committee on towns, was opposed by citizens of New Ipswich, and the matter was finally referred to the session of 1913.

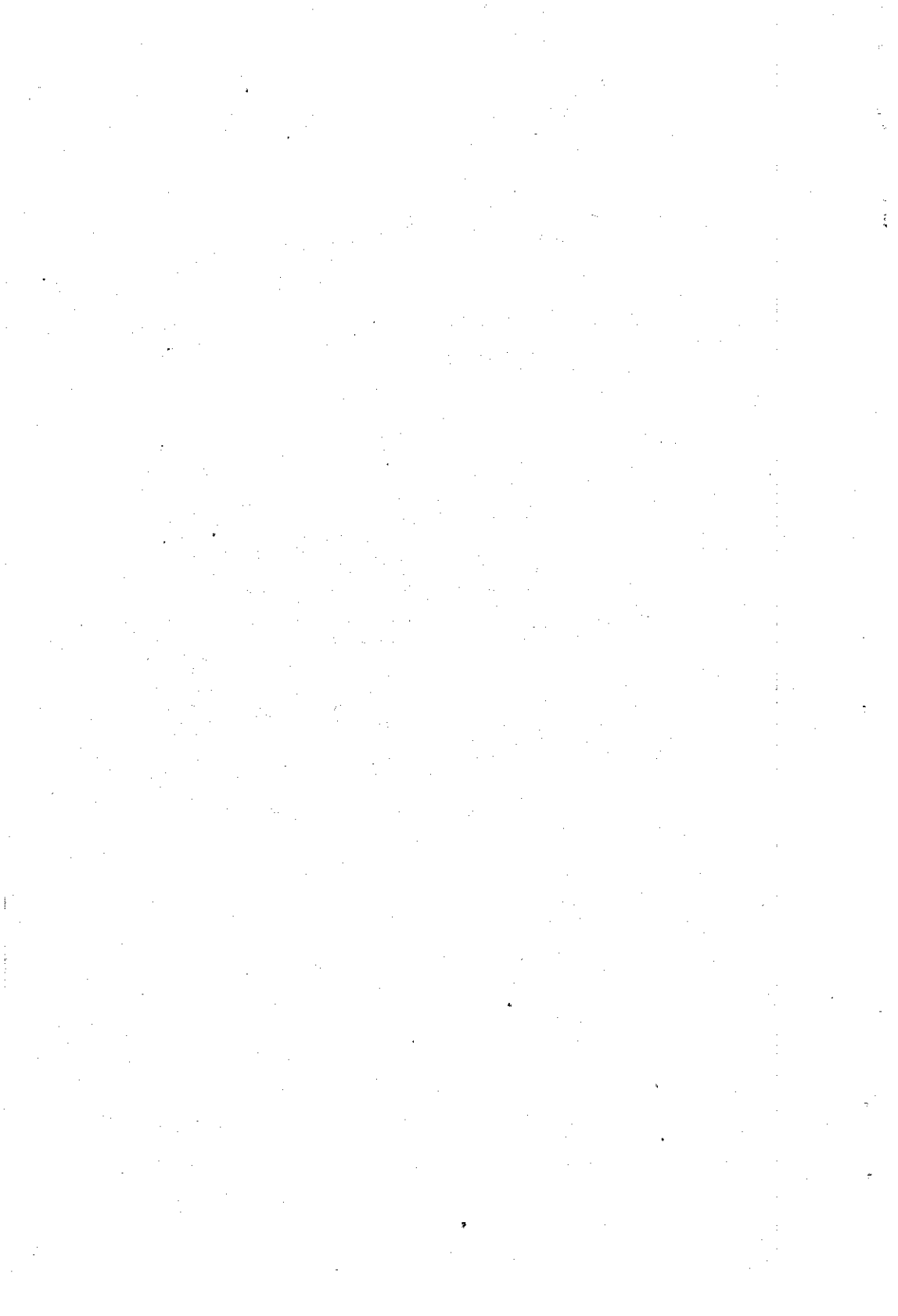

of Greenville, N. H.

School Board's Report.

To the Citizens of Greenville:

We herewith present the following report of the Schools for the past year.

The schools opened March 14, 1910 with the same efficient corps of teachers that we had the year before. Miss Walker being prevented by illness from teaching the first week, Mrs. Doonan substituted for her.

Changes were necessary in the intermediate room, soon after the commencement of fall term, as Miss Walker's health would not permit her to continue the work. Both Miss Batchelder and Mrs. Doonan substituted until Miss Edith Shedd took the position the last of October.

Instruction in drawing has continued under the supervision of Mrs. Fannie A. Wheeler. Music also has been taught as usual, during the spring term under Miss Stevenson; through the fall and winter terms under Miss Batchelder.

The schools have been in session thirty-seven weeks, making a gain, of one week, over previous years. The number of pupils vary from term to term, but average about 115.

There are now eight grades, as the opportunity came, when the division in the seventh could be discontinued. One half day only has been lost on account of severe weather. April fifteenth was given to the teachers for visiting other schools. Fast Day,

Memorial Day and Washington's Birthday were holidays.

Arbor and Memorial days as well as Lincoln's and Washington's birthdays have been appropriately observed. A Thanksgiving recess together with a Christmas vacation have been given as usual.

A sand-box has been placed in the upper primary room to be used in demonstrations, and books have been added for school work as needed.

According to our custom in recent years we have paid our proportion of the expense of No. 6 school in Mason.

On Sunday June 12, 1910 Rev. Tyler E. Gale delivered the Baccalaureate sermon to the graduading class. The Baptist church uniting with the Congregational for the service.

On June 17, 1910, graduation was held in the school building. The following pupils received diplomas, awarded by Mrs. Lena H. Wheeler: Exilda F. Boulay, Margaret T. Buckley, Helen H. Davis, Mary T. Drinan, Stephen J. Hogan, Mary C. Logan, Lester A. McLean, Edith M. Sherberno, M. Fostina Silvernail, Doris M. Wheeler, Edith L. Wilson. On the same day closing exercises were held in all the schools, over one hundred people being present.

The duties of truant officer have been faithfully performed for many years by Henry I. Whitney, up to the time of his death in May.

On September 5, Wm. H. Doonan was appointed by the Board to fill that position, and, in accordance with the state laws,

made the enumeration of children in Greenville, as follows:

Number of children between the ages of 5 and 16,	323
Boys,	154
Girls,	169

Of this number about fifty do not regularly attend school on account of age or sickness.

Sixteen pupils are now attending Appleton Academy, fourteen being undergraduates. The full amount now being allowed by the state is paid for tuition.

Two demonstrations of daily work have been held. In the upper and lower primary rooms, preceding the Thanksgiving recess; in the intermediate and grammar rooms, before the Christmas vacation. This gave an opportunity for everyone to become acquainted with the excellent work that was being done, as well as the methods employed.
