The State of New Hampshire.

To the inhibitants of the Town of Greenville, N. H., in the L.S County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

- You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:
- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money for use of the town.
- To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to decorate soldiers' graves.
- To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the money necessary to secure state aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
- To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the money necessary to secure state aid for repair of state road.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to build a tool house or take any action thereon.
- 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the library.

- 10. To see if the town will vote to build a concrete sidewalk on east side of Temple street, from Columbian Mfg. Co.'s office to Dunster avenue and raise and appropriate money for same.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to install a town water supply for domestic purposes, appoint the necessary committees to secure supply, and land rights, and necessary privileges, have survey and estimates made, make all necessary contracts and purchases for same and raise and appropriate or otherwise decide how money shall be secured for same or take any other action relating to same.

Cemetery Trustees' Report

The Cemetery Trustees submit the following report: Apart from the regular care of the grounds during the past year, a thorough renovation of some of the oldest lots has been made, and some of the old stones repaired.

As there was an appropriation for the new cemetery for the purpose of draining the south part of the grounds, we have had 110 feet of 8 inch tile pipe put in for the main drain, with 100 feet of four inch tile pipe in the different avenues.

We think that these pipes will carry off all the water that may collect in this part of the cemetery.

We have also had a well dug at the south side of the grounds, stoned up and covered with a cement top where we will have a force pump so that water will be available for use on lots in the new part of the cemetery.

We intend to grade the grounds where the pipes have been laid and also to have hose so that the perpetual care lots may be watered during the dry season.

Flowers were placed, as usual, upon all the perpetual care lots on Memorial Day.

Report of the Street Lighting Committee.

The Street Lighting Committee respectfully submits the following report:

At the annual meeting held in March 1913, a committee was elected, known as the Street Lighting Committee.

At an adjourned meeting held July 18th, 1913, the committee gave a report of what they thought should be done to improve the street lighting system of the town.

A motion was made and passed that the committee have power to reconstruct the street lighting system.

We have attended to our duties and have made a contract with the Greenville Electric Light Company for five years to furnish electricity for all-night service, from one-half hour after sunset until one-half hour before sunrise every night in the year, the lamps to be up to standard voltage at all times, the price to be twenty-five dollars per lamp per year, with the privilege of increasing the number of lamps at the same price per lamp per year, at any time during the term of the contract.

We have increased the number of lights by eight so that at present there are seventy-five lights installed.

The lamps are 32 candle power 40 watt Mazda street lamps of the latest pattern. Each has a new scroll bracket with the new Wheeler refluted reflector. We have replaced the old cross arms with new four pin cross arms, also new poles where needed. We have used one thousand feet of guy wire to stay the poles.

The new lights were placed on the following streets: One on road leading to Mr. John Drinane's home, one on Temple St., one on Dunster Ave., two on Main St., one on Mill St., one on the road leading to Mr. Wm. Lee's home and one on Pleasant street.

The cost of the same is shown in the Selectmen's account.

Report of the Town Water Committee.

Since last report your Committee have had test wells driven in different parts of town to see if a suitable supply could be found, but all were failures.

They then decided to test the Boiling Spring, so called, near railroad bridge and dug it out as much as possible with facilities they could secure and put in a power pump and found a sufficient supply as far as could be ascertained with the apparatus used.

Mr. A. W. Dudley, the Engineer employed, told the Committee in his opinion the supply would be ample and there were no serious objections to the location. The State Board of Health through Mr. Howard, State Chemist, have approved of the location and have made three different analyses of the water and pronounced them all excellent water.

Your Committee have expended of the money appropriated, \$722.76, leaving a balance on hand of \$477.24.

Town Water Supply Committee

Report of Fire Wards.

We respectfully submit the following report for the year ending February 15, 1914:

The apparatus now in use consists of one chemical engine equipped with two thirty-five gallon tanks, two hundred feet of chemical hose, two hand fire extinguishes, two ladders and one axe. One hose wagon that will carry eight hundred feet of fire hose and one hose reel.

We have twelve hundred feet of fire hose, three hundred feet of which was purchased this year by the selectmen and two new hose nozzels.

During the past year there has been a number of still alarms and two whistle alarms. One was for the fire in the basement of the town hall, Mar. 31, when the lamp which was used for the Fire Department, exploaded.

The most disastrous fire was on May 30, when the store house and tenement house, owned by Mr. Henry Hayward, was burned. Had it not been for the quick answer to the alarm and the abundance of water furnished by the new steam pump of the Columbian Mfg. Co., that part of the town might have been in ashes today.

The Fire Wards wish to thank all who in any way assisted on that night, even those who served water to the workers.

We are at the present time installing four new fire alarm boxes which will make five in town.

They are to be located on the following streets: Box No. 25 at the corner of Pleasant and Main streets, No. 32 at the lower end of Mill street, No. 41 on Main street near Columbian hotel and No. 52 on High street near the Catholic church. The old box, No. 67 is on the town house. We think with these additional boxes that the town will be very much better protected.

The company appeared on parade May 30th by invitation of Herman Shedd Post, G. A. R.

School Board's Report.

To the Citizens of Greenville:

We herewith submit the following report:---

Schools opened March 17, 1913 with Miss Keysar, Miss Harrison and Miss Parker taking the grades as through the previous year.

The Primary and Intermediate rooms closed at noon on June 20 but there were no public exercises on account of the illness of one of the teachers.

The graduation exercises held in the Grammar room at 3 p. m. of the same day were enjoyed by a large number of friends. Following these appropriate remarks were made by Mr. C. A. Preston and Mrs. Lena H. Wheeler awarded diplomas to the following pupils:

Victor E. Duncan, Harold McLean Lucy Sawyer. William Lapiere Blanche Rodier

During the summer vacation the basement walls were painted, concreting about the building retopped and other repairs attended to.

The Fall term opened Sept. 8 with Miss Keysar in the Grammar room and Miss Hazel Kimball of Greenville as her assistant.

Miss Harrison and Miss Parker having tendered their resignations, their positions were filled by Miss Mary G. Eastman of Jefferson, N. H. in the Intermediate room and Miss Ruth H. Hayden of Townsend, Mass., in the Primary room.

Miss Emma Southwick was reengaged as music supervisor and Mrs. Fannie Wheeler of the drawing.

A new time schedule-closing the morning session at 11:45 and opening the afternoon session at 1:15-was adopted at this time.

The yearly enumeration of children in Greenville between the ages of 5 and 16 as taken by Wm. H. Doonan was as follows: Boys 163, Girls 197, 52 of this number have not attended school on account of age or sickness. This is a smaller number than in previous years owing to the new compulsory school attendance law.

The Fall term closed Dec. 19 with the usual public exercises.

Our proportion of the expenses of No. 6 school in Mason has been paid as usual.

Pupils attending Appleton Academy during the Spring term numbered 8, during the fall term 8 - Winter term 6 and 1 pupil at Colby Academy for the year.

On Memorial Day the children sang in the town hall, also assisting in decorating the soldiers' graves.

The teachers were given a visiting day on April 25 and on Oct. 3 attended the Teachers' Institute held at Wilton. On Oct. 16, Miss Keysar and the 8th grade took a trip to Concord, visiting places of historical interest.

During the Spring term Emerson and Bender's language books were placed in the schools for all grades except the first, those which had been in use for several years, "Mother Tongue" and "Steps in English" being taken in exchange.

Baldwin and Bender's readers also have been purchased for the 1st, 2nd and 3rd grades, and supplementary reading for other grades as needed.

An extension ladder, which had been much needed about the building, was purchased during the year. A drinking fountain was placed in each basement and a covered soap urn containing liquid soap, also sanitary paper towels for the use of the pupils.

At the beginning of the winter term, a system of Calisthenics was introduced following the graded course given in Senart's Manual of Calisthenics.

Ten minutes each day is allowed for it and both teachers and pupils find the work of much interest.

Owing to the extremely cold weather during the winter term the schools were closed a total of four days, something that has not occured before in many years.

The schools closed March 6th, making a school year of 38 weeks.


