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## Town Warrant.

The State of New Hampshire.

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money for the use of the town.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to decorate Soldiers' Graves.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the money necessary to secure state aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the money necessary to secure state aid for the repair of State Road.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the library.
9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars to reduce the town water system debt.

10. To see if the town will instruct the Water Commissioners to move the fountain at the foot of Pleasant St. so as to give more room for vehicles and make corner safer for same and raise and appropriate any money to meet the expense of same.
11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed or take any action thereon.

## Second Annual Report of The Water Commissioners

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During the past year we completed the work at pump house, and extended the service pipe to the last house on River street. This proved to be very expensive owing to the unexpected amount of rock excavations which more than doubled the estimated cost.

We made 19 new service connections, and installed 31 new meters. We have found it necessary to remove most of the old meters and provide new ones in their place. The iron deposit in the water from the old system filled and clogged the meters so they would not work satisfactorily.

We now have 55 service connections and are supplying about 75 families.

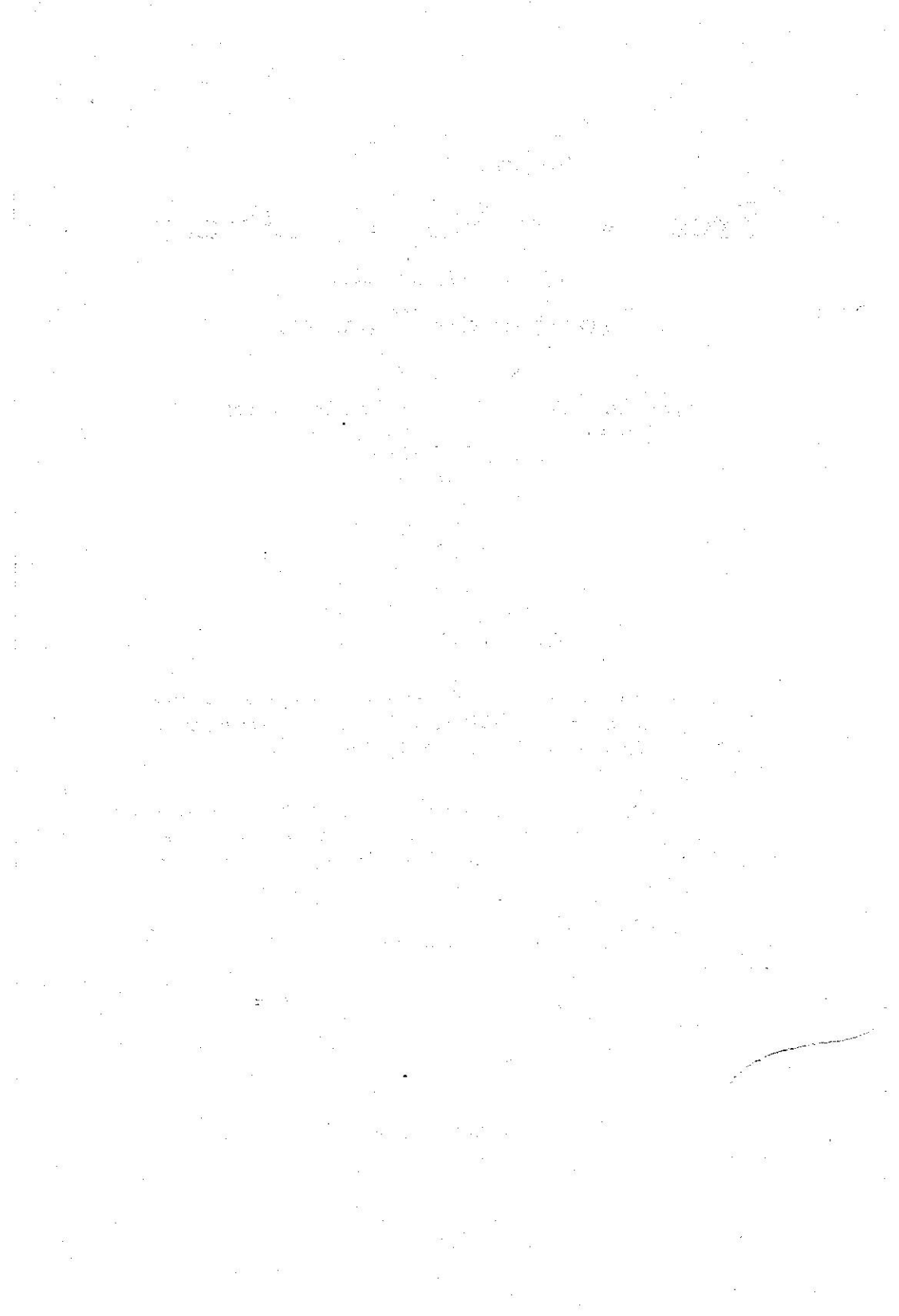

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# Report of School Board.

## School District Warrant.

### The State of New Hampshire.

To the inhabitants of the School district in the town of Greenville, N. H., qualified to vote in in district affairs; You are are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the Thirteenth day of March, 1917, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing two years.
4. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
5. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
8. To see how much money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of Schools.
9. To see if the district will vote to have Medical Inspection.

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### To the Citizens of Greenville.

We herewith submit the following report:-

Schools opened March 27 with Miss Alice M. Hodsdon in charge of the Grammar room and Mrs. Frances A. Blanchard as assistant. Miss Mary G. Eastman teacher in the Intermediate room and Mrs. Violet W. Livingston in the Primary. No change in the Music or Drawing Supervisors was made from the previous year.

May 9 a case of diptheria was reported and all pupils who were known to be exposed were quarantined. No new cases developing these pupils were notified to return at the proper time.

The Intermediate and Primary rooms closed June 15 for the summer vacation. June 16 the pupils in the Grammar room gave a pleasing program and Miss Olive Wright, the only pupil to be graduated from the school in 1916, was presented a diploma by the Chairman of the Board.

On July 29 the whole town was shocked to learn of the death of Mr. C. A. Preston following a sudden illness of the previous day. He had served the town in many capacities and as a member of the School Board for 15 consecutive years. In that position he had proved himself a man of unusual ability as shown in all matters pertaining to business and also in his friendliness and thoughtfulness for the children under his supervision. A man of most exemplary character and sterling worth his loss is keenly felt.

The repairs during the summer were more extensive than some years past as it had been found necessary to replace the toilets in the boys' basement. These repairs commenced under Mr. Preston's supervision were satisfactorily completed.

The Fall term opened Sept. 5 with Miss Hodsdon in the Grammar room, but the number of pupils being less than usual it was thought an assistant was not necessary.

Miss Nellie Hayes, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School, had been engaged for the Intermediate room and Mrs. Livingston was continued in the Primary.

Sept. 30, H. P. Upham was appointed by the School Board to fill the vacancy for the rest of the year, caused by the death of Mr. Preston.

The yearly enumeration of children between the ages of 5 and 16 was made by Wm. H. Doonan as follows:

Boys 150

Girls 159

The schools closed for the Winter vacation Dec. 15.

According to custom the pupils assisted on Memorial Day in decorating the soldiers' graves. Lincoln's Gettysburg address was given at the cemetery by a number of pupils from the Grammar room.

New books have been added as needed and during the Spring term Winston's Cumulative Encyclopedias were purchased. Our proportion of the expense of No. 6 school at Mason has been smaller than usual as has our High School tuition, having had but three students at secondary schools this year for which the district paid.

All legal holidays, visiting day for the teachers and the Thanksgiving recess have been observed but only one session has been lost owing to severe storms.

The school year of 38 weeks closed February 9.
