The State of New Hampshire.

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville, in the County
of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town
Affairs.*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money for the use of the town.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to decorate Soldiers' graves.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the money necessary to secure state aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the money necessary to secure state aid for the maintenance of state road.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the use of the library.
9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars to reduce the town water system debt.
10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to appoint a night watchman agreeable to Chapter 249, Section 8 of the Public Statutes and raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary to defray the expense of same.
11. To see what action the town will take in regard to street lighting as the present contract expires November 30th, 1918. To appoint a committee to take into consideration the number of lights to have, the time of lighting, the cost of same and to make contract for a term of years, or take any action that may properly come under this article for street lighting.
12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Water Commissioners.
13. To see if the town will vote to give a rebate on taxes paid before a date to be decided upon at this meeting or take any action thereon.
14. To elect a delegate to the Constitutional Convention by Australian ballot.

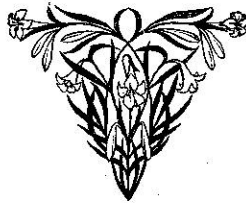

Report of the School Board of GREENVILLE, N. H.

For the Year ending Feb. 8, 1918.

School District Warrant.

The State of New Hampshire.

To the inhabitants of the School district in the town of Greenville, N. H., qualified to vote in district affairs: You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the Twelfth day of March, 1918, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
6. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committee in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
7. To see how much money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of Schools.
8. To see if the district will vote to have medical inspection and to raise money to carry such vote into effect.
9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to unite with one or more town districts to form a Supervisory District for the purpose of employing a Superintendent of the public schools therein, under the provisions of Chapter 77 of the Session Laws of New Hampshire, 1899, and to raise money to carry such vote into effect.

To the Citizens of Greenville.

We herewith submit the following report:-

Schools opened March 26 with Miss Alice M. Hodsdon, Miss Nellie Hayes and Mrs. Violet W. Livingston in the Grammar, Intermediate and Primary rooms respectively. Music and Drawing Supervisors the same as for several years.

The pupils assisted on Memorial Day in decorating the Soldiers' graves. During the exercises at the town hall, twelve girls gave a Flag Drill and sang "The Star Spangled Banner." Lincoln's Gettysburg Address was given by Arthur Fortin of Grade VIII.

June 14 the Intermediate and Primary rooms gave pleasing exercises and closed for the summer vacation. An especially interesting program was presented on June 15 by the class of 1917.

Mrs. Ellen A. Hall, chairman of the Board awarded diplomas to the following graduates: Lucy G. Ash, Fred I. Colby, Ruth E. Glidden, Arthur Fortin, Marion M. Liberty, Leon E. Livingston, Grace M. Nault, Alice M. Paradis, Ruth M. Robbins and Emma A. Thompson.

All necessary repairs on the building were made during the summer.

During August it was found that seven of the graduating class would begin a high school course if it could be available in town. A local high school had long been in the minds of the School Board and with encouragement from many townspeople, the matter was seriously discussed. The department of Public Instruction at Concord was consulted and the Board were advised that as the money appropriated at the school meeting was in a lump sum they were lawfully entitled to use said money for either grade or high school work. With the balance from 1916, which came largely from having fewer pupils at high schools or academies for whom tuition had to be paid, it seemed probable there would be sufficient money to carry a course through the year.

As it was necessary for all plans to be presented to the Deputy State Superintendent to receive his approval, the matter was somewhat delayed and it was not until Sept. 18 that the Record of Adoption and Approval of the Greenville High School (First Year) was received.

As all the pupils wished for practically the same course the following subjects were the ones provided, with the advice of the the Superintendent: English, Penmanship, Spelling, Algebra, Commercial Arithmetic and Physical Geography.

The Fall term opened Sept. 4 with Mrs. Alice B. Tolman in the Grammar room in place of Miss Hodsdon who had resigned, Miss Nellie Hayes in the Intermediate room and Miss Mildred Russell, a graduate of Fitchburg Normal School, in the Primary in place of Mrs. Livingston, who had also resigned.

The High School opened Sept. 24 with Mrs. Esther E. Scales as instructor and nine pupils enrolled.

The yearly enumeration of children between the ages of 5 and 16 was made by Wm. H. Doonan as follows:

Boys 145

Girls 152

School closed for the winter vacation Dec. 21.

The case of Mrs. Dorilda Gagnon for Mother's Aid which was sent to the Department at Concord in November 1915, was granted in October 1917 and her first payment began at that time.

In accordance with the vote for Medical Inspection, B. D. Pease, M. D. was appointed as Inspector. 266 pupils in the Public and Parochial school were examined. As a result it was found that there were 5 children who were Anaemic, 2 had Pulmonary disease, 2 Malnutrition, 3 Nervous disease, 6 Skin disease, 182 Defective teeth, 73 Hypertrophied tonsils, 3 Adenoids, 1 Gland disease, 22 Defective vision, 30 Head lice, 9 were mentally deficient and 3 undersized.

211 notices were sent to parents and in a few instances the defect were attended to. We hope another year for more attention being paid to the notices and in consequence stronger children who are better able to study.

No change in text books was made during the year, but new ones like those in use were purchased when needed; also all text books for the high school, with supplementary reading.

In December it became necessary to purchase a new flag. Legal holidays, visiting day for the teachers and the Thanksgiving recess have been observed.

In January a Thrift Stamp Campaign was made in our schools, as all over the state and in February a letter was received from the State Director Allen Hollis saying: "I wish to congratulate you upon the showing made by your schools. I believe it is the first report we have had which shows that the full per cent. has been attained."

The school year of 38 weeks closed Feb. 8. The following pupils are entitled to a place on the

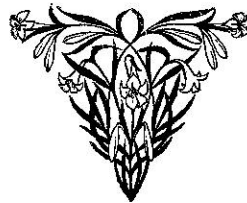
