THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money for the use of the town.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to decorate Soldiers' graves.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars to reduce the town water system debt.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of sidewalks.
8. To see if the town will vote to repair and make alterations upon the town building, decide how said repairs and alterations are to be paid for and raise or appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary to carry said repairs and alterations into effect, or take any action thereon.
9. To see if the town will vote to give a rebate on taxes paid before a date to be decided upon at this meeting or take any action thereon.

Report of Fire Wards.

We respectfully submit the following report for the year ending Jan. 31, 1919.

The apparatus now in use consists of one chemical engine equipped with two 35-gallon tanks, 200 feet of chemical hose, eight fire extinguishers, two ladders and one axe.

One hose wagon, which will carry eight hundred feet of fire hose, one hose reel, and of fire hose.

During the year the department has answered to three alarms. The first of the year was on Feb. 17, at the home of Hon. H. J. Taft on Main street, which proved to be the most obstinate one the firemen have had to fight in a number of years, the fire having worked its way from cellar, causing great loss by fire and water.

The fire at Henry Martin's on Mill street, Oct. 3, when Mr. Martin was burned to death, did but little damage to the house.

On Nov. 30, at the home of Esdras Duval the department responded to the call of a chimney fire.

A great many still alarms have been answered to, which, if not, might otherwise have proved serious.

The members of the Fire Department wish to thank all who assisted in any way at the Taft fire.

The company appeared in uniform May 30 by invitation of Herman Shedd post, G. A. R.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

*To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Greenville,
N. H., qualified to vote in district affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the eleventh day of March, 1919, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
6. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committee in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
7. To see how much money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools.
8. To see if the District will vote to have Medical Inspection and to raise money to carry such vote into effect.
9. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to unite with one or more town districts to form a Supervisory District for the purpose of employing a Superintendent of the Public Schools therein and to raise money to carry such vote into effect.

Report of School Board.

To the School Board of Greenville:

Herewith I submit my first annual report as superintendent of your schools.

Upon taking charge of the administration of your schools, I found them well organized, with competent teachers, and the pupils making good progress. The housing of your pupils was excellent and well kept, and the other equipment was fair. It has been my policy to retain all that I found good in your system and to make only such changes in curricula as would bring us nearer to the state programme of studies and which appeared advisable at the present time, and to make only such additions to the equipment as conditions demanded.

Reading is the getting of thought from the written or printed page. No device of phonics, rhyme, word building, or word analysis will induce the child to gather from the printed page thoughts which he does not care to entertain. On the other hand, the task of teaching the child to read is more than half accomplished when there is placed in his hands such reading matter as will appeal to him and hold his interest. It is true that by phonic or other devices the child may be trained to a process of word calling, which may appear to the hearer as reading but which arouses no thought in the child's mind and establishes a pernicious habit which it is almost impossible to break up in later years. I have found it necessary to procure considerable additional reading materials for the first three grades, and I have been guided in my selection by what I have found from experience readily holds the interest of the child.

The history course has been enriched by the introduction of biographical readings, "The Builders of Our Country," in Grades IV and V, and by the introduction of ancient history readings in Grade V. The latter change was necessary if we aim to follow the state programme.

In the two upper grades we have substituted junior high school mathematics for the traditional arithmetic. Though this is the only change that seemed to me advisable at the present time, I believe that we should aim to make the work in these two grades conform as soon as possible to that outlined in Curriculum 1 of the state programme of studies. With a junior high school thus established, it

would be an easy matter to add a year of the senior high school work, and even more should the number of pupils warrant it.

The addition to our equipment of a Victrola, which now seems almost in sight, will be a valuable asset. It will enable your supervisor of music and the teachers to reveal to the children the beautiful and ennobling things in music, vocal and instrumental, and will open up for them a field of enjoyment which is for the most of us a closed book.

Thanking the board for their cooperation, support, and consideration, this report is respectfully submitted.

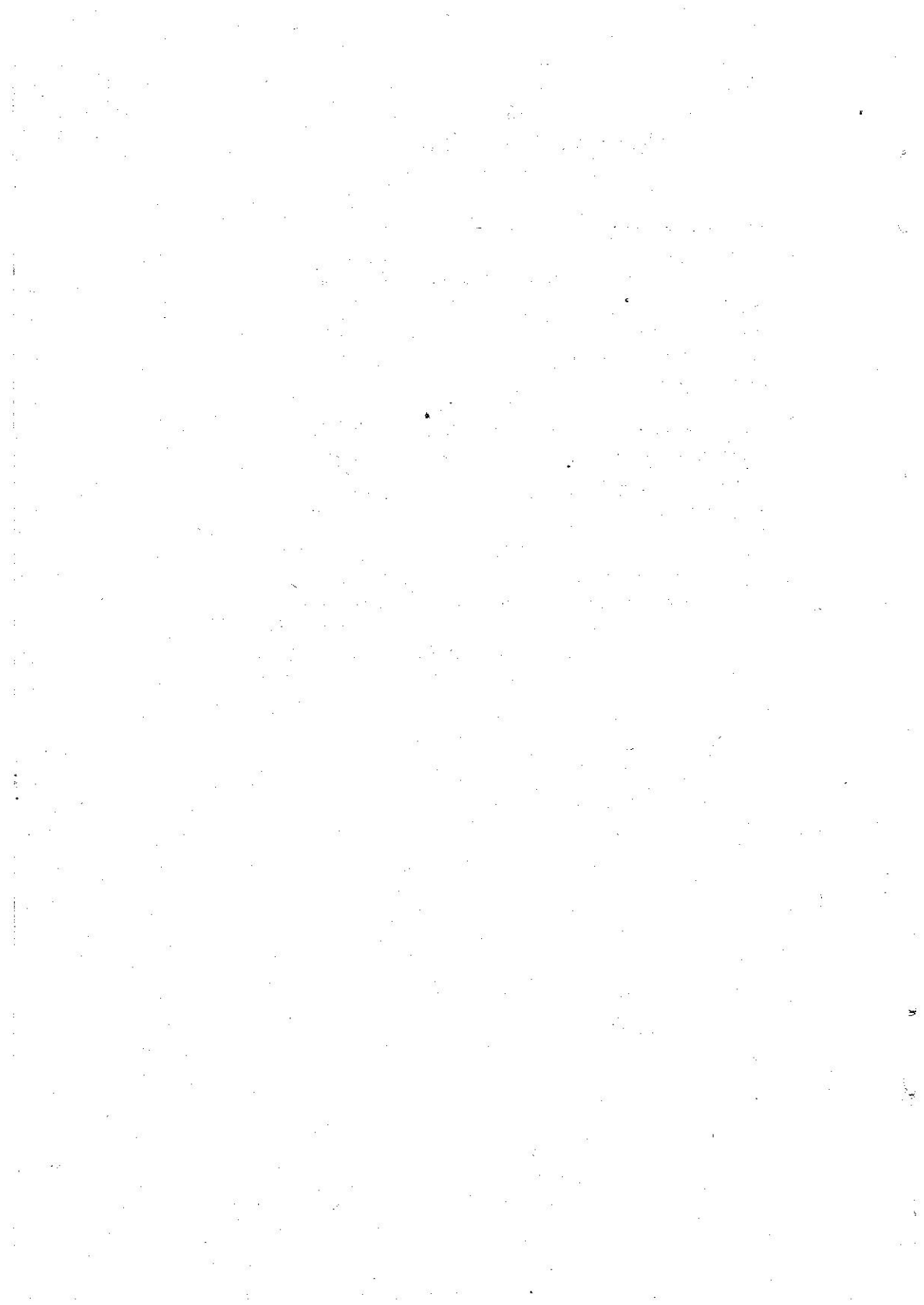

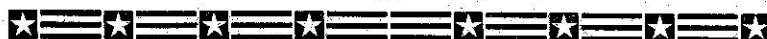
