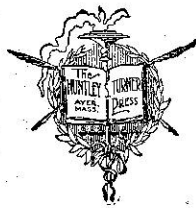

Explanation

At a special meeting, held May 22, 1920, it was voted to raise the sum of \$5,000.00 for the use of the Water Commissioners. The Selectmen have paid over the above amount to the Water Commissioners, but instead of borrowing the same, took it from other appropriations which could not be used the past year, namely, highway account and fire service pipe extension, thereby saving interest until such time as the latter appropriations are to be used, when the money will have to be borrowed.

The Trustees of the Library feel that the citizens are not availing themselves of the benefit that they should receive from this public institution. The library contains a good reading-room with the best of magazines for all ages, and the latest fiction and reference books on many subjects; also, history and standard works. The past year we have had 6073 visitors and loaned 3087 books. The library is open every evening from 7 to 9 o'clock. We feel there is a great amount of good to be obtained by all who are interested enough to come and use the books that the town is willing to purchase freely. We, therefore, desire that each and every one patronize the library. During the year we have purchased 96 books and have had gifts of 100 books from Miss E. G. Barrett and L. P. Callis; also, "The Music of the Modern World" in 25 parts, from Miss Dustin. These books contain historical and critical accounts of famous singers, instrumental virtuosos and composers; reproductions of famous paintings and a collection of choice vocal and instrumental music.

We have done what we could to care for all the perpetual care lots. Have righted up some of the stones that were leaning, and filled some lots that had settled. Trimmed all the perpetual care lots before Decoration Day and since then as they have needed, and put flowers on them Decoration Day. There was a bad washout on the road to the new cemetery last fall which we had to repair, and there is some more work that ought to be done on the paths and roads in the cemetery.

We would suggest that the town raise and appropriate one hundred dollars for this purpose.

One of the trustees, H. M. Livingston, who for the past twelve years has had most to do with the care of the cemetery, passed away, and for some time before that did more or less work in the cemetery.

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD OF GREENVILLE

Herewith I submit my second annual report as Superintendent of your schools:

At the beginning of the fall term the outlook for a successful year of work was bright, indeed, for again you started the year with a very capable corps of teachers. The ranks, however, were no longer intact, for Mrs. Nellie Hannant left us during the winter term of last year. We regretted her departure much; however, we were fortunate in being able to have Mrs. Blanchard finish out the year in her stead. This year has seen another change. Miss Mildred Russell, who, for several years has been a very successful teacher in the primary grades, has been advanced to the intermediate grades. Here too her worth is bearing fruit and no fear need be entertained of children not being thoroughly prepared for the work of the upper grades. Our new teacher is Miss Alice Wheeler, who, while less experienced than the other two, gives promise of holding the children up to the standard set in former years. A change was made this year in the number of grades in the primary room. Owing to the large enrollment in the first two grades, the third grade is included in the intermediate group. As the first year of school is probably the most important in the whole period of a child's education, the lightening of the burden in the primary room is proving beneficial. As usual Mrs. Tolman has a successful school. In the manner of drilling, in the ready response of children, in the general atmosphere of the room there is little chance for improvement. Greenville is indeed fortunate in its teachers and the district should not hesitate to raise a sufficient sum of money to pay them the market price and thus retain their services.

In my report of last year I called attention to the necessity for regular and prompt attendance at school. I am pleased to report a decided improvement in this respect. A glance at the table of attendance herewith appended coupled with the report of last year, shows that steady improvement has been made. The attendance for 1918-1919 was 86%; for 1919-1920, 88.74%; while for the first four months of the present year the average is 95%. May we keep up to the present high percentage which is well above the average for the state.

The program of studies for the seventh and eighth grades is much the same as outlined for last year. Such changes as have been made were designed to meet new conditions. Last year our eighth grade was composed for the most part of mature pupils who had previously graduated from the eighth grade. Consequently the demand for a foreign language was not only natural but proper. We find that the children this year being younger, have greater need for drill in English grammar and composition than for Latin. The primary purpose of the elementary school is of course to furnish a thorough grounding in the fundamentals. This does not mean, however, that such subjects as general science, cooking and sewing for the girls, and manual training for the boys should be neglected, for it is to children between the ages of twelve and fifteen that these subjects have the greatest appeal and should prove of the greatest value. With our present corps of teachers we may feel certain that our children will receive a thorough preparation for high school. Considerable progress has been made likewise in getting started the practical arts work. Mr. Nutting worked long enough with the boys last year to make with them substantial and business-like work benches. This was only a beginning, however, and it was a disappointment to us all that Mr. Nutting could not go on with the work this fall. After almost despairing of finding anyone, Mr. Robbins finally came to the rescue

and took charge of the class. There is every evidence at this time that worth-while work will be done during the remaining part of the year for Mr. Robbins is well qualified in experience and natural aptitude for the work.

The work with the girls in sewing and cooking has been less fortunate in its inception. This is due in part to the fact that little equipment has thus far been provided. It is time, I believe, to give more attention to the girls and an effort will be made during the rest of the year to extend the work. Co-operation on the part of the parents in supplying the girls with materials for sewing will be greatly appreciated. Our efforts will be confined to plain sewing, such as the making of simple garments, patching clothes and darning stockings. Noon lunches furnish an excellent opportunity for a practical application of the work in cooking. At least once a week a meal should be planned, prepared and served by girls of this class. Already the Red Cross has given valuable assistance by furnishing materials and supplies for the serving of hot cocoa to the children who bring their lunches. This has proven to be practical and is greatly appreciated. With a little more equipment the girls could prepare real meals.

Considerable impetus was given to the work of school gardening last summer by the offer of Mr. J. C. Taft of a garden plot down by the river for the use of the children. This was a most generous offer for not only was the land fertilized, but plowed and harrowed without expense to the children. The children entered into the work of gardening with a great deal of enthusiasm and that there was but one failure out of thirteen gardens bears evidence to the fact that the boys and girls stuck to their jobs. The value in an undertaking of this sort is two-fold. Not only do the children gain considerable practical knowledge in planning and carrying through a worth-while project, but it is a co-operative enterprise which tends to make better boys and girls and later better citi-

zens of the community. The value of the children's gardens in Mrs. Tolman's room was \$90. The exhibit of the Girls' Canning club at the district fair in Wilton elicited much favorable comment, while Nelson Blanch carried off the honors as the best all-round gardener. We hope to have at Greenville next fall an exhibit not only of garden produce but of all the school work.

As indicated in the report of last year the evening school was ushered in under most favorable circumstances. The beginners' classes, with one exception, were the most successful, due largely to the fact that those who could neither read nor write English felt the greatest need for instruction. The industry of all was commendable and much credit is due the teachers who brought their classes through to a successful conclusion. The last session was achievement night and forty-one men and women were awarded certificates. This year there has been a marked falling off in attendance, there being only two classes. These two classes are made up largely of those men and women who made a successful beginning last year. Miss Taft has one of these classes and Mrs. Blanchard the other. The men and women are making good progress and their attendance has held up very well. The Columbian Mfg. Company, through its agent, Mr. Ely, again offered to support an advanced class, but an earnest endeavor to organize such a class proved unsuccessful.

A summary of the report of the medical inspector, Dr. B. D. Pease, covering both parochial and public schools, is as follows: Whole number of children examined, 261; defective vision, 5; defective hearing, 1; anemia, 4; nervous disease, 1; pulmonary, 1; skin disease, 4; pediculosis, 34; defective teeth, 160; hypertrophied tonsils, 95; adenoids, 11; enlarged glands, 1; unvaccinated, 78; other diseases or defects, 3; number instances defects remedied since last examination, 28; number instances treatment secured since last examination, 26; mentally deficient, 10. It is noteworthy that in the public school 26 defects have

been remedied since the last examination. Also Dr. Pease reports that since the last examination all children in the parochial school have been vaccinated.

It is very encouraging that so many of our boys and girls are now attending some high school. Of last year's graduating class five are now enrolled in Appleton Academy and let us hope that there will be nearly as many to go this year.

My work as superintendent in Greenville has been a pleasure to me. I owe much to the co-operation of the teachers, townspeople and school committee and wish to express my appreciation of their support.

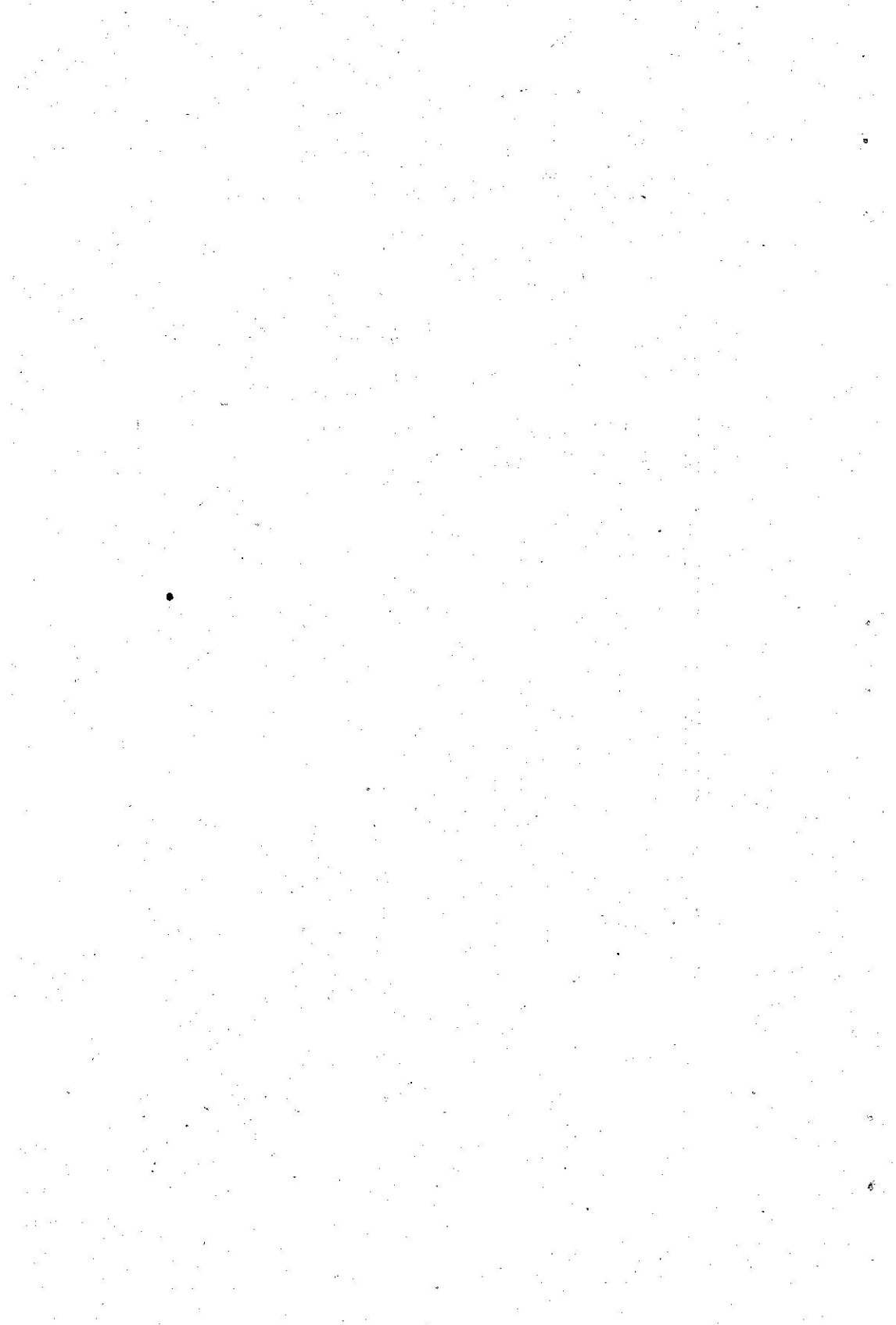

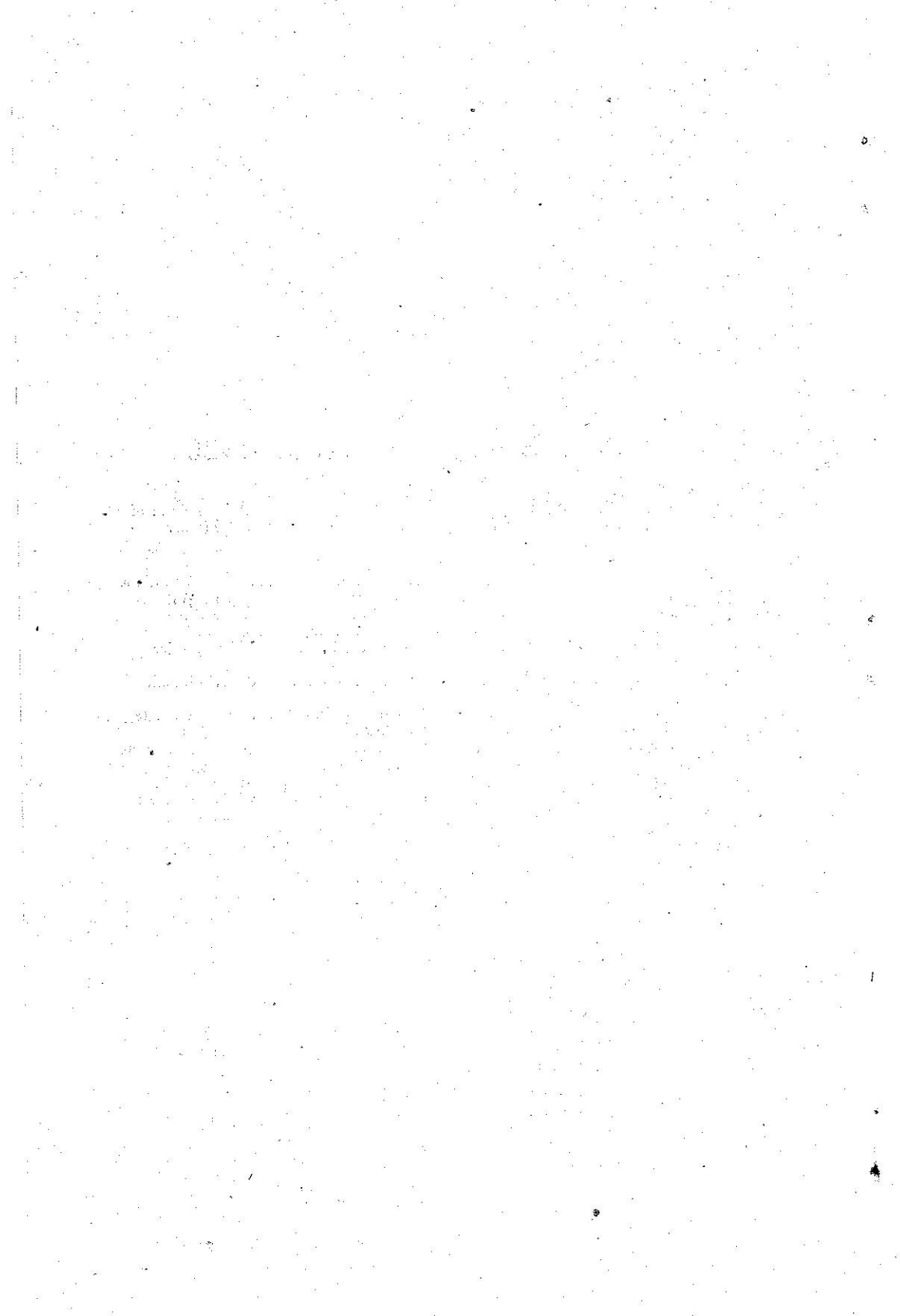
