#### REPORT OF THE CEMETERY TRUSTEES

We went over the cemetery in the spring and found quite a number of the stones on the perpetual care lots that were leaning and in poor condition. These we have straightened up, and a good many of the lots have been leveled up, fertilized and resowed with good seed. During the past year we spent more money than usual, but the cemetery has looked a great deal better. We also put flowers on all perpetual care lots on Decoration Day.

The town voted us \$100.00 at the last town meeting, which we used to repair the washout on the road between the cemeteries, and grading and cleaning the paths in the old cemetery. There is \$29.00 left, which we shall use as we need it.

There are quite a number of lots that people, who are not in town now, have left nothing to care for them, some of which are in poor condition, but we cannot improve these lots without funds. These lots spoil the looks of the cemetery to some extent. Some people have left only \$50.00, which is hardly enough to keep the lots as they should be and put flowers upon them on Decoration Day. We recommend that all who leave money for the care of lots leave at least \$100.00, so that the lots may be cared for properly.

#### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of Greenville:

We herewith submit the following report:

The School Boards of the Supervisory District met at the schoolhouse on May 9. H. P. Upham, as Chairman; Mrs. Hatch, of Wilton, as Secretary, and A. B. Eaton, of Mason, as Treasurer, were again re-elected. R. P. Currier was re-elected as Superintendent.

Graduating exercises were held at the school building on June 17. The class members were: Priscilla V. Glidden, Chester L. Farrar, Beatrice A. Newell, James R. Wells and Zotique P. Bernier. A very cerditable and enjoyable program was given, the class being ably assisted in music by other members of the school. Diplomas were awarded by Superintendent Currier.

The Board felt that they were fortunate in keeping Mrs. Alice Tolman as principal; Miss Mildred Russell, in the intermediate room, and Miss Emma F. Southwick as music supervisor for the year beginning September 5.

Miss Alice Wheeler having resigned, the position in the primary room was filled by Miss Sybil J. Green of Shelburne, Vt.

William H. Doonan, school census enumerator, reported as follows: Total number of children between the ages of 5-16, 303; boys 153, girls 150.

In co-operation with the Red Cross, cocoa has again been served to the pupils remaining at noon during the winter term, the teachers kindly taking upon themselves that responsibility.

Schools were closed one day on account of bad traveling. The regular holidays have been observed and the teachers have attended two institutes.

The work of the dental clinic is highly spoken of in the report of Superintendent Currier. In addition, the Board wishes to express their appreciation of its value, and also for the time and effort given to it so freely by Mrs. Ely and Mrs. Leedham. The work was taken up at the Sacred Heart school, where 225 children were examined, 110 having treatment. Thanks are due Miss Albina R. Fortin and Jeanne Pelletier, who acted as assistants for Dr. Danforth.

#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

...

To the School Board of Greenville:

Herewith I submit the third annual report as Superintendent of your schools:

School attendance is one of the best indications of the general condition of a school. If pupils are very much interested in their school work they will accept no excuse for absence except sickness. The very high percentage of attendance record for last year, therefore, is a fair measure of the successful work which is being done in the schools. A glance at the attendance table appended to this report shows that the general average for the three schools last year was 95% which is a gain of 6.26% over the average for the preceding year. While the attendance thus far this year has been good yet the mumps has caused considerable necessary absence.

The general excellence of the work being done in the schools may be attributed very largely to the influence of your two veteran teachers, Mrs. Tolman and Miss Russell. This comment is made with no idea of disparaging the results secured in the primary room by Miss Sybil Green, who has come to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation last June of Miss Alice Wheeler. Miss Green, though inexperienced, is fast acquiring the art of teaching, and under her sympathetic guidance the children are making very satisfactory progress. While few new books have been purchased this year, yet the new geographies provided for the fifth grade have met with the enthusiastic approval of

both pupils and teacher. The work in general in the intermediate grades is of a high order, yet the attainments in arithmetic are especially noteworthy, the pupils being about a grade in advance of the Sate Outline in arithmetic. In the grammar school room the atmosphere for either work or play is ideal. Mrs. Tolman has an unusually industrious group of boys and girls who are making good progress in their work. Perhaps I should mention in particular the improvement noticeable in penmanship. Woodworking has been temporarily discontinued owing to the scarcity of boys in the upper The work will be resumed next year. Under the able supervision of Miss Southwick, the ability to read music and singing have developed to a point rarely attained in graded schools. Through you I wish to invite the public to come into the schools on any regular school day and enjoy a good sing with the pupils.

In accordance with the provisions of the school law an attempt was made last fall to organize an evening school. A night was set for registration of pupils the meeting being duly advertised in advance. As but three people reported for registration it was deemed inadvisable to organize a class.

Following is a summary of the report of Dr. Pease, the medical examiner for both public and parochial schools: Number of pupils examined 261, teachers 3. Number of cases found of malnutrition 2, defective vision 15, anæmia 2, nervous disease 2, cardiac disease 2, skin disease 3, defective teeth 124, hypertrophied tonsils 69, unvaccinated 48, other diseases 4. Number of instances of treatment secured since last examination 28.

As the report shows the crying need was for the correction of defects in children's teeth. The work

of the dental clinic, organized by the Hillsboro County Farm Bureau and supported locally by funds provided by the Red Cross has become a matter of history. Out of a total enrollment of 68 pupils in the public schools, 59 secured treatment at the clinic. This work was done, not only at a great convenience to the pupils, but at a considerable saving in expense to parents. As a means to the promotion of better health the benefits are incalculable. Much credit is due the Red Cross and its officers for making the clinic a reality in Greenville. Especially do we appreciate the services rendered by Mrs. Ely and Mrs. Leedham in connection with the work of the clinic at the school building.

During the present year fifteen pupils, graduates of either public or parochial schools of Greenville, have been enrolled in Appleton Academy. It is likely that next year this number will be increased. While this means a large tuition item in the budget, yet no better investment can be made of public funds than that used for the higher education of the young people.

In conclusion may I express my appreciation for the support accorded me by citizens, teachers and School Board.
