REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of Greenville:

We herewith submit the following report:

On May 25 the School Boards of the Supervisory District met at Appleton Academy. H. P. Upham was re-elected as Chairman; Mrs. Hatch, of Wilton, as Secretary, and A. B. Eaton, of Mason, as Treasurer. R. P. Currier, who had served the district most faithfully for four years, sent in his resignation and Vernon S. Ames, of Marlboro, N. H., was elected to fill the vacancy.

Graduating exercises were held in the grammar room on June 22. The members of the class were E. Lorraine Blake, Nelson D. Blanch, Kenneth C. Doonan, Lena H. Glidden, Mary I. Gedenberg, Mary D. Lacroix and Hazel I. Russell. A good program was presented with the school ably assisting in the music. Diplomas were awarded by Superintendent Currier.

The school year opened September 10 with the teachers as noted in the Superintendent's report, Mrs. Alice B. Tolman having been granted a year's leave of absence. Mrs. Southwich again took charge of the music, although not making her usual weekly visits. Manual training, under Mr. Robbins, has been continued satisfactorily.

The dental clinic, under the supervision of the Red Cross, began its work in January. Not all the pupils took advantage of it, but many were glad of the opportunity and the work of the Red Cross is much appreciated.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenville:

My first annual report as Superintendent of Schools in this district will necessarily be brief because of my short acquaintance with your school system. First, let me pay tribute to my predecessor, Mr. Currier, for the splendid organization of school affairs throughout the district, which has made it possible for me to take over the work at such decided advantage.

Program of Studies

In the first six grades we are following the program of studies recommended by the State Board of Education, which is in almost universal use throughout the state. A similar program is in preparation at the state office for grades seven and eight and we can take advantage of some of the material which has already been prepared for the program to strengthen the work of those two grades in preparation for high school.

The Teaching Staff

Only one of your three teachers of last year has remained for this year. In Miss Russell you have an experienced and efficient teacher and principal. For the grammar school we secured Miss Altha M. Walker, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School, with one year of experience, and well qualified for the upper grade work. For the primary school Miss

Edna Wright has had one year of training at a normal school in Massachusetts, but no experience. She is gaining in ability and experience and the work of the first two grades is proving quite satisfactory.

Good schools depend more upon good teachers than upon any other factor or perhaps all other factors combined. Good teachers command good salaries and women teachers in the elementary schools throughout New Hampshire last year received on the average, a bit over \$900 per year. Salaries in the states south of us are considerably higher than that. We must expect to pay good salaries to secure and keep good teachers.

School Progress

From observation of the work in the school-rooms I believe that normal progress or better is being made. This, however, is a general statement and mere observation is not a reliable means of measuring the efficiency of instruction. Such a measure is possible through judicious use of standard tests. A series of tests in all the elementary schools was given in October, similar to those given last year, in silent reading, language, handwriting, spelling and arithmetic. Individual record sheets have been prepared and class averages are also kept. The tests given have been used extensively in other school systems so that fairly accurate standards for comparison are available. It is not yet time to give a detailed account of the results, for a series of such tests is necessary to make a fair summary, either of class scores or of individual records. The tests will be repeated in May and we plan to have them given twice each year. The results will be-

come more and more valuable as time goes on. The purpose is, of course, not only to measure progress, but to point out defects and to suggest remedies where defects are found. Considerable emphasis is being given this year to oral reading and handwriting, following along the same general lines as previous years. Adequate text books are in use in practically all of the subjects, but we need a better series of texts in language and grammar and a greater variety of reading material.

Last November uniform tests in arithmetic and spelling were given throughout New Hampshire. The spelling test was one in which a number of city eighth grades had averaged about 74%. The average in all New Hampshire eighth grades was 67.42%. This test was given in the Greenville seventh grade, since there was only one pupil in the eighth, and the average score was 65%. The arithmetic test was one that was given in Springfield, Massachusetts, in 1846, to first year high school pupils and the average rank was 29.41%. New Hampshire eighth grades averaged on the same test 49.29%, and the Greenville seventh grade average was 44.8%.

Attendance

Monthly reports of absence and tardiness are required from all teachers in the district and the percent of attendance in every school is published in all of the other schools. This has a tendency to stimulate better attendance. From the table of statistics following this report you will see that last year the average was about 3% lower than the average for the state, and for the first twelve weeks of this school year the average is about 2% higher than the state average.

It is coming to be generally understood that absences are not excusable for any other cause than sickness, and that tardiness is not necessary at any time.

Health Work

The regular medical inspection of all pupils attending school was made early in the fall by the school physician, Dr. Pease, assisted by the local nurse, Miss Morris. In the public school 65 pupils were examined and the following defects found: Defective vision 4, defective teeth 24, adenoids 1, pediculosis 4, enlarged tonsils 7, unvaccinated without proper excuse 3. Number of treatments recorded since the previous examination 23.

In the parochial school 231 pupils were examined and the following defects found: Malnutrition 1, pediculosis 13, enlarged tonsils 42, defective vision 3, defective teeth 104, orthopedic defect 1, unvaccinated without proper excuse 47. Number of treatments recorded since the previous examination 67.

The work of the dental clinic is of very great importance in the treatment of children's teeth and should be continued from year to year.

The sanitary arrangement of the school building is very good, particularly the lighting and ventilation. Some repairs need to be made next summer in the basement and perhaps some changes to improve the condition of the toilets.

Public Interest

The work of the schools is brought to public notice by exercises which the children give in connection with community meetings and in other ways. This does not necessarily reveal the quality of the class-room work, however, and personal visiting by

the parents is always to be urged. The more completely parents know and appreciate the actual work of the pupils in class the better it is for both parents and school.

General School Progress

The State Board of Education has just issued a pamphlet entitled "School Progress in New Hampshire in Five Years," which I wish it were possible to reproduce here. Those interested may secure copies by writing to the State Board of Education. Here are just a few of the outstanding items:

The number of schools in the state having less than thirty-six weeks in the school year has been reduced from 924 in 1919 to 12 in 1923. This means that in the poor towns the period of elementary education has been increased from six and two-thirds years to eight full years. High school enrollment has increased from 12,087 in 1919, to 17,023 in 1923. The enrollment in the normal schools has increased from 290 in 1919, to 617 this year.

The percent of fully trained teachers has increased from 32% of the whole in 1919 to 42% in 1923. The gain in partly trained teachers is from 32% to 46%, and the untrained teachers have been reduced from 34% to 12%. We are getting rid of the transient teacher, for in 1919, 540 changed positions during the year, but in 1923 only 187. Medical inspection was available for only 34% of the children in 1919; now it is provided for 100%. The number of unsuitable buildings in use has been reduced from 500 to 85. It is estimated that the gain for rural schools in poor towns has been from about 40% efficiency up to about 70% efficiency. This has been accomplished at an additional cost to the tax-

payer of only 64 cents a year for each thousand dollars of his assessed property.

The loyalty and efficiency of the teachers, the sympathetic and earnest guidance of the School Board, and the manifest support of the townspeople are greatly appreciated; it is a delight to serve in such conditions as these.
