REPORT OF SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenville:

I submit my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

SCHOOL ORGANIZATION

As there was no eighth grade in the school last year the arrangement of grades had to be shifted this Fall so as to make a fair division of pupils among the three teachers. The seventh and eighth grades are in charge of Mrs. Tolman, whose return to her position in the public school is pleasing to all, and whose work with these two grades is excellent. Grades four, five and six were assigned to Miss Russell, who has held this position so acceptably for several years. Grades one, two and three were assigned to the new teacher, Miss Ruth E. Brooks, who was graduated from the Fitchburg Normal School last June, and therefore comes without previous experience. She is doing good work and the children are making reasonable progress. The spirit of the teachers is harmonious and the school is in good working condition. The attendance this year has not been quite so good as for the same period last year. This has been due in part to sickness, but also in no small part to unnecessary absence on account of parents keeping their children out to work. It must be understood that such absence is illegal and that tardiness for the same reason is illegal.

In addition to the regular teachers and the music and manual training teachers you had last year, a special teacher of drawing has been employed, Miss

Regina McNally, of North Chelmsford, Massachusetts, who has had several years of experience in this work.

Recently we have made some changes in the plan of supervision of the recess and noon periods, shortening the noon period to one and one-fourth hours and providing some pleasing activities for the children under proper supervision. This has improved the spirit of the school, and the handling of the pupils who have to stay during the noon hour is rendered less difficult for the teachers and much more profitable for the children.

SUPERVISION

The chief function of the Superintendent of Schools is, of course, to supervise the work of the teachers, and this is accomplished chiefly in two ways—by visits to the teachers at work, and by means of standard tests. The statistical report which follows shows a total of 51 supervisory visits during the school year, or an average of 17 visits per teacher. It would be desirable if this average could be increased, but a large proportion of the Superintendent's time is necessarily taken up with administrative duties. During the past school year about 42% of my time was devoted to school visiting; about 38% to office work, which included the study of standard tests referred to above; about 13% to other administrative duties within the Supervisory Union, and about 7% to administrative duties that took me away from the Union.

The same standard tests have been used this year as last year, and cover the subjects of arithmetic, reading, spelling, writing and language. Detailed study of the results enables the supervisor to know with considerable accuracy the quality of

teaching being done, and enables him to make suggestions to the teachers on the basis of definite facts. For example, a set of language tests was recently given in grades seven and eight, and definite recommendations and directions were given to the teachers on the basis of the results of these tests.

MEDICAL INSPECTION

The annual medical inspection was conducted October 6 by Dr. Pease in both the public and parochial schools. The results in the public school were as follows:

The three pupils not vaccinated were reported to have legal exemption.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The improvements in the basement of the school building during the summer vacation have greatly improved the sanitary conditions so that they are now satisfactory. The only large item of repair now known is the roof, which will require shingling next summer. Specific provision should be made for this in the budget. I have no special recommendations to make at this time. The usual tables of statistics follow this report.

Let me again express my appreciation of the help and support of the School Board and the loyal and efficient work the teachers are doing day by day.


