REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of Greenville:

We herewith submit the following report:

The school year 1925-'26 was shortened on account of the scarlet fever epidemic. The regular spring vacation was not given, so that some of the time lost might be made up. During the period of quarantine, the building was thoroughly cleaned and fumigated.

Cooperating with the Red Cross Society, a course in Mother Craft was given the seventh and eighth grade girls under the direction of Miss Harriett Morris and Mrs. Bertha Ely. The Red Cross has again furnished hot cocoa to pupils who bring their lunches.

At the meeting of the School Boards of the Supervisory District, held in our building in May, George Jaquith of New Ipswich was elected as Chairman; Sadie Holt of Temple, Secretary; and A. B. Eaton of Mason, Treasurer. Mr. Vernon S. Ames was reelected as Superintendent.

In cooperation with the other towns in the district, Greenville secured the services of Blanche Bowden as Music Supervisor. Miss Bowden comes weekly and we are fortunate to secure so enthusiastic a worker and competent teacher.

On June twenty-fourth, a pleasing program was presented by the graduating class. Supt. Ames presented diplomas to six pupils—Marcells T. Frost, Ralph D. Kimball, Florence L. Robbins, Leon E. Russell, Gertrude M. Sawyer, and R. Evelyn Wells.

Miss Elsie Wheeler assisted with the music. Work done by the pupils in their classrooms, in Manual Training and Sewing was displayed in the various rooms. During the present term, work in the Primary room is seriously handicapped on account of the prevalence of whooping cough.

The teachers attended the State Institute in Manchester.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenville:

I submit my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

SCHOOL ORGANIZATION :

The Grammar School Room this year has the same teacher as last year, Miss Dorothy Davis. For the Intermediate Room we engaged Miss Alice E. Cuddihy, a teacher of several years experience, and for the Primary Room Miss Emma Oliver, who has had four years experience with three summer school sessions and one full year at Keene Normal School. The music is being taught by Miss Blanche Bowden, a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music last June. We have a good corps of teachers and good progress is being made. The total enrollment in the Public School is 62 as compared with 69 last year and 73 the previous year. The percent of attendance last year was practically the same as the year before and slightly lower than the state average. Tardiness has decreased somewhat but is still more than double the state average.

MEDICAL INSPECTION

The medical inspection was made by Dr. Pease in October as usual in both Public and Parochial Schools. His report shows the following:

No report was made of the number of treatments since the previous examination.

FINANCES

The budget for 1927-'28 differs from that of the previous year in only a few items. Fuel will cost less because we are using a cheaper grade with the new blower attachment to the furnace. The estimate for minor repairs is not reduced from last year because the ceiling in the Primary Room will have to be replaced. The estimate for elementary school tuitions is increased because there are several more pupils attending the Mason Number Six School. The estimate for new equipment is reduced because the estimate last year covered the purchase of the blower. These changes, with other minor changes, reduce the total amount needed by nearly \$300.00.

SUPERVISION

The statistical report following shows 63 supervisory visits made during the year as compared with 76 the previous year. Not all of the supervisory work is done in actual school room visits but considerable is done by means of standard tests. The results of a series of standard tests and remedial teaching in language errors carried on last year illustrates what we are trying to do by this means. The test was given in October 1925 to all fourth grade children. Specific suggestions were given the teachers for remedial teaching and the test repeated in December. After another period of remedial teaching, a test was given in March and again in May. Following the summer vacation and a period without specific instruction on these particular errors, the test was given again in November 1926. The table below shows the percentage of all the fourth grade children in the district who scored A, B, C, D,

and E. In each test the gain was steady throughout the period of teaching and was permanent as indicated by the test given six months later.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

The purpose of the revision of the School Laws in 1919 was to equalize school opportunities. School attendance is only one aspect of this problem but it is an important one. Schools are required to be open at least thirty-six weeks each year and in the school year 1925-'26 no school in the state fell short of this requirement. However, the actual time schools were in session in the 252 cities and towns varied from 328 to 368 half days. 'Schools were in session 351 or more half days in 48 cities and towns, but 16 of these have 37 or 38 weeks instead of 36. At the other extreme were 40 towns with from 328 to 340 half days. The remaining 164 towns varied from 341 to 350 half days of school out of a possible 360. The six towns in this Supervisory Union were in this middle group. The average in Greenville was 350.

I proposed to the teachers at the opening of schools last fall that all days lost on account of sickness, weather conditions, etc., during this school year should be made up so that we might be sure of at least 350 half days actually in session. In many cases we hope to exceed that number. Some School Boards are now making contracts with their teachers calling for 360 half days with allowance for Teachers' Institutes only. This is one way to increase school opportunities without increasing the cost.

CHARACTER EDUCATION

This section is based on a Chapter in the Biennial Report of the State Board of Education, just published.

We have read and heard much discussion in the past few years on the prevalence of lawlessness and immorality. This has always been so, for every generation believes that young people are more thoughtless and less law abiding than formerly. So called "crime waves" have swept our country from time to time but there is nothing to indicate that they have affected the young people in any greater proportion than adults. On the other hand it is a matter of record that the number of misdemeanors and petry infractions of the law by children has decreased year by year. Exact comparison is difficult but I am convinced that, if we could make an accurate comparison of the children of today with those of say fifty or one hundred years ago as to their behavior in school, on the street, or elsewhere, such comparison would be very favorable to the present generation.

Professor Bagley of Columbia University has attempted to determine the relative standing of the states of the Union as to morality and has reported the following tests:

- 1. He finds that in the list of 48 states New Hampshire stands second (being surpassed only by Vermont) in having the smallest proportion of its population committed to the federal penitentiaries.
- 2. New Hampshire stands first in the list in having the smallest proportion of its resident population committed to state prisons.
- 3. New Hampshire stands first in the list in having the smallest ratio of homicides to the population.
- 4. New Hampshire stands third in the list (being surpassed only by New York and Nevada) in having the smallest proportion of drafted soldiers free from social diseases at the time of registration. Many other comparisons might be suggested but so far as I know have not been accurately investigated.

Some people, disturbed by what they believe to be an unusual laxity in morals, have insisted that the remedy lies in the introduction of religion into the schools. There has never been a law in New Hampshire requiring instruction in religion or the use of the Bible in the schools. But by common custom some part of the school day in practically every school in the state has been devoted to exercises of a devotional character, including the use of the great psalms and prayers and daily reading from the Bible. There is no doubt that these exercises are valuable in the development of character and they should be continued as one of the means by which the schools can encourage good behavior, but we must always guard against the use of any material that favors any one religious belief or creed above another.

As a matter of fact an increasing amount of attention is given in our public schools to definite instruction in the civic and personal virtues. Many outlines have been prepared and used for this purpose, and a new and more comprehensive program in character education has just been prepared by a committee of experienced public school teachers in this state, which is about to be placed in the hands of the teachers.

However effectively the principles of character may be imparted by direct instruction we recognize that much, if not more, depends upon the children's conscious or unconscious imitation of parents, teachers and associates. In the selection of teachers high moral character is a prime consideration. No teacher can be certified to teach in New Hampshire until her character is vouched for by dependable people, and her certificate may be cancelled at any time for immorality.

"Character depends upon ideals, but in its expression it is shown by daily reactions and habits. Our schools inculcate character by daily routine and effective administration, by insistance on regular and punctual attendance, upon diligence and an attitude of respect, by arithmetic and history, and organized play in which the teachers and pupils work together." In closing I wish to express appreciation of the loyal cooperation and support of the teachers, members of the School Board, and citizens.
