

# REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of Greenville:

We herewith submit the following report:

The School Boards of the Supervisory District met at the school house in May. Mr. Abbott of Wilton was elected chairman and V. S. Ames unanimously re-elected as Superintendent.

The schools opened September fourth with no changes in the teaching force. We felt much gratified to be able to retain our efficient corps of teachers. Miss Blanche Bowden has continued as music supervisor, not only instructing in the technique but in the true appreciation of music. The boys have enjoyed their manual training under Mr. Robbins' able direction.

The teachers attended one institute and no days have been lost on account of inclement weather. The eight week system has worked out very favorably in every way. More whole days attendance are given as the vacations include the holidays.

Fifteen pupils are attending High School, and this makes it necessary to provide a large appropriation for this purpose.

In co-operation with the Red Cross, hot cocoa is furnished during the cold weather for pupils who stay at noon.

# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenville:

I submit my sixth annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

#### SCHOOL ORGANIZATION

Greenville has been fortunate in retaining the services of the full teaching staff of last year. Their work is very commendable and the progress of the schools is satisfactory.

The total enrollment for this year is slightly less than that of last year, but 15 pupils left during the year 1927-1928 and so far this year only three have left. The percent of attendance was high through the fall but has fallen since the Christmas vacation because of sickness. Tardiness dropped from an average of 3.5 the previous year to 1.03 last year, the state average being 1.04, and the lower figure has been maintained this year so far.

For two or three years the two state normal schools have trained a sufficient number of new teachers in the two-year courses to fill the vacancies occurring in the elementary grade and rural schools, and enough more in the three-year courses to supply the demands of junior high schools, with a surplus each year large enough to provide a healthy competition.

There is still an inadequate supply of new teachers trained for senior high school positions. About 150 such teachers were needed in the state this year. The University of New Hampshire supplied about 35 of these, and the normal schools for the first time graduated classes in the four-year courses, providing 17 high school teachers. The balance was drawn from other states and was made up of teachers with brief experience and of inexperienced college graduates, in nearly equal numbers.

#### **SUPERVISION**

The statistical report shows 68 supervisory visits during the year as compared with 69 the preceding year. I have been able so far this year to use a larger proportion of my time for school room visits. A small part of the visiting time and a considerable part of the time required for office work is occupied with the testing program, which includes oral reading tests in the first three grades, silent reading tests in the middle grades, and the Stanford Achievement Tests in reading, arithmetic, language, spelling, science, and history. The Stanford Tests were given in October and May last year and in January, 1929.

The results for the three series of tests throughout the supervisory district were tabulated and compared with the published standards for a general comparison. Then pupils who stood particularly low were noted, and the teachers were advised as to which ones needed special attention and in what subjects. The series of three tests indicate a general advance and the January tests show all of the grades to be up to standard and some as much as 12% above standard. This is a general statement for the whole district and does not mean that every grade in every school is above standard.

Last October a standardized test in silent reading was given throughout the district in grades four to nine, and the results were handled in the same manner as indicated for the Stanford Achievement Tests above. The test was given in order to have a more accurate measure of the reading abilities of these grades than we had at the time I discussed the silent reading program in my last annual report. It was the first attempt at a comprehensive measuring of silent reading abilities so no comparison can be made that will show the amount of gain or loss. Results showed that all the grades tested were somewhat below standard. They provide a basis for determining what remedial work is required for the pupils or grades who were found to be especially low, and also a basis for comparison when the test is repeated later in the year.
