#### REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of Greenville:

We herewith submit the following report:

Shortly after the opening of the fall term, the boiler at the school gave out and it became necessary to replace it at an expense of \$800, a sum not provided for in the budget of last year and accounting for this amount in the special article in this year's budget.

Greenville has 27 students in High School this year. Sixteen pupils are enrolled at Appleton Academy, six at Peterborough High, four at Milford High and one at Groton High. A larger number must be provided for in the future. The estimate for High School tuitions was \$200. short in last year's budget. This amount is included in the special article. Appleton Academy has given notice of an increase in tuition to \$90. per pupil, beginning with the next Fall term.

On account of the convenience of transportation facilities, one student selected Groton High School. A temporary contract, approved by the State Board of Education, has been made with the School Board of Groton, subject to the approval of the District at the annual meeting.

#### Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenville:

I submit my eighth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

#### SCHOOL ORGANIZATION

After four years without change in teaching staff we have suffered the loss of both Miss Davis and Miss Oliver. In their places we secured two experienced teachers, both being graduates of Keene Normal School and each has taught for two years in New Hampshire schools. Miss Lucy J. Morgan is the new teacher for grades six, seven and eight, and Miss Neta Sweet has the three primary grades. We have returned to the former plan of employing a music supervisor jointly with the other five towns of the Supervisory Union and engaged for this work Miss Anna G. Smith who was graduated last June from the three-year music supervisory course at Keene Normal School.

The statistical tables following this report show slight changes in school enrollment and improvement in the regularity of attendance and a very decided improvement in tardiness.

#### **SUPERVISION**

The testing program described in my last two annual reports has been conducted along the same lines. In addition to this the teachers are using standard tests and informal tests as checks upon their own work to an increasing extent. These teachers' tests serve two purposes. They give the teacher definite data with which to check her own record

of daily work on which to base the periodical reports of each pupil's standing to the parents. They also indicate to the teacher those items of her teaching which need further emphasis or re-teaching.

#### PROGRAM OF STUDIES

The Program of Studies for Grades One to Six in the elementary schools was revised during the year 1930 by committees of Superintendents and teachers in the state and edited by the staff of the State Board of Education. This was a very complete revision and makes up a book of nearly five-hundred pages covering all of the subjects taught these grades in considerable detail. A chapter is devoted to each subject stating the objectives, describing teaching processes, and outlining the subject matter in minute detail for the guidance of the teachers.

The most extensive revision was in the subject of arithmetic and conforms to the conclusions of common practice and of research in the teaching of arithmetic. The chief departure from the former program is in making first grade arithmetic incidental rather than formal, that is, no definite attempt is to be made in the first grade to teach the combinations in either addition or multiplication.

The chapter on reading has been enlarged and extended with very definite and helpful suggestions for the teaching of silent reading throughout grades four, five and six. The chapters on drawing and music have been made very concrete and definite. The same is true of the chapters devoted to health and physical education. There are also two chapters on the special problems of the rural school.

#### CONCLUSION

It is pleasing to note the increasing number of pupils seeking further education beyond that provided in the public and parochial schools. We anticipate this increase to continue and estimate that there will be thirty-two Greenville pupils attending High School or Academy next year.

I find the work of our schools excellent and attribute this not only to the quality of the teachers, but to the interest and support of the School Board and citizens of the town.
