TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Sacred Heart Church hall on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, between the hours of ten of the clock in the forenoon and five of the clock in the afternoon, then and there to bring in your ballots for the following town officers:

Town clerk for one year; town treasurer for one year; one selectman for three years; tax collector for one year; highway agent for one year; water commissioner for three years; cemetery trustee for three years; library trustee for three years; library trustee for one year; two auditors for one year; three fire wards for one year; sexton for one year.

Also to bring in your votes for the election of Delegates-atlarge; Alternate Delegates-at-large; District Delegates; Alternate District Delegates, to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican Parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.

Also to vote upon the following question: Do you favor having the Greenville representative to the General Court introduce and vote for a bill legalizing daylight saving time, so-called, in New Hampshire?

The polls will close at five o'clock.

And at eight of the clock in the afternoon of the same day at the same place to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary officers not chosen by the Australian ballot.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

- Article 3. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and town treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any action thereon.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of the municipal budget act.
- Article 6. To see if the town will elect an overseer of the poor, or leave that appointment to the board of selectmen, and say how much salary may be paid to such officer, or take any action thereon.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to ratify an agreement made April 10th, 1935 by the selectmen, between the Town and the Greenville Electric Lighting Company for street lighting service, and the sale by the town to the company of its interest in certain poles and street lighting fixtures.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to accept from the estate of the late Margaret Felch of this town, the sum of \$100.00, the income from same to be used for the perpetual care of the Leonard Felch lot, and say what disposition shall be made of this money or take any action thereon.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to give the selectmen authority to spend this year on the project for which it was originally appropriated the sum of \$500.00 which was raised and appropriated at the last annual town meeting for the purpose of repairing the sidewalk on Temple street, or take any action thereon.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to give the selectmen authority to spend this year on the project for which it was originally appropriated the sum of \$1,000.00 which was raised and appropriated at the last annual town meeting for the purpose of repairing the saw-mill bridge, so-called, or take any action thereon.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to insure employees of the highway department, and firemen, and for other liability insurance, or take any action thereon.

- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to relinquish all claim to an old, abandoned school house situated on the road leading from the Fitchburg road to the town of Mason, or take any action thereon.
- Article 13. To see if the town will take some action relative to securing a more equitable distribution of employment upon the town highways, both summer and winter, to the end that the relief load may be lessened thereby, or take any action thereon.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to pay the highway agent a stated salary per year and say how much that salary shall be.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to rent the town hall on Thanksgiving afternoon in rotation among the various organizations of the town who may desire to use the same and make known this fact, or take any other action thereon.
- Article 16. To see if the town will vote to close a piece of road leading from the Perley Hale farm, so-called, to the Greenville-Mason highway, and to accept from Honore Rousseau, the present owner of the Hale farm, a new stretch of road that will meet all requirements of travel at this point, or take any action thereon.
- Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$201.36, the state to contribute \$805.46, these amounts to be used jointly as an emergency relief fund, and to be spent upon the Class V highways, so-called, or...will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,804.00, the state to contribute a like amount, the money to be used jointly as a state aid construction fund, and must be spent upon the Happy Hollow road, so-called, starting near the farm of J. Willard Buttrick, or take any action thereon.
- Article 18. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of enlarging the source of water supply at the pumping station, providing the Federal Works Progress Administration will contribute four times the amount raised and appropriated by the town, or take any action thereon.
- Article 19. To see if the town will vote to give a rebate on taxes paid on or before a certain date to be decided upon at this meeting, or take any action thereon.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars for advertising the town through the Monadnock Region Association, or take any action thereon.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the use of the fire department in addition to the amount called for in the budget, or take any action thereon.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars to extend the hydrant pipe system on River street, assistance in this project to be applied for to the Works Progress Administration, or take any action thereon.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to instruct the town treasurer to deposit town funds in New Hampshire Institutions.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to grant the Henry J. Leclair Post of the American Legion and its Auxiliary, the free use of the small hall situated on the ground floor in the north end of the remodelled Town House, or take any action thereon.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds, or take any action thereon.

Article 26. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Report of Overseer of Poor

Relief is the one thought uppermost in the minds of the people today, especially those who must pay the bills and those who are honestly in need. And well it might be when one learns that approximately 23 cents out of every dollar raised by direct taxation in Greenville in 1935 went for relief. Just how much further we must go in this matter is problematical, but we might as well now reconcile ourselves to the fact that relief on a large scale is with us to remain for quite some time.

As overseer it has been my duty to see that no one went hungry or cold, and that no undue load should be saddled upon the already over-burdened taxpayer. In this I feel that I have been unusually successful.

There are two kinds of people receiving relief—those who honestly need help and those who are making it a "racket." Where to draw the line is a very difficult matter especially when there are children in the family. That I have failed in some cases goes without saying.

I am proud, however, of the fact that only one complaint was registered against my administration with the Relief Officials at Concord. One woman who frequents that city in an official capacity is alleged to have told the state director that I was allowing sick people to suffer and others to starve. She asked for my removal and asserted that if she did not get satisfaction that she would report the matter to the Governor and Council.

They immediately sent an investigator to Greenville and learned that not only were the charges groundless, but that we were doing an unusually fine job of administering relief.

The voters should elect an overseer and not leave his appointment to the selectmen and he should be well paid. Few people realize that an overseer under present-day conditions has to do and does twice as much work as the selectmen are called upon to do, yet up to the present time very little has been paid for administration.

The two most expensive months from a relief standpoint were May and September and the least expensive June and October.

Over \$100.00 was saved the taxpayers in the month of October when the blacklist ruling was first put into force.

That the duties of the overseer will become heavier and more trying goes without saying, but I am happy to say in conclusion that my task during the past year has been made easier by the aid given me by Selectmen Pelletier and Boisvert, Highway Agent Chouinard, Mr. Williams of Blanchard and Son and the various overseers of the Otis Co., who made it a point to employ whenever possible those who were on the relief rolls and to these men I extend my thanks and appreciation.

Report of Firewards

During the past year the Department was called out by fire signal alarms as follows:

Feb. 7 Town House Building.

Aug. 8 Joseph Dancause property—fire on piazza.

Dec. 20 Brush fire on High Street river bank.

Dec. 25 Victor Martin, New Ipswich, chimney fire.

Dec. 29 Emerick Lamontagne, chimney fire.

There were about a dozen still alarms for chimney fires. There was little loss in any of the fires with the exception of the Town House Building, the details of which were covered in last year's

report.

The Fire Departments of Wilton, New Ipswich and Fitchburg Mass., declined any compensation for the assistance they gave at that fire and we thank them for their generosity. In the expense account of the Company will be found three items for cigars for those Departments. The signal alarm and hydrant system have been thoroughly serviced and tested, one new hydrant purchased and several repaired that were out of condition. Three extensions were purchased to elevate hydrants that were too low for convenient use.

We now have a spare hydrant for replacement in case of damage in operation or accidental breakage. The original hydrants installed in 1890 have been in use 45 years and doubtless will need repairs and replacements in the near future. Over 20 of the oldest hydrants are still in use. Separate items of expense in servicing the hydrant system will be found in the company's fiscal report.

We recommend the purchase of a 40 foot ladder and the extension of the water pipe line on River street a distance of 800

feet.

Report of Citizens' Electric Light Committee

APPOINTED AT TOWN MEETING MARCH 12, 1935

Your committee, in the performance of its duties, met once with Mr. J. C. Taft, the president of the Greenville Electric Lighting Co., and made two trips to Concord, where it attended hearings held by the Public Service Commission relative to the rates

charged by the company.

Mr. Taft stated before the Commission, the Board of Selectmen, and our committee that the company had been losing money for several years. The Commission conceded the company had to be allowed additional revenue. Facing this situation, it seemed hopeless to expect a general reduction in all rates. We therefore determined to direct our efforts towards a more equitable rate set-up, as it was very evident that some classes of service were paying too high rates while others were not paying their proportionate part of the company's income.

It appeared especially true that the customer who used electricity merely for home lighting purposes was paying much more

than his share.

When the hearings opened in Concord we found that the Public Service Commission's engineer had already made an exhaustive study of the situation here and had some definite pro-

posals to make.

In the first place, we learned that the Commission was determined that the two-meter system, whereby domestic consumers paid one rate for lighting and another (the 5 cent rate) for refrigeration, cooking etc., must come out and one rate paid for all such services. This is in line with the Commission's policy all over the state and we wish to make it clear that nothing we or the lighting company did or could do would change the attitude of the Commission.

It was shown by the records of the company that a great many of the domestic consumers were using only enough current to pay the minimum charge of \$1.00 per month. We were forced to agree that changes must be made to induce these customers to use more current. Proposals were made by the company that a minimum monthly charge of \$2.00 be allowed. We opposed this and finally compromised on \$1.50. A lowering of the rate to 12 cents per KWH gives the customer 12½ KWH for his \$1.50 instead of the 10 KWH under the old rate.

We submitted that the Town of New Ipswich had not been paying its share of the cost of service and all parties concerned agreed to an increase in the rates charged to that customer. However, this increase to New Ipswich is not as substantial as we desired.

Certain changes were made in methods of charging for the various commercial services. In assenting to these we were compelled to rely on the fairness of the Commission, as technical terms and factors were involved with which we were not familiar.

There was also a revision of the charge for street lighting, in which the Selectmen represented the town.

In general, we feel that the rate revisions give our townspeople the best deal that can be expected with all factors considered. Viewing the situation as a whole, our difficulty appears to be a lack of consumption. This is chiefly due to a shortage of commercial customers. Whether any such consumers of large amounts of current ever will be attracted is a matter of doubt. The company is prepared to sell much more electricity than it is at present called upon to deliver. There is some doubt as to the wisdom of the expansion of the company to its present capacity but the time to oppose such a move has long since passed. Now we can only hope that enough more customers may be obtained that the revenue will justify a further lowering of rates.

We do not feel that we accomplished much but we do feel that we did the best we could considering the situation we faced. Our work was done at no expense to the town.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenville:

I respectfully submit my thirteenth annual report as Super-intendent of Schools.

Supervision

While a considerable portion of a superintendent's time is occupied with administrative duties, his chief function is in the field of supervising the work of teachers and pupils. Supervision is accomplished in a variety of ways. By observation of the activities carried on in the school room during visits one gets a very good general impression of the standards of instruction and of the attitudes of the pupils toward the learning situation. The rate of progress in each grade and subject is checked by comparison of periodical reports from the teachers with certain standards of progress. The proficiency of the pupils in the skills they are acquiring and in the specific knowledge they are gaining is gauged by a series of standardized tests such as was outlined in the annual report a year ago. Another helpful source of information is contact with parents; constructive criticism from this source is always welcome, and without it one is apt to lose much of the personal and human element that should always be a guiding factor in supervision.

TEACHERS AND SALARIES

For the past several years it has been common knowledge that many qualified teachers were unemployed. This is still true in the high school field, except in Commercial and Domestic Arts subjects, but the surplus of qualified teachers for the upper grades has very nearly disappeared, and there is at the present time an actual scarcity of primary grade teachers. At a recent conference of superintendents the President of one of the Normal Schools made a strong plea for us to send to the Normal Schools a larger number of students to be trained for teaching.

During the depression salaries in general decreased and reached their lowest point a year ago. Partial restoration of the reductions has been made in a large number of towns and cities this year, so that the average salaries are somewhat higher and

the trend is toward further increases. This trend will of course be greater as the surplus of teachers diminishes and disappears.

COST OF TEXTBOOKS

The question is sometimes asked why the cost of textbooks runs so high each year. I have attempted an analysis of this cost. Each child requires from ten to fourteen different books in his progress through each grade, or a total of 92 for the eight grades. The cost of these is approximately \$66, or an average of \$8.25 per grade. These books wear out or become obsolete in from four to ten years, and the replacement cost on this basis is estimated at \$1.40 per pupil each year. Greenville has approximately 50 pupils in grades one to eight, so that the textbook replacement would amount to \$70 a year. The average actual expenditure per pupil last year in New Hampshire was \$1.19. In Greenville the average actual expenditure for textbooks in the past four years has been \$1.44 per pupil. Each year a careful estimate is made of the needs for the coming year, based upon the probable number of pupils in each grade and the condition of the books on hand. This estimate appears in the budget.

HEALTH PROGRAM

The medical inspection was conducted in October by Dr. Mason and his report covers both the Sacred Heart Parochial School and the Public School as follows:

ORGANIZATION

The plan of reorganization suggested last year was put into effect in September, and was tried out for about six weeks. In the Primary Room, with an enrollment of only eighteen pupils in the first four grades, the new plan was working satisfactorily. In the Grammar Room, however, with an enrollment of thirty-five in the

four upper grades, it was evident that the plan was not entirely satisfactory. A helping teacher was secured at a low cost and she has been working under Mrs. Bennett's direction, with certain definite assignments of regular work with the fifth and sixth grade groups, and also with individual pupils selected from the same grades who are in need of special drill and remedial work in the fundamentals of reading, arithmetic, spelling, language, etc. A careful survey of the results of this modified plan was made at the end of the second marking period in December, and there was a marked improvement on the part of a very large proportion of the fifth and sixth grade pupils. By this plan also Mrs. Bennett was enabled to give increased time and attention to the seventh and eighth grades so that they are not longer handicapped in this respect.

BUDGET

The budget has been prepared on the basis of the modified plan described above; consequently it calls for a larger expenditure than the budget presented a year ago. Last year it was known that there would be a considerable balance in the treasury at the close of the year and \$551 of this was allowed in order to reduce the appropriation to \$7500.

The balance next June will not be large enough to warrant using any of it to reduce the appropriation, and this fact together with increases in estimated expenditures, will necessitate an appropriation of \$8900.

The largely increased items are Teachers' Salaries, Transportation, and High School Tuition. The increased estimate for Teachers' Salaries is only sufficient to cover the salary of a helping teacher. The increase in cost of Transportation is due to the necessity of providing transportation for pupils under fourteen years of age attending high school, until they reach their fourteenth birthday. The increased estimate for High School Tuition is due to two factors. We anticipate that there will be a larger number of pupils attending high school next year than this year, and the tuition rate at Appleton Academy will be increased. For several years this rate has been determined by the state average, which was \$73.81 last year and is \$75.19 this year. This figure is likely to be \$80 next year and will probably continue to increase. The corresponding figures for the years before the depression ran as high as \$106, but at that time the Academy rate was a fixed

amount. I believe it would be to the advantage of the district over a period of four years or more to come, to have a fixed rate of tuition set up again by means of a contract with the Trustees of the Academy, and the rate that has been suggested is \$85. If the District should see fit to authorize the School Board to make such a contract, and the rate of \$85 should become effective next year, the amount suggested in the budget should be sufficient to cover the cost.


