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# TOWN WARRANT

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## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, between the hours of ten of the clock in the forenoon and six of the clock in the afternoon, then and there to bring in your ballots for the following town officers:

Town clerk for one year; one selectman for three years; town treasurer for one year; tax collector for one year; highway agent for one year; water commissioner for three years; cemetery trustee for three years; library trustee for three years; two auditors for one year; three firewards for one year.

And at eight of the clock in the afternoon of the same day at the same place to act upon the following subjects:

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees and other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any action thereon.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to insure employees of the highway department, firemen, street lighting system and other liability insurance, or take any action thereon.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$153.68, the State to contribute \$614.73, these amounts to be used jointly for Town Road Aid, or take any action thereon.

7. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$86.00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with the other thirty seven towns in the Monadnock Region.

9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds, or take any action thereon.

10. To see if the town will vote to give a rebate on taxes paid on or before a certain date to be decided upon at this meeting, or take any action thereon.

11. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of an act entitled "To Provide for Non-Partisan Ballot System for Town Elections and School and Village District Elections" passed at the 1943 session of the State Legislature, or take any action thereon.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenville:

I respectfully submit my twentieth annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

### EDUCATION IN WAR TIME

These are times when, in the midst of a great struggle for the survival of certain cherished ideals, we are searching out clearer understandings of those ideals and more effective means of making them permanent realities. In the field of education people everywhere are giving serious thought to the problems of the present and the future, realizing that it is largely through education that these ideals can become clearer and more permanent.

For the winning of the war it is evident that most of the young people in high school will have to be concerned largely with the immediate necessities, and that before the war is won most of them will be in service as fighters or as workers in the multitude of war industries and war services. This necessity creates grave problems in the field of secondary and all forms of post-secondary education.

But for the younger boys and girls who are now in the elementary schools it is not probable that such service will be required unless the war is longer than we now anticipate. We must prepare them for adult living in conditions of peace and democracy that will be as nearly world wide as they can be made. Certain conditions of living will doubtless be changed in some degree from those that prevailed in the past. This is perhaps a good time to restate the results that are to be expected from the teaching that is carried on in the elementary schools through grade 8. The following items are all essential and cannot be arranged in any order of importance.

(1) We must see that all children establish the skills and habits of accuracy in reading, spelling, writing and arithmetic, which are fundamental to successful living.

(2) We must build up their morale by establishing the feeling of self confidence, courage, and security, and by restraining them from undue excitement and hysteria over the events of the war, and from thinking of other peoples in terms of either hatred or fear.



(3) We must teach them good health by effective instruction in health habits, choice of food, prevention and treatment of common diseases, sanitation, and recreation.

(4) We must see that they acquire right attitudes and habits in respect to community life while participating in both war-time and peace-time activities, such as war savings, salvage drives, Red Cross, victory gardens, etc.

(5) We must so direct the teaching of Geography as to develop accurate knowledge of the earth as a whole, of its natural resources, and of the types of culture of its various peoples and their relationships and interdependence, stressing the key position held by the people of the United States and their responsibility for world order and security.

(6) We must so direct the teaching of History as to emphasize the ideals of freedom and equality and show how they developed in our country and in other countries, to the end that there may be the clearest possible understanding of these ideals as a basis for unwavering loyalty to them.

(7) We must provide for all the richest possible experience in literature, music, and art, in order to awaken and establish an enjoyable appreciation of them as expressions of truth and beauty and as means of self expression.

#### SUPERVISION

The general functions of supervision are being maintained as completely as possible and substantially as indicated in previous reports. It is difficult to maintain as complete a program as formerly, because of the many demands upon the superintendent's time and energies arising out of the war emergency. The most important of these during the past year have had to do with the various rationing programs requiring the organization of the schools to take care of the registration for sugar rationing, gasoline rationing, and fuel oil rationing; the "Food For Victory Program" including organizing for high school pupils to assist farmers in harvesting apples, and attempting to organize classes for out-of-school youth and adults; handling the details of organizing and reporting on the use of surplus commodities to supplement school lunches; the details of organizing and reporting the "Penny Milk Program" in some schools; the necessity for a complete review of transportation plans for all schools; and the preparations now being made for the registration for War Ration Book II.

## BUDGET

The budget prepared for 1943-'44 calls for an assessment of \$10,258, which is \$280 less than last year's assessment. A few items in the budget call for special mention. The amount allowed for teachers' salaries is \$300 higher than last year's estimate, because of the known facts that there is a rather serious shortage of teachers and there is a definite trend toward substantially higher salaries. The cost of fuel is estimated at \$100 above last year's figure. On the other hand, the cost of high school tuition is estimated at \$600 less than last year, and it should be noted that it is very difficult to make an accurate estimate at this time of the number of Greenville pupils who will be in high schools in September. The income from elementary tuitions should be \$180, on the assumption that the same New Ipswich pupils will still be in the Greenville Public School next year.
