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# TOWN WARRANT

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, between the hours of ten of the clock in the forenoon and six of the clock in the afternoon, then and there to bring in your ballots for the following Town Officers:

Town clerk for one year; one selectman for three years; town treasurer for one year; tax collector for one year; highway agent for one year; water commissioner for three years; cemetery trustee for three years; library trustee for three years; two auditors for one year; three firewards for one year.

Also to bring in your ballots for the election of Delegates-at-large, Alternate Delegates-at-large, Delegates and Alternate Delegates to the National Conventions of the various political parties to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice President of the United States.

And at eight of the clock in the afternoon of the same day at the same place to act upon the following subjects:

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees and other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any action thereon.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to insure employees of the highway department, firemen, street lighting system and other liability insurance, or take any action thereon.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$76.89, the State to contribute \$307.56, these amounts to be used jointly for town road aid, or take any action thereon.

7. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and make an appropriation to cover the expenses of such an audit.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$87.00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire, for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to rebuild and oil the highway, known as Adams Street, leading from River Street to the Ida F. Taft playground, or take any action thereon.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lay out and construct a highway beginning at a point on upper Main Street, east of the premises of Ernest Emond and leading to the rear of premises owned by Rita Ouellette, Emil Vaillancourt and Ernest Bernier; raise and appropriate a sum of money for said construction or take any action thereon.

11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the cemetery trustees to construct and provide more burial plots in the Pleasant Street cemetery, raise and appropriate a sum of money for this purpose, or take any other action thereon.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to establish a sinking fund, said money to be used for post-war reconstruction of highways and sidewalks, and with the intent and purpose of providing some work for the men of the armed forces when they return, to designate where and for what purposes said money is to be used, or take any other action thereon.

13. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to request the Governor of the State of New Hampshire to send a request to the Congress of the United States, a plea that they pass an adequate bill for soldier voting that will enable every person in the armed forces to vote for Federal officers at the next Federal election, or take any action thereon.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds, or take any action thereon.

15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to accept money from the Water Commissioners for the purpose of reducing the tax rate, or take any other action thereon.

16. To see if the Town will vote to establish the rate of pay for highway employees or take any action thereon.

17. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

*To the School Board and Citizens of Greenville:*

I respectfully submit my twenty-first annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

### THE SHORTAGE OF TEACHERS IS SERIOUS

Since Pearl Harbor 120,000 teachers or one-eighth of all the teachers in the United States have left the profession for causes directly due to the war emergency. The largest source of replacement is the teachers colleges, but the enrollment in these institutions has fallen off 60% in the same period. Some vacancies have been filled with teachers of lower than standard qualifications and many schools throughout the country have been closed. There is no indication that this condition will not be worse next year.

The most pertinent facts in the situation are these:

1. The country over, about one-fourth of all the teachers (254,000) are getting less than \$1,200 salary this year. In New Hampshire nearly one-half (45%) are paid less than \$1,200. In Maine and Vermont the proportion is slightly above 50%, but in the other New England states and in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, and Maryland, fewer than 5% are paid less than \$1,200.

2. Teachers' salaries in the United States have increased on the average about 10% above the level of 1939. Thousands of teachers see their former students scarcely

out of high school making better wages than teachers of long experience.

3. The pay of the average factory worker the country over is 80% higher than it was in 1939, workers in ship yards have doubled their earnings, and the net income of farmers has more than doubled.

4. Until 1940 teachers were exempt from paying federal income tax. Now a single teacher with no dependents with a salary of \$1,200 pays \$140 income tax. No special salary adjustment has been made in recognition of this fact.

5. In the same period in which teachers' salaries have increased 10% the cost of living has increased 26%, so that in purchasing power teachers' salaries are lower than they were in 1939. The teacher who received \$1,200 in 1939 is actually worse off today with her 10% larger salary of \$1,320; she pays \$164 of it in income tax, and the remaining \$1,156 will buy only slightly more than \$900 would buy in 1939. The factory worker who was getting \$1,200 in 1939 and is now getting 80% more, or \$2,160, pays \$332 income tax, and the remaining \$1,828 will buy slightly more than \$1,450 would buy in 1939.

It is circumstances like these that are to blame for the teacher shortage. It is not to be wondered at that teachers feel themselves forced out of the school when they cannot cover the increase in taxes and the cost of living on the salaries they are paid, but can go into industry and command an average salary of at least \$600 more. In fact most teachers are far better trained than the average wage earner and can command not the average but the top wages in industry. Teachers like everyone else must have the necessities of subsistence and must meet the usual obligations that require thrift and economic independence, to provide for the uncertainties of life. But the teacher has other obligations; he is charged with passing on the ideals and standards of good living and the culture of our democracy. To do this requires cultural and professional preparation.

It is evident that the salary question is the main issue and we must think of this not merely in terms of the requests of teachers for higher salaries, but from the standpoint of the type of service the public schools must have. We must protect the educational opportunities of the children. With juvenile delinquency on the increase, competent teachers are more necessary even than in ordinary



times. It is not possible to name a figure that would represent the actual worth of a good teacher, but each community may well ponder whether it can afford to employ a teacher who is not worth much more than is now the prevailing salary.

The pupils have complied with the vaccination law. There have been no exclusions because of communicable diseases.

#### BUDGET

The assessment required to meet the school board's budget is \$10,766, which is approximately \$500 more than last year. The reason for this is to be found in changes in several items. The estimate for teachers' salaries is increased \$100; for flags \$65, to cover necessary repairs to the flag pole; for janitor service \$50, to equal the amount paid this year; repairs \$100; partially offset by a reduction of \$100 in the transportation of pupils. Under other statutory requirements, salaries of district officers is reduced by \$75, because the school board proposes to serve without pay; and the high school tuition estimate is increased \$200, to cover the increase in the number of Greenville pupils expected to attend high school next year.
