TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, between the hours of ten of the clock in the forenoon and six of the clock in the afternoon, then and there to bring in your ballots for the following Town Officers:

Town Clerk for one year; one selectman for three years; town treasurer for one year; tax collector for one year; highway agent for one year; one water commissioner for three years; one cemetery trustee for three years; one library trustee for three years; two auditors for one year; three firewards for one year.

And at eight of the clock in the afternoon of the same day at the same place to act upon the following subjects:

- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees and other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$153.92, the State to contribute \$615.68, these amounts to be used jointly for town road aid, or take any action thereon.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and raise and appropriate a sum of money to cover the expenses of such an audit.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$88.00 for the Monadnock Region of Southern New Hampshire, for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$881.08 to be added to the sinking fund established at town meeting in 1944, said money to be used for post-war reconstruction of highways and sidewalks, or take any other action thereon.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of installing another street light near the Sacred Heart Church, or take any other action thereon.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of installing one or more street lights beyond the one now in use on Temple street, or take any other action thereon.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of installing new wiring on the fire alarm system or take any other action thereon.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to install a fire alarm box at the entrance to the telephone office situated in Albert D. Bourke's building, also to see if the Town will vote to install a fire alarm box at the outside entrance to the fire station to operate the siren if the fire alarm fails to work, and raise and appropriate an amount not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to carry out the provisions of this article, or take any action thereon.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote pertaining to the management of all matters concerning the supplying of water for drinking and domestic purposes for the citizens of the Town of Greenville passed at the annual town meeting held on March 9, 1915, and place the management in the hands of a superintendent, said superintendent to be appointed and supervised by the Board of Selectmen, remuneration for services of said superintendent to be fixed by the Board of Selectmen and to be paid out of receipts of the water department, or take any other action thereon.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to engage a competent engineer or other competent persons to make a survey of our water system and advise the Town relative to securing an additional source of water supply for domestic use, said expense to be paid out of receipts of the water department; appoint a committee of five to carry out the provisions of this article, or take any other action thereon.
- 15. To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to promulgate certain town ordinances in the interest of fire protection and for other purposes pertaining to the welfare of the citizens of the Town of Greenville, or take any other action thereon.

- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase a tractor or truck, or both, or take any other action thereon.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to rebuild and oil the highway known as Columbian Road, or take any other action thereon.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to repair sidewalks, or take any other action thereon.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real esate acquired by the Town through tax collector's deeds, or take any other action thereon.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international cooperation, such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.
- 21. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

REPORT OF FIREWARDS

During the year 1944, there were two fires causing considerable loss.

June 26 the storehouse owned by J. C. Taft, near R. R. station was a total loss.

On Nov. 8 the farm house of Leon Russell on the Mason Road was destroyed with a heavy loss. The origin of the fire was undetermined.

Due to the initiative and generosity of the Greenville Mills Inc., the steam whistle for fire alarms was installed in its original position over the boiler room and is much more satisfactory than the siren. The latter has been retained for emergency purposes. It is the opinion of the firewards that the signal system of the fire alarm should be overhauled and new wire purchased. The present system has been in use over thirty years.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Greenville qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 13th day of March 1945, at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to reshingle the roof of the school building, or take any other action thereon.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800 to insulate the ceiling and provide storm windows, or take any other action thereon.

REPORT OF SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenville:

I respectfully submit my twenty-second annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

THE SCHOOLS AND THE WAR EFFORT

Schools are participating in the war effort, as are all loyal citizens. Most high schools offer some form of preinduction training, such as a course in Aeronautics, and high school students are giving substantial aid in harvesting perishable crops as well as taking employment in essential industries during vacation periods. Schools of all grades are taking part in drives to collect waste paper, other scrap, and milk weed floss, and in buying war stamps and bonds. Many older boys and girls have left school with the mistaken idea that they should enter industry to make their contribution to the war effort,—and some are merely attracted by the opportunity to make good wages. School attendance until graduation is the best contribution school age youth can make to the war effort; society in general, as well as the individual pupil will profit most by his continuance in the pursuit of an adequate education.

POST WAR SCHOOLS

Universal free public education has been the ideal of America from its beginning; establishing schools was one of the first concerns of the earliest colonial leaders, and with ups and downs, but always moving toward greater opportunity for all, the American school system has developed. That it is short of the ideal is freely acknowledged; the 1940 census revealed that $13\frac{1}{2}\%$ of adults had only fourth grade education or less, and Selective Service has found several millions physically unfit.

After every crisis in the life of a nation, revealing weaknesses or new opportunities, educational procedures have been revised and upgraded. Nation after nation has proven the power of education when applied to a specific purpose. Germany used a totalitarian education to develop in its people a blind urge to conquest. Russia has made tremendous progress, both culturally and technically, by educating its people of all ages. Britain is now developing a bold program, doubling its expenditures for schools, realizing that every human talent is necessary for holding her place in the world. If this nation values its own future, it must awaken to the power of education and direct it toward desirable ends.

There are three kinds of would-be planners of post-war education—those who would completely destroy or radically revise what we have; those who hold tenaciously to the policies and practices that have been; and those who see need for certain changes but insist that they can and should be made without the loss of the best of what has been. Doubtless the first or second group will prevail here and there, but by and large the third group will succeed in making wise changes in one or more of the following (and other) ways:—

Improvement in programs furthering the growth of a strong and healthy body.

Strengthening the foundations of emotional health and of moral and ethical behavior, in closer coordination with home and community efforts.

Provision for practicable means of learning through work experience, coordinating vocational training with part-time work in various occupations.

Better adaptation of teaching methods and content to individual and social needs. (The Army and Navy training programs have provided the greatest laboratory ever offered for experiment and research in education and we should see that the best possible use of it is made in the civilian education of the future.)

Broader cultural background and greater technical knowledge and skill on the part of teachers and supervisory officers.

Reorganization of local school district units in the interest of more economical and at the same time broader and more effective school programs.

Possibly the extension of compulsory school attendance to include ages sixteen and seventeen with adequate provision for a worth-while program for all, including the fields of cultural and technical or vocational education, human relationships, civic responsibilities, economic efficiency, increasing emphasis on physical strength and endurance, including military training.

INCREASING COSTS

The White House Conference on Rural Education in October, 1944, brought together and emphasized many interesting and pertinent facts, such as:

48% of all public school pupils are in rural schools (that is, schools in towns under 2,500 population)

52% of all public school teachers are in rural schools BUT:

Only 38% of all school funds are spent on rural schools

Average salary of rural teachers is \$959.00, while that of urban teachers is \$1,995.00

Average annual expenditure per rural pupil is \$86.00, and per urban pupil is \$124.00

60% of rural elementary teachers have less than two years education beyond high school as compared with 10% of urban elementary teachers.

A significant paragraph in the Report of the White House Conference reads:

"The cost of living during the war has increased 25 percent in cities and 47 percent in rural areas. Teachers' salaries have increased an average of 8 percent." Teachers by the tens of thousands have left teaching for better paying positions in industry and government. Other thousands have entered the armed forces.

^{*}More recent reports give this figure as 15%.

Of the nation's 900,000 teachers, 360,000 are new to their jobs. Fifty thousand are teaching on emergency certificates. City school systems have maintained staffs because their salaries, nearly double those of rural schools, have enabled them to recruit many of the best rural teachers. Country schools are therefore bearing the brunt of the current crisis."

Money expended for sound education is not to be regarded as a burdensome cost, but as a productive investment. The greatest waste we can make is to spend too little on Education. Every community needs to study its School Budget, not with a view to reducing it, but with a view to making its schools as effective as possible.

In order to attract and hold good teachers, the people of rural areas need to consider three factors:

- 1. The salaries of rural teachers must compare favorably with the incomes of other persons of the cultural and social status that teachers are expected to maintain.
- 2. Teachers have an obligation to contribute to community life, and the people of the community have an equal obligation to encourage teachers to participate in community life and to protect them in the exercise of the privilege.
- 3. The community has an obligation to provide satisfactory living conditions for the teachers, even to the extent of providing a furnished house for a teachers' home either as school district property or leased by the district.

SHORTAGE OF TEACHERS

Last year I reported in some detail regarding the shortage of trained teachers. The difficulties of this situation have increased within the year and indications are that it will grow more and more serious until some time after the end of the war. The enrollment at teacher training institutions is still falling off, and we have nearly exhausted the list of available former teachers willing to return to teaching during the emergency. It is plain that salaries will be still further increased in the country areas, to meet the competition of larger towns and cities.

In New Hampshire the average salary of high school men teachers in 1942-43 was \$2,035 and last year it was \$2,208; that of women high school teachers in 1942-43 was \$1,462, and last year \$1,586; that of elementary women teachers in 1942-43 was \$1,204, and last year \$1,244.

MEDICAL INSPECTION

The school nurse Mrs. Edna J. Gilbert has submitted the following data in her report covering the period from January 30, 1944 to January 30, 1945. The routine physical examinations were carried out in December by Dr. Karr and the nurse and they report as follows:

At the Dental Clinic in May 1944, sixteen from the Public School and several from the Sacred Heart School were given dental care; two Public School children were provided with glasses and three Sacred Heart pupils had tonsil and adenoid corrections. The vision tests in March 1944 found at the Public School two with defective vision in one eye and two in both eyes and at the Sacred Heart School fourteen had vision defects, eight of whom were provided with glasses. The Audiometer tests for hearing in April 1944 revealed no defects at the Public School and three at the Sacred Heart School.

BUDGET

The School Board's estimate of assessment required for 1945-46 is \$1,647 more than the assessment required a year ago for the following reasons:

The allowance last year for teachers' salaries was too small by \$300 and will undoubtedly require more than \$300 additional next year, hence an estimated increase of \$625 over last year's figure; fuel is likely to cost an additional \$50 and janitors' supplies an additional \$25; transportation of pupils is costing nearly \$100 more than last year's estimate and is likely to be still higher next year; salaries of district officers is increased to cover the salary paid a Secretary; high school tuition is estimated at \$4,000 an increase of

\$600, because there are only six Greenville pupils to graduate from high school in June and there are prospects of some fifteen of this year's eighth grade graduates to enter High School next fall, a net gain of nine; the income from other sources than taxation will be limited to the Dog Tax, as we have no elementary tuition pupils and expect none.
