TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, twelfth day of March next, between the hours of ten of the clock in the forenoon and six of the clock in the afternoon, then and there to bring in your ballots for the following town officers:

Town clerk for one year; one selectman for three years; town treasurer for one year; tax collector for one year; highway agent for one year; one water commissioner for three years; one cemetery trustee for three years; one library trustee for three years; two auditors for one year; three fire wards for one year.

And at two of the clock in the afternoon of the same day at the same place to act upon the following subjects:

- Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- Art. 3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$170.32, the State to contribute \$681.26, these amounts to be used jointly for town road aid, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting, and raise and appropriate a sum of money to cover the expenses of such an audit.
- Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$88.00 for the Monadnock Region of Southern New Hampshire, or take any other action thereon.

- Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the sinking fund established at the annual town meeting in 1944, said money to be used for post-war construction, or take any other action thereon.
- Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money to be used in repairing the playground, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of installing new wiring on the fire alarm system or take any other action thereon.
- Art. 11. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to widen the brook leading from the residence of Saluste Desrosiers to the Souhegan river, in an effort to prevent the water backing into several houses nearby, or take any other action thereon.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to tar the various town roads, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to appoint the highway agent, beginning after the annual town meeting in 1947, or take any other action thereon.
- Art. 14. To see if the Town will appoint a committee to develop the parcel of land at the junction of Main and River Streets, which is owned by the Town, as a suitable memorial to the men and women who served their country in World Wars one and two, and raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same, or take any other action thereon.
- Art. 15. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to rebuild High Street from a point near the Sacred Heart church to the New Ipswich town line, or take any other action thereon.
- Art. 16. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair and oil the street leading from High street to a point near the residence of Mrs. Bridget Drinan, or take any other action thereon.

- Art. 17. To see what action the Town will take relative to observing a Welcome Home Day for the servicemen of the town, who have returned from service in World War two; choose a committee to carry out the wishes of the town, and raise and appropriate a sum of money for this purpose, or take any other action thereon.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the street leading from Dunster avenue to a point near the residence of Albert Bourke, or take any other action thereon.
- Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds, or take any other action thereon.
- Art. 20. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenville:

I respectfully submit my twenty-third annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

A year ago I called your attention to the increasing costs of public schools, and made the statements that money expended for sound education is not to be regarded as a burdensome cost but as a productive investment; that the greatest waste we can make is to spend too little on education; and that every community should plan its budget with a view to making its schools as effective as possible.

Today the greatest hindrance to effective schools is the lack of a sufficient number of well qualified teachers. Contrary to the supposition that the ending of the war and the cessation of war industries would release a great many teachers to resume their profession, it has resulted, rather, in the case of women teachers, in a demand to be released from teaching by many whose husbands are discharged from the service. It is true that more men teachers are available as a result of the demobilization, but the great majority of teachers are women.

280,000 teachers in the United States left the profession during the war because they could not live on the salaries they were receiving. Some 80,000 emergency teachers with inferior qualifications have come in; thousands of positions have been abolished; class rooms have been crowded; and there are still around 10,000 unfilled teaching positions. The number of people training to become teachers dropped 60 per cent during the war period. The schools of the Nation are confronted with a most critical situation which can only be remedied by making the teaching profession more attractive to young people, and that means, primarily, higher salaries.

According to the latest compilation of annual average salaries by states, twenty-two of the forty-eight states were paying higher average salaries than New Hampshire. In other words country-wide average salaries are about the same as New Hampshire is paying. Our near neighbors to the South are paying from one-half to two-thirds as much

again in salaries, and the average salary in New York State is nearly double that in New Hampshire. It is only natural that we should lose many of our best teachers.

A tabulation of salaries paid to Elementary teachers in New Hampshire this year shows that:

In the sixty-three small towns with less than 600 population the lowest salary paid is \$1000, but only sixteen towns are paying less than \$1200; eleven towns are paying from \$1400 to \$1500; the five towns of this Supervisory Union that fall in this population group (Francestown, Greenfield, Lyndeborough, Mason and Temple) are paying from \$1200 to \$1350.

The fifty-two towns in the population range from 600 to 1000 including New Ipswich, are paying from \$1000 to \$1850.

The twenty-nine towns with populations from 1000 to 1500, including Greenville, are paying from \$1100 to \$1900.

The twenty-six towns including Wilton in the population range from 1500 to 2500 are paying from \$1000 to \$2200 per year for elementary teachers.

Many of the smaller towns find it difficult to raise the money to pay higher salaries, but until the State Legislature appropriates more money for State Aid than it has done in the past there seems to be no other way to secure well qualified teachers, or indeed any teacher at all for some positions. Most teachers will take a position that involves a single grade or at most two grades rather than several grades, which makes it doubly hard to secure teachers for rural schools.

In view of these facts it seems advisable to increase the budget allowance for teachers' salaries to \$4500. This increase, together with the slight increase in cost of text books and supplies, is nearly offset by the decrease in the cost of transportation and in the estimate for minor repairs. Salaries of district officers is low this year because the School Board members volunteered to perform their duties without pay, but \$200 is recommended for that item next year. This is offset by a reduction of \$200 in the amount estimated for High School tuition. Cost of insurance next year will be \$150 and to this is added an item

of fixed charges amounting to \$25.00 to cover teacher retirement assessments, as provided by act of the Legislature at its 1945 session.

It is doubtful if there will be any cash balance at the close of the current year and the only known income for next year is the dog tax, estimated at \$100.

The assessment required is \$12,434.00, just \$21.00 more than last year.

At a special school district meeting last summer it was voted to pay for the new furnace out of the current funds and raise the amount at the annual meeting in March; consequently, there is a special article in the Warrant to raise \$1,486.00 for that purpose.

The heating plant at the school needs to be modernized throughout with the exception, of course, of the new furnace. There is considerable heat loss through the attic and through the windows, which could be reduced materially by insulating the attic floor and stair wells and providing storm windows. A special article in the Warrant will enable the voters to decide whether to proceed with the improvements.

The annual medical inspection was made by Dr. Karr and Mrs. Gilbert but Mrs. Gilbert's long confinement following an accident has prevented her from compiling the usual report.
