## TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville in the County of Hillsboro in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, then and there to bring in your ballots for the following town officers:

Town clerk for one year; one selectman for three years; town treasurer for one year; tax collector for one year; highway agent for one year; one water commissioner for one year; one cemetery trustee for three years; one cemetery trustee for two years; library trustee for three years; two auditors for one year: three fire wards for one year:

And at eight o'clock in the afternoon of the same day the same place to act upon the following subjects:

- Art. 1. To choose all necessary officers not chosen by Australian ballot.
- Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- Art. 3. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$171.74, the State to contribute \$686.97, these amounts to be used jointly for town road aid, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$114.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter,

newspaper and magazine, advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other 37 towns of the Monadnock Region.

- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to rebuild the road from a point near the residence of T. Lizotte to lower Mill St., to include the piece of road south of property of Nora Welch, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to accept gift of \$1,000.00 from Greenville Mills Inc., to the park commissioners to be expended on the Taft Memorial Playground or take any action thereon.
- Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorzie the Selectmen to sign Federal Works Agency BCF Form 3, "Application for Advance for Plan Preparation for Non-Federal Public Works" requesting Government appropriation to cover engineering services for planning a sanitary sewer system for the Town of Greenville; and raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) for the preliminary expense of preparing the application form with the necessary brief preliminary engineering investigation, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to extend the domestic water line to the residence of Yvon Leger and Charles Comer, on Temple Road, raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to extend Town fire line along the Temple Road approximately 900 feet, raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same or take any action thereon.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to extend the present town water supply on lower Mill Street to a point near the residence now being constructed by Harold Martin, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to extend the Town fire line to a new hydrant to be placed above residence of Amelia Lizotte on Old Mason Road, raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will authorize the Park Commission to accept any money given them for recreational purposes and to spend same as they see fit, or take any action thereon.

Art. 15. To see if the town will authorize the expenditure of \$3,000.00 from Myrtle M. Marsh legacy for use on the Ida F. Taft Memorial playground by the Park Commission, or take any action thereon.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to accept for the Town a deed of the reservoir on Dunster Hill and its appurtenances.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to enter into a contract on behalf of the town with Greenville Mills, Inc. providing (a) for the maintenance and operation of the reservoir, water main lines and hydrants by the Town for fire protection purposes (b) the furnishing of pumping service for said system by Greenville Mills, Inc. (c) such other terms as the selectmen may deem in the public interest in furtherance of adequate fire protection for the Town.

# REPORT OF FIREWARDS

The Town had no fires of any size during 1948. The steam fire whistle is now in operation, also the siren is kept in working order. Three new hydrants have been installed to take the place of one opposite the chair shop, one near No. 6 Mill, and one near the Catholic Church.

The extension of the hydrant system from the old freight house site to Rowse's Mill was completed early in June.

Due to alterations in the fire system of the Greenville Mills. Inc. it became necessary to re-lay and insulate the fire pipe over No. 6 Bridge. This pipe formerly was shut off in winter on account of freezing, but as now insulated it is safe, we believe, for year-round usage.

Assistance was given to Mason, New Ipswich, and Temple at

various times during the year.

### REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness

and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as

follows:

(1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.

(2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.

(3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay. The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.

# REPORT OF THE GREENVILLE PARK COMMISSION

#### TO THE CITIZENS OF GREENVILLE:

We respectfully submit our first annual report as your Park Commissioners.

### TAFT MEMORIAL PLAYGROUND:

After a survey of the field was made and it was found to be 82" lower at center field than at home plate extensive work was performed in filling and grading of the playground. The bank in left field was used for fill which also enlarged the field. The town appropriation was insufficient to complete the filling and grading which was necessary to make the playground usable and the additional amount was taken from money donated by Greenville Mills Inc.

A plot of land bordering the playground was leased from Mr. Rudolph Lizotte for three years to be developed as a picnic ground and a shady area for some of the summer activities.

### RECREATION PROGRAM:

Through the efforts of the Civic Playground Committee a very successful summer program was furnished. A summer playground instructor was hired who proved very able and a wealth of activities were available. This program not only kept the children off the streets but provided instruction in all sports, for both children and adults, and taught sportsmanship.

Through the cooperation of the fire department and others, we attempted to have a lighted skating rink, however due to mild weather this proved unsuccessful.

A program of winter activities was instituted in the town hall for children of grammar school age, which included a program for the boys on Saturday mornings and the girls in the afternoon. Once again it was through the cooperation of volunteers who acted as instructors which made this program very successful.

### FUTURE DEVELOPMENT:

We are in hopes that the Civic Playground Committee will be successful in hiring a summer playground instructor to supervise the summer activities again this year.

Plans for the coming season call for the seeding of the playground, its maintenance, and the erection of a grand stand. Playground equipment will be provided as the budget allows. The construction of a lighted skating rink is contemplated if suitable weather conditions prevail. We are in hopes that some day money will be made available and that it will prove practical, to regrade, reseed, and curb the plot of land at the southern end of Main street which borders Columbian road.

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- a. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing two years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to issue serial notes on the credit of the district in the amount of \$3,600 to be paid off, \$500 each year with interest, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 72 of the Revised Laws, known as the Municipal Bonds Statute, for the purpose of remodelling the school building to provide safer and more adequate lavatory facilities.

# REPORT OF SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF GREENVILLE:

I respectfully submit my second annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

### BETTER EDUCATION

Better education is the basic need of a free democratic society. We shall remain a free and strong nation only if we have enough free and competent people. The perpetuation of the American way of life requires citizens who understand and love it and are willing to live fervently in accord with it.

Better education cannot be obtained through the efforts of a single agency or group of people. It demands the full cooperation of an informed, educated citizenry; the support of courageous, enlightened school committees; teachers who have a broad cultural background and who understand the needs of the community, and administrative officers who are willing to interpret the needs and power of education and to bring about a working relationship between the people and their schools.

An informed citizenry is one who is aware of pending legislation, both state and national, that will affect education. An informed citizenry will know the policies of the schools and will take an active part and share in the building of wholesome school and community relationships.

A courageous school committee is one that stands firm for the welfare of the children; insists on securing a good professional staff; insists upon adequate and modern tools of learning and promotes sound and educationally defensible school budgeting which will give unqualified opportunities to children.

The good teacher is a growing teacher, and one who can adequately interpret and present the methods and procedures used in effectively teaching the children under his or her influence. The effective teacher is one who establishes and maintains good esprit de corps among the pupils and parents.

Effective administrative officers should accept the responsibility for providing the best personnel possible and to provide materials and supervise a balanced educational program that will help boys and girls develop wholesome personalities and the ability to effectively participate in the demogratic way of life.

ability to effectively participate in the democratic way of life. Thus, all must work side by side to establish schools equal to the challenge of our times. As this is done we shall not only have better schools and better communities, but in the process we shall become better people.

### TEACHER IMPROVEMENT

A. Extension and Summer Courses.

During the past two years the teachers have been encouraged

to improve themselves professionally. To assist in this professional improvement an extension course was held during the late fall and winter of last year. This course was organized through the cooperation of Keene Teachers College and held at Wilton. The area studied was Social Studies in the Elementary Field. The teachers attended this class once a week for fifteen weeks. The purpose of the course was to re-evaluate the offerings in the area of social studies in the elementary school and to develop units of work that would be applicable to their own teaching situations.

Much excellent work was accomplished and the social studies program throughout the Union has taken on new zest and

interest.

Many of the teachers who did not attend this course have taken summer school work. It is interesting to note that 76% of the teachers in Supervisory Union No. 63 have either attended summer school or taken extension courses in the past year and a half.

The instruction we are receiving reflects the interest of the teachers in self-improvement.

### B. Art Workshop.

In October, all of the teachers in Supervisory Union No. 63 met in Wilton to engage in a three day art workshop. This workshop was organized through the cooperation of the State Department of Education, who in 1947, added a Director of Fine Arts to its staff.

The workshop was established for the purpose of teacherimprovement in the field of art, so that they might go back into their classrooms and re-vitalize their work, thereby making

their courses more interesting to their pupils.

The ideas presented dealt with the basic principles of art education in relation to general education. No "bag of tricks" was presented to the teachers. An effort was made through lecture, discussion, demonstration and participation to show the teachers that art is a means of expression and is dependent upon increased powers of imagination, observation and organization.

The teachers returned to their classrooms and applied their

learnings to literature, science, health, social studies, etc.

In January 1949, a follow-up program of two days was held, in which the teachers came together for the purpose of discussing their successes and failures, to learn now techniques with different art media, and to present the results of their past two months work.

The results were exceedingly gratifying. Inventive and creative drawings and paintings, the result of the child's problem-solving, took the place of the many color books and patterns that have a tendency to limit the inventive nature of the child. This creative and imaginative freedom in art may account for

the school yard being raked and planted with grass and shrubs or the interior of the school painted with stimulating, although restful colors, rather than the customary brown and buff.

A marked change in art teaching procedures has been recognized throughout the Union. To be sure, an art workshop cannot be expected to take the place of a good art supervisor who gives regular help to teachers, but it is a welcome and very worthwhile substitute.

### SCHOOL ENROLLMENTS

No report would be adequate unless some mention was made of the school enrollment trends in the next few years. This problem is not only a national and state problem but it is one that is going to definitely affect many local communities and budgets within the next few years.

This year we have approximately 18.6 million children in the elementary schools. In two years we may expect 20 million and in four years, 22 million. It is estimated that by 1957 we shall have 26.6 million children in the elementary schools, 8 million

more than the 18.6 as of now.

High school attendance will perhaps diminish slightly in the next three years. This is probably due to the low birth-rate in the early 30's. However, high school enrollments will gradually increase through the 50's so that by 1960, there will be 8.1 million high school children as compared with the present 6.3 million.

Local conditions vary somewhat from this, particularly if the

high schools include grades 7 and 8.

On the opposite page is a study of the local school enrollment

based upon the Census reports of September 1948.

These enrollments pose problems for local communities. For some it will mean considering construction of additions, or new schools, or entering into a cooperative school program. For others it may mean utilizing present buildings within the community, as an emergency measure, to house the expanding school population.

Whatever measures are taken, it should be noted that a school is more than four walls and a roof. Today's education demands spacious rooms well lighted and attractively decorated with ample playground area adjacent to or as near to the plant as possible. Classroom activities are no longer built around a fixed chair, desk, paper and pencil program. The activities are based upon the philosophy of learning by doing and living by acting

As new or additional classrooms are being set up the problem of more elementary teachers presents itself. We see no relief in sight in so far as the supply of elementary teachers is concerned. It is estimated that the normal number of new teachers needed in the elementary field in New Hampshire is approxi-

mately 150. Next year, according to latest reports, the two New Hampshire Teachers Colleges, namely Keene and Plymouth, will be graduating a total of 25 elementary teachers. For years we have been able to press into service married women, who for one reason or another dropped out of teaching, and women who have retired and have again made themselves available for teaching positions. It appears that this supply is fast becoming exhausted.

Our only hope is to recruit more young people into teaching. We must make teaching attractive enough in terms of salary, living conditions, and working conditions so that young people will be encouraged to enter this profession. Until this is done we may find ourselves "keeping school" rather than "teaching

school.

#### SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

During the past year the following school improvements have been made. Three classrooms have been redecorated in pastel shades, in keeping with the modern trend in school interior decorating. Fluorescent lighting has been installed thus increasing the working light from 5 candle power to approximately 35 candle power. These additions have transformed our classrooms from the institutional type classroom, to a modern, pleasant and bright classroom environment. This has had a definite effect on teacher and pupil morale. The primary room has been outfitted with new attractive neutral shade curtains replacing the old worn and torn green shades that have been in the building for many years. New shades are to be added to the other two rooms.

Fourteen new desk and chair units have been added to the upper grade room replacing the old furniture, which was beyond

The townspeople are to be commended for their interest in the children of their community and for their willingness to expend funds in their behalf.

### BUDGET

The School Board's estimate of the total assessment required for 1949-50 is \$16,749.88. This is slightly less than last year's

figure.

It will be noted that under the item of minor repairs and expenses an increase of \$650 has been provided. This is for the purpose of painting the exterior of the school building two coats. It is our understanding that it has been approximately 20 years since the building has been painted. This should be done this year.

Tuitions have been increased \$250.00. Tuition costs reflect school costs. Appleton Academy has found it necessary to increase the tuition from \$135.00 to \$150.00 for the year 1949-50.

The state average cost per pupil for instruction in 1947-48 was \$158.74; this figure is the maximum high school tuition liability of any district for the school year 1948-49. It will probably be higher next year since school costs, like so many other areas of expense, have remained high and shown little inclination to decrease.

The usual increments in teachers' salaries have been provided in an attempt to keep abreast of salary schedules in this area.

Other school estimates have remained approximately the same as last year.

### SPECIAL ARTICLE

The School Board has submitted a special article in the school warrant requesting authority to expend approximately \$3600 for the purpose of renovating the entrance of the public school building in such a way that would permit moving the girls' and boys' lavatories from the cellar to the first floor level.

This is not a new idea. Your School Board in January 1944 considered a similar plan and obtained the assistance of the State Department of Education to draw sketches for purposes

of study

The need is greater today than it was in 1944. The lavatories are dark, unpleasant places, and far removed from the supervision of the teachers. The stairways leading to the present basements are decidedly worn and are a hazard to any group of children leaving or entering the basement area.

We are having an increasing number of primary children who need the attention and assistance of the teacher and at the same time the teacher is responsible for any group remaining in the classroom or (as at present) on the first floor.

The proposed plan is to construct boys' and girls' lavatories on both sides of the entrance filling in the space that now exists there. The floor level of these lavatories will be on the same level as that of the first floor of the main building. This can be done without detracting from the architectural features of the building, in fact it might well add to it.

The lavatories would be clean and well ventilated. It is proposed that asphalt tile be placed on the floors and that as

many of the present fixtures be used as possible.

From an administrative standpoint, the children can be better attended and supervised. Better health habits and attitudes can be developed. Certain hazardous situations that now exist can be eliminated.

It is a project that merits much consideration.
