SYNOPSIS OF 1949 TOWN MEETING

Number of Ballots cast, 524

The meeting was called to order by moderator, William H. Doonan, and polls were opened at 10 o'clock A. M.

Acting under Article 1 of the Town Warrant the following officers were elected: Town Clerk, Henry P. Gainey; Town Treasurer, Albina Cournoyer; Selectman for three years, Arthur E. Pelletier; Tax Collector, William H. Doonan; Highway Agent, Robert G. Lafleur; Water Commissioner for three years, Clyde S. Eaton; Auditors, Harlan E. Karr, T. Archibald Eaton; Library Trustee for three years, Harlan E. Karr; For Fire Wards, William H. Doonan for first, Lazare J. Rodier for second, A. Alphonse Bergeron for third; For Surveyors of Wood and Lumber, William H. Doonan, Camille J. Vaillancourt, Joseph Bernier, Clyde S. Eaton; For Public Weighers, Joseph Bernier, William H. Doonan, John E. Fowler, John T. Barnes, David C. Emond, Camille J. Vaillancourt, J. Alfred Chouinard, Romuald Thibault, Helen Pelletier, A. E. Rouse, Honore Rousseau.

Voted that all other officers not elected at this meeting be appointed by the Selectmen.

Article 2. See Selectmen's report for appropriations.

Article 3. Voted to accept reports of Auditors, Committees and Officers heretofore chosen, as printed.

Article 4. Voted to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$171.74 to be used jointly with the State for Town aid.

Article 6. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$114.00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire, for advertising the town.

Aritcle 7. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to rebuild the road from a point near the residence of T. Lizotte to Lower Mill Street, to include the piece of road south of property of Nora Welch.

Article 8. Voted to accept the gift of \$1,000.00 from the Greenville Mills Inc. to the Park Commissioners to be expended on the Taft Memorial Playground.

Article 9. Voted to take no action on this article.

Article 10. Voted to borrow the sum of \$6,500.00 to extend domestic water line to the residences of Yvonne Leger and Charles Comer, on Temple Road.

Article 11. Voted to borrow the sum of \$3,500.00 to extend Town Fire Line along Temple Road approximately 900 feet, the said amount of \$3,500.00 to be paid off by Serial notes.

Article 12. Voted to borrow the sum of \$6,500.00 to extend domestic water supply on Lower Mill Street to a point near the residence being constructed by Harold Martin.

Voted that the sums of \$6,500.00 as voted in Articles 10 and 12 be paid off in 13 Serial Notes of \$1,000.00 annually.

Article 13. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for a new hydrant to be placed beyond residence of Amelia Lizotte on Old Mason Road.

Article 14. Voted to authorize the Park Commissioners to accept any money given them for recreational purposes, and to spend same as they see fit.

Article 15. Voted to authorize the expenditure of \$3,000.00 from the Myrtle M. Marsh legacy for use on Ida F. Taft Memorial Playground by the Park Commission.

Article 16. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to accept for the Town a deed of the reservoir on Dunster Hill, and its appurtenances.

Article 17. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract in behalf of the Town with Greenville Mills Inc. providing (a) for the maintenance and operation of the reservoir, water main lines and hydrants by the Town for fire protection purposes. (b) the furnishing of pumping service for said system by Greenville Mills Inc., (c) such other terms as the selectmen may deem in the public interest in furtherance of adequate fire protection for the town.

Voted: That in the Town Reports beginning in 1950 there shall be incorporated the actions taken on the Articles of the Warrants, exclusive of the Budget, acted on at the preceding Town Meeting.

Voted to adjourn at 9:15 P. M.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects: bring in your ballots for the following town officers:

Town Clerk for one year; one selectman for three years; town treasurer for one year; tax collector for one year; highway agent for one year; one water commissioner for one year; one Trustee of Trust Funds for two years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for two years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for one year; Library Trustee for three years; two auditors for one year; three fire wards for one year;

And at eight o'clock in the afternoon of the same day the same place to act upon the following subjects:

- Art 1. To choose all necessary officers not chosen by Australian ballot.
- Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- Art. 3. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$171.92, the State to contribute \$687.66, these amounts to be used jointly for town road aid, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$119.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the Town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hamp-

shire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine, advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other 37 towns of the Monadnock Region.

- Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to place a street light on Baker Avenue, raise and appropriate a sum of money for same, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to surface and tar Baker Avenue or take any action thereon.
- Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to rebuild and tar the road from Mill Street to Honore Housseau's or take any action thereon.
- Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to build a sidewalk on River Street or take any action thereon.
- Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to decorate the Town Hall at Christmas or take any action thereon.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to plan suitable strong guard rails or abutments on Number 6 Bridge, raise and appropriate a sum of money for same, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 to paint and renovate the Selectmen's Room or take any action thereon.
- Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30 for the purpose of disposing of the temporary World War II Honor Roll after a permanent record of the names now appearing on said Honor Roll has been made in the form of a photograph and that photograph placed with the Town Records, or take any action thereon.
- Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to place new Street Lights along Main Street raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same or take any action thereon.
- Art 16. To see if the Town will vote to build a new road from the Temple Road, westerly and northerly through the Greenville Mills property, to serve any new houses to be built on this property, raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same or take any action thereon.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to repair or replace the present Town Hall Clock, raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same or take any action thereon.

REPORT OF FIREWARDS

FOREST FIRES—OUR MOST SHAMEFUL WASTE

Everyone apparently fears fires but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 percent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say, "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gain-

ful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds

to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public—YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVENTION—fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

- 1. Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
- 2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
- 3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
- 4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.

The library has been open every Monday and Wednesday evening, and Friday afternoon of the past year. When a legal holiday came on Monday the library was open the following Tuesday.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 14th day of March 1950 at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing two years.
 - 5. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 6. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 7. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 8. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 to provide an additional \$15,000 of insurance on the Public School Building.

REPORT OF SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF GREENVILLE:

I respectfully submit my third annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

INSTRUCTION

I am pleased to report that your school under the able direction of Mrs. Helene Greene with the very competent assistance of Mrs. Edna LaPierre and Mrs. Mary Pelletier is showing steady progress. The morale and spirit is the highest it has been in quite some time. This has been reflected in the renewed interest that the parents and friends have taken in the school and school activities.

Every effort is being made to improve the instruction in your school. Your teachers are actively interested in improving themselves professionally. Mrs. Greene, Mrs. LaPierre and Miss Wheeler participated in an extension course held the past fall and winter at Wilton. This involved much time, effort and expense.

The educational program is being developed to fit the needs of the individual child rather than the group as a whole. Our testing program is planned to aid the teachers in determining the abilities of the individual, his strengths and weaknesses. An intelligence test is given to each pupil each year in grades 3, 6 and 8. An achievement test is given each May, and as often throughout the year as the need arises. Thus, we are able to judge from year to year the progress each child is making and the areas in which more emphasis must be placed.

Two years ago we adopted a new spelling series to help improve this area of work. This series emphasizes word analysis and paragraph writing rather than lists of words. We have already observed a marked improvement in this area as well as in vocabulary work. At the same time we inaugurated a new language series, replacing one that had been in use for many years. This series has contributed greatly in enlivening and improving the work in this subject.

An outstanding piece of work has been done in correlating art with the social studies, particularly in grades 6, 7, and 8. It is surprising the art ability that has been uncovered in this group.

Field trips have contributed a great deal to the young people's understanding of their community. These trips are a definite and vital part of their education.

Our visual education program has been expanded this year and we have been able to bring into the classroom many experiences, which otherwise the young people would not be getting. A well-planned audio-visual program will do twice the teaching in half the time.

Miss Wheeler is to be commended for the very fine work she has been doing with the young people in music. Her performances have indicated excellent and proficient planning.

The nursing services have been carried out well under the capable supervision of Miss Sybil Beatham. An effort has been made to keep the parents informed of the health status of their children

BUILDING IMPROVEMENTS

At the last annual meeting the district voted to alter the front of the public school building and to install boys' and girls' lavatories on the first floor. The work was carried out with dispatch, so that when school opened this fall they were ready for use.

The lavatories present a modern, clean, healthy appearance, a marked improvement over that which we had a year ago. The rooms are painted in light pastel shades, with artificial tiling partly up the walls. The floors are covered with heavy duty linoleum. The wash bowls are of new white porcelain and very attractive. We were able to use some of the fixtures in the old basements, thus reducing the cost and making it possible to complete the renovation within the budget provided.

Placing the new lavatories on the first floor has done everything that we expected in the area of supervision and administration. It is much easier to supervise and develop good health habits and attitudes than formerly.

The exterior of the building was painted for the first time in many years, thus giving our building a neat, trim appearance.

We have the two halls to replaster and repaint. With this done our building will be in excellent condition and very easy to maintain.

BUDGET

The school board's budget for 1950-51 calls for an appropriation of \$20,244.63 an increase of \$544.73 over last year's. These increases are reflected in teachers' salaries \$545.00; insurance, bonds and expenses \$200.63; administrative expenses (largely controlled by Supervisory Union Boards) \$185.12; expenses related to operation of school plant \$64.00; miscellaneous as health supervision, textbooks, scholars' supplies, etc. \$140.00. Thus, the aggregate increases become \$1,134.75. Certain economies and reductions of expenses were effected to the extent of \$590.00, making the net increase the amount quoted above.

It will be noted that the only income that can be estimated for 1950-51 is that for elementary tuitions, amounting to approximately \$150.00. Previous to a meeting of the last Legislature, all dog taxes were turned over to the school district. The new law specifies that the dog tax shall be retained by the Town Treasurer and not passed over to the School Treasurer. This act became effective Jan. 1, 1950.

The total assessment required to cover the school board's budget for 1950-51, is \$20,094.63 an increase of \$3,447.77 over that of last year. A loss of \$2,903.02 in income is realized due to the fact that the dog tax will not be forthcoming as described above, and also because the school board cannot visualize a balance of \$2,803.02 as it did on June 30, 1949.

I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board and Citizens of Greenville for the excellent cooperation they have given me this past year.

STATE CHILD HEALTH AND IMMUNIZATION CLINIC

The annual child health and immunization clinic was held at Legion Hall, the morning of May 26, 1949, with twenty-eight pre-school children and infants in attendance.

A committee of local women from the Legion Auxiliary weighed and measured each child and a history was taken, then he was given a physical examination and if desired, immunization.

There were thirteen pre-schools given their first inoculation against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus. These same children received a second and a third inoculation by Dr. Harlan Karr, on July 1 and August 3 respectively thus completing their immunization against the three before-mentioned diseases.

There were ten vaccinations against smallpox. Dr. Harlan Karr and Dr. Norman Jackson were the examining physicians assisted by Sybil Beatham, R. N., and Alexine Duval, R. N.

Mrs. Christine Gainey, chairman, Mrs. Jeanne Caouette, Mrs. Alexine Caron and Mrs. Lucille Dube assisted in the routine work at the clinic.

Mrs. Alexine Caron gave her services at the 2nd and 3rd innoculation clinics, as recording secretary. Dr. Hector Thibeault administered the serum at the third clinic and also gave six vaccinations.

Each child needing corrective work was visited after the clinic and the conditions needing correction explained to the mother and ways and means of obtaining it were discussed.
