SYNOPSIS OF 1952 TOWN MEETING

March 11-12, 1952

Number of Ballots Cast 418

The Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, William H. Doonan and Polls were opened at 10 o'clock A. M., March 11th, 1952.

Acting under Article 1 of the Town Warrant, the Town Officers were elected as printed on Pages 3 and 4 of this report.

At 8:15 P. M. it was voted to adjourn to March 12th, 1952 at 8:15 P. M.

The adjourned meeting was called to order by the Moderator, William H. Doonan at 8:15 P. M., March 12th 1952 and the remaining articles of the warrant were disposed of as follows:

Article 2. See Selectmen's Report for Appropriations.

Article 3. Voted to accept reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees as printed.

Article 4. Voted to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. Voted not to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made.

Article 6. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for a new pump for the fire department and two additional fire alarm boxes, one alarm to be situated on Pleasant Street, about one half way up the street and one on Temple Street at entrance to Kimball Heights.

Article 7. Voted to give the use of the Town Hall during the basketball season free of charge to the Junior and Senior Basketball Teams whenever it is not already rented.

Article 8. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control.

Article 9. Voted to adopt a plan for extending benefits of the Federal Social Security Act to employees of the Town, and \$60.00 was raised and appropriated therefor.

Article 10. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to execute the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry out the plan adopted under Article 9 and the Town Treasurer was designated as the Officer to administer the plan.

Article 11. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for a street light near the residences of Bonaventure Godin and Armand Morneau on Temple Street.

Article 12. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$107.50 to install a street light on Temple Street near the residence of Alfred Chouinard.

Article 13. Voted to accept a parcel of land for highway use at Kimball Heights.

Voted to adjourn at 9:45 P. M.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, then and there to bring in your ballot for the following town officers:

Town Clerk for one year; one selectman for three years; town treasurer for one year; tax collector for one year; highway agent for one year; one water commissioner for three years; one trustee of trust fund for three years; one library trustee for three years; two auditors for one year; three firewards for one year.

And at eight of the clock in the afternoon of the same day, at the same place to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To choose all necessary officers not chosen by Australian ballot.

Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Art. 3. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or to take any action thereon.

Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and raise and appropriate a sum of money to cover the expenses of such an audit.

Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250 to install three new street lights at Kimball Heights, or take any action thereon.

Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to complete the road at Kimball Heights, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500 for same, or take any action thereon.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen or the Firewards to sell the old Fire Truck.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to build a road leading from High Street to residence of Ernest Bernier, raise and appropriate a sum of money for same, or take any action thereon.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to make a new contract with the Greenville Electric Lighting Co. concerning the street lights or take any action thereon.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to purchase the tennis courts or either of them from the Pease estate as a complement to the playground, limit them as to purchase price or take any action thereon.

REPORT OF THE GREENVILLE PARK COMMISSION

TO THE CITIZENS OF GREENVILLE:

We respectfully submit our annual report as your Park Commissioners.

TAFT MEMORIAL PLAYGROUND

Numerous improvements to the playground were made in the past year including the staining of the grandstand seats and equipment house. A blind ditch was made extending from home-plate down the third base line to allow for more adequate drainage. More loam was secured to raise the level of home-plate and a few other low spots in the diamond. A blind ditch was dug around the drinking fountain and crushed stone laid around the base to provide better drainage and eliminate having to stand in a muddy area while using the fountain. Crushed stone was placed around the base of the flag pole and the memorial stone for the purpose of beautification and ease of mowing.

RECREATION PROGRAM

As in the past several years through the efforts of the Civic Playground Committee another successful summer program was furnished. This program included numerous activities at the playground in the field of sports and games. Swimming was provided twice weekly and several baseball trips and all day outings were provided. Basketball has been offered this winter twice weekly, once for girls and once for boys. Monthly dances have also been held.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF GREENVILLE:

I respectfully submit my sixth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

INSTRUCTION

I am pleased to again report that the education of your children is being very capably handled by Mr. Benjamin Macey, Mrs. Mary Pelletier, Mrs. Edna LaPierre and Miss Elsie Wheeler.

Instrumental flutes have been added to the music program during the past year. This instrument develops in the child a sense of rhythm and a concrete desire to read notes and understand some of the technicalities of music composition. There is a sense of deep satisfaction developed in the child when he feels that he can play a musical instrument with comparative ease.

We are still carrying on a complete testing program as explained last year, with the addition of the California Test of Personality. This test is administered each year to grade five youngsters. The function of the test is to reveal the degree to which each pupil is self-adjusted and socially adjusted. The teacher is thereby aided in understanding the child and his reactions to certain situations that may arise in the classroom and on the playground. This test acts as a guide for placing the pupil in activities and situations where he will become a well-rounded and adjusted individual.

A new reporting system in the form of a revised report card was introduced this fall, which we feel affords the teacher a more adequate device for reporting the growth and achievement of a child, than was previously used. All systems of reporting a child's progress in school, by use of a **Report Card** are necessarily limited. Thus we attempt to supplement the report card by written notes, telephone conversations, and personal conferences. We are eager to have parents consult with us so that we may arrive at common understandings and do the best work possible for your children.

The School Savings Program has become a definite part of the educational offerings of the school. One day each week is set aside for the children to purchase school savings stamps, ranging in price from 10¢ to \$1.00. These stamps are placed in a book and when the book is filled (\$18.75) it is turned in for a \$25.00 Defense Bond. During the school year 1951-52, the Greenville school children saved \$169.70. The six towns in Supervisory Union No. 63, participating in this program, saved \$3,323.50.

HEALTH SUPERVISION

We have been able to maintain a school comparatively free from communicable and infectious diseases, due largely to the frequent and careful inspections made by the school nurse, Miss Sybil Beatham, and the school doctor, Dr. Harlan Karr. However, this success could not have been so complete if we had not had the fine cooperation and assistance extended to us by the parents. Details of the health program is noted in the School Nurse Report.

NO SCHOOL POLICY

The Greenville School Board has established the following policy relative to keeping school on stormy days. Our school will be open every day regardless of the weather unless it should be so extreme that the bus cannot operate. Thus parents will be assured that when they send their children to school there will always be somebody there to receive them. On extremely stormy days, parents are encouraged to use their own judgment and keep their children home if they feel that it is in the best interests of health and safety to do so.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

The re-roofing of two sides of the building has been completed, and faulty areas on the other two sides and gables repaired. This has eliminated the leakage that we were formerly experiencing.

Thorough cleaning of the paintwork that was done the past three years, is keeping the interior of the school in good repair and delays the time when repainting will be necessary.

The 1953-54 budget has made provisions for funds to repair the chimney and to install an incinerator in the basement of the school. The chimney is getting to be a real danger and this should be attended to as soon as funds are available. The incinerator will remove a fire hazard that has been in existence for some time. Paper in a school accumulates and unless frequently removed can be a real danger. Burning or removing waste every night is a recommended procedure for public schools.

A program of black-topping a small area of the school each summer was started last summer. This will provide a good play area for children during all seasons; will eliminate the muddy situation previously existing; will provide a hard surface on which game lines can be painted, and also will provide an adequate parking area in the school yard the year around. A sum is provided in the budget to continue this project.

FINANCE

The School Board's Budget for 1953-54 calls for an increase, \$4,706.67, as compared to last year's budget. This increase is reflected in Tuitions—\$1,750; Expenses of Instruction \$1,144.43; Transportation—\$600; Capital Outlay—\$525; Expenses of Administration \$278.18; Operation of School Plant—\$242; Health Supervision \$115; Fixed Charges—\$47.39; Miscellaneous items—\$4.67.

The budget has been very carefully worked over and every effort has been made to provide the funds necessary to carry on an effective educational program as economically and efficiently as possible.

CONCLUSION

I wish to thank the Greenville School Board and the citizens of Greenville for their continued support and assistance the past year.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

Another year has ended for the School Nurse and in checking

my records I find that there was no large number of absences for the communicable diseases. Colds, as usual, were prevalent but it was a comparatively good year.

As School Nurse I made eleven visits to the Greenville Public School to examine the children for communicable disease and to aid the Doctor in his yearly examination of the pupils.

The children were weighed and measured twice during the year and most of the children showed a satisfactory gain but in one or two cases there was not the satisfactory loss that was to be desired.

I tested the eyes of the pupils by means of the Snellon Eye Chart and sent notes to the parents whose children seemed to require further attention. By means of the group audiometer I also ran a screening test of the pupils' hearing and am checking those who showed loss with a single audiometer.

I tested the eyes of the children by means of the Snellon Chart and hope to complete the charting soon.

I accompanied Dr. Karr when he made his examination of the pupils and assisted in this work.
