TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, then and there to bring in your ballots for the following town officers:

Town Clerk for one year; one Selectman for three years; Town Treasurer for one year; Tax Collector for one year; Highway Agent for one year; one Water Commissioner for three years; one Trustee of Trust Funds for one year; one Library Trustee for three years; two Auditors for one year; and three Firewards for one year.

And at eight of the clock in the afternoon of the same day, at the same place, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary officers not chosen by the Australian ballot.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

Article 3. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any action thereon.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and raise and appropriate a sum of money to cover the expenses of such an audit.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to convey to Alexander M. Taft and Robert Taft, both of Greenville, all the rights, title and interest acquired under the will of Mary McKaig Taft, in and to all real estate in which said Mary McKaig Taft had an interest situated in Greenville, or take any other action thereon.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell a certain piece of land, said land formerly part of old dump located on Route 31, to Ernest Butler.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell a certain piece of land to Arthur Chouinard, said land running parallel and adjoining property of Eva and Arthur Chouinard.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to resurface the town hall roof, or take any action thereon.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to build a new road at Honore Rousseau's, said land being deeded to the Town and accepted at the 1956 Town Meeting, or take any other action thereon.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to have a new heating system installed at the fire station, raise and appropriate a sum of money for same, or take any other action thereon.

Article 12. To see if the Town of Greenville will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to restore water facilities at the Playground, or take any action thereon. (By petition).

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light on pole opposite the Federated Church Chapel, or take any action thereon. (By petition).

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a truck suitable for use on the highways both in summer and winter, and for use by other town departments, payment of same to be made from monies formerly raised for post-war construction, and now listed in the Trust Funds of the Town, or take any other action thereon. (By petition).

**SYNOPSIS OF 1957 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING
MARCH 12, 1957**

Number of Ballots Cast—305

The Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, William H. Doonan, at 10:00 a. m. After the reading of the Warrant by the Moderator, the polls were opened for voting by Australian Ballot.

At 5:00 p. m. it was voted to close the polls at 6:00 p. m.

For results of voting for Town Officers, see page 3 of this report.

At 8:00 p. m. of the same day, the Meeting was called to order by the Moderator and the articles in the Warrant were disposed of as follows:

Article 1. For Town Officers chosen, see page 3 of this report.

Article 2. See Selectmen's report for Appropriations made.

Article 3. Voted to accept reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, and Officers heretofore chosen as printed in the Town Report.

Article 4. Voted to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. Voted not to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made.

Article 6. Voted that the Selectmen be empowered to call for sealed bids from the three local dealers of General Electric, Westinghouse and Frigidaire appliances for one 1957 30 inch standard electric range, payment to be taken from the M. M. Marsh fund.

Article 7. Voted not to accept a tract of land from Mrs. Ernest Bernier for highway purposes.

Article 8. Voted that the Town accept the bequest from the estate of Mary McKaig Taft and that the Selectmen appoint a committee of five to bring in recommendations at the next town meeting for the expenditure of this bequest, in accordance with the terms of the will that this amount be spent for the benefit of the children of Greenville.

Voted to adjourn at 10:10 p. m.

Forest Fire Prevention is Everybody's Business

New Hampshire faces a continuing challenge in its forest fire problem—97 percent of all our forest fires being man-caused and preventable—a serious indictment of interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbor. Both the State and the towns are striving diligently to effectively meet the challenge through education of the public to the threat fire presents to our woodlands; by maintaining a well trained corps of wardens and deputy wardens in every community and by providing ample opportunity for all who wish to dispose of unwanted waste materials. Careless and perverseness, however, continue to be the big hurdles.

Thoughtlessly discarded lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles, by hikers, hunters and fishermen; careless burning of debris during hazardous periods in dangerous locations; illegal burning; improperly extinguished debris, camp and cook fires—all result in serious loss of property, disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

To meet the challenge successfully, the state, your community and your local forest fire warden need YOUR thoughtful and cooperative effort—The rules are simple.

1. Don't burn at home—use your town dump and avoid all fire problems.

2. If you do burn, be sure to secure a written permit from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow. Permits are required for open debris fires, home incinerators, outdoor fire places and camp fires. Your warden is instructed to permit burning if weather conditions, site and type of burning are safe.

3. Be sure that all lighted material—cigars, cigarettes and matches—are completely out before discarding them. Use ash trays in automobiles.

4. Make certain that your debris, camp and cook fires are completely out before leaving them.

5. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.

6. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

REMEMBER—the fire you prevent might be the one which could burn YOUR property.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN
CHAMBERLIN FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY
YEAR OF 1957

This year, through the efforts of Robert Taft, trustee, the Library has acquired a name sign over the door. This is something long needed and much appreciated. The name Chamberlin Free Public Library is in goldleaf on a black background and is most effective. There is no need now for anyone to ask, where is the Library in Greenville?

The library has continued to be of use to various organizations for food sales and committee meetings. There has been an increase in the circulation of books; 1,756 more books and magazines were loaned this year than in 1956. Many books have been borrowed from the State Library. Over 80 books, on various subjects ranging from TV and Radio Repair to duties of air line hostesses, have been borrowed from Concord for the use of individual patrons.

The Bookmobile has made its quarterly visits and an average of 70 books have been borrowed each time. This is a 50% increase over the number of books borrowed when the Bookmobile first came to Greenville.

Mrs. Marian Buttrick, trustee, and your Librarian attended the neighborhood meeting held at the Gregg Free Library in Wilton. Mr. Emil Allen Jr., assistant State Librarian was the speaker and it was an interesting afternoon.

As a help to the schools, books have been loaned for a two month period to both the Sacred Heart and Public Schools for supplementary reading. During book week in November there was a display of new books for young people, pre-school through High. Grades 1 and 2, with their teacher, visited the Library at this time and they were given instructions in the use of the Library and its books, and told a story by the Librarian. Several new borrowers resulted from this visit.

One of the most popular summer reading contests was held in 1957 under the name of "World Traveler" for grades 4, 5 and 6 and "The Book-Worm" for grades 1, 2 and 3. Fifty-two youngsters qualified, each reading at least 3 books. Excitement ran high during the period of the contest. At the close of the contest a party was held at the home of Mrs. Russell Kimball with 40 children present. Valerie Vaillancourt and Carol Lafreniere assisted Mrs. Kimball with the party.

Your Library has had several exhibits this year and we are grateful to young Maurice Emonds for the loan of his model cars.

During the year 238 books were added to the collection and of these 66 were presented to the Library by the following: Mrs. Frank Reed, Miss Doris Wheeler, Miss Bertha Greene, Mrs. James Hitchcock, Mrs. Josephine Gale, Mrs. Harriet Brooks, Mrs. Emily Wiggin, William Niemi and Russell Kimball.

Many interested friends have also furnished the Library with extra magazines and paper bound books, all of which were gratefully received and for which we express appreciation.

Eight outstanding books, of lasting interest to young people, were purchased with the Corabelle Robbins' fund. These books were on astronomy, science, nature and the American Indian.

Miss Valerie Vaillancourt put in many helpful hours in the Library during the summer, while she was earning her Library Badge in Scouting. I wish to express my appreciation for her assistance. I wish also to express my grateful appreciation to the Trustees for their co-operation and help.

Your Library's goal for 1958 is—to continue to give the same services now available.

Be proud of your Library, and use it, for the acquiring of knowledge and for reading pleasure.

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO STUDY REPAIRS AND
IMPROVEMENTS TO WAR MEMORIAL**

The committee has discussed ways of making improvements to the present Common in front of the Town Hall and has come to the conclusion that the practical solution to this problem is to relocate the World War I Memorial from its present location to a new one. With today's problems in snow removal to accommodate traffic and the method of using salt for winter road care the committee is of the opinion that the memorial should be located away from traffic.

The plot of land discussed as being suitable is the one directly across from the present Legion home where years ago benches were provided for the people. An area in the center of this plot could be filled to a level grade with a retaining wall built around the area and steps leading to the Memorial from the lower side. Loam should be added and seeded.

The committee has estimated that the cost of the work involved in the removal of the Memorial and the construction of the new plot would probably be in the vicinity of \$500.

SCHOOL NURSE REPORT

For the third year in a row the emphasis had to be put on the administration of the Salk Polio Vaccine but the program was finally completed in May 1957 and a great number of school children, as well as pre-school children, were inoculated against the disease. The Greenville PTA and the Sodality of the Sacred Heart Church aided greatly in this work by supplying clerks and helpers when the clinics were held. Due to the lack of vaccine in April it was necessary to have a third clinic in May to give the third shots to as many as possible.

I made twelve visits to each school during the year in order to

carry out the work of the school Nurse. I weighed and measured the children during the year and most are gaining slowly but surely. Overweight is a problem of some of the children that seems to show little progress.

I used the telebinocular and Puretone Hearing Machine to test the vision and hearing of the children and hope to complete the examinations next year. There were none found with a hearing loss at this time.

I assisted Dr. Wellwood when he examined the children in November and sent notices to the parents.

School Nurse

In Greenville the State Department of Health conducted a series of clinics for the inoculation of children under the age of twenty, and pregnant women, with Salk Vaccine, to immunize them against Poliomyelitis.

Local women of the various service clubs and registered nurses in the area assisted the following doctors — Robert Wellwood, M. D., Greenville; Claire Cayward, M. D., New Ipswich; Oscar Burns, M. D. and Augusta Law, M. D., Milford.

There were a total of seven hundred and sixteen inoculations given — school children received four hundred and eighty three inoculations, pre-school children got two hundred and eighty five inoculations and pregnant women received eight inoculations.

The Polio Foundation through their March of Dimes Fund, furnished the initial doses of Salk Vaccine to the State Departments throughout the United States.

REPORT OF MUSIC SUPERVISOR

The music program is adapted to the grades and ages of the children. In the primary room the girls and boys are taught many songs by rote, that is, by imitation. Help is given individually so that a tune can be carried correctly. Activities such as marching, skipping, clapping, dramatizing songs and folk dancing are enjoyed. Playing in the rhythm band (which is a collection of rhythm sticks, bells, triangles, drums, etc.) develops good listening habits as well as rhythm. During the second grade simple note reading is introduced.

The ability to read music, along with music theory, is developed as the children progress from grade to grade. In the upper grades, other class activities include listening to recordings, stories of composers and musical instruments, playing song flutes, folk and square dancing.

Music has been used in assemblies, graduation exercises and programs.

A high point of musical performance was, when at the invitation of the Greenville Mills, Inc., a group of twenty-two boys and girls from the intermediate and grammar rooms presented a pageant at the Mill Christmas party.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenville:

I respectfully submit my first annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

STAFF AND INSTRUCTION

The Greenville School opened this fall with a single change in the staff. Greenville is very fortunate to have employed Mrs. Delphine Crafts to teach Grades 1 and 2 in place of Mrs. Edna LaPierre who accepted a position in Littleton, Massachusetts. Mrs. Crafts holds a B.S. in Ed. Degree from Framingham State Teachers' College, has ten years of classroom teaching experience plus many years of work in the field of Social Service and as a Personnel Director. Her most recent experience has been as an elementary teacher in Ashland, Massachusetts.

Mrs. Anita Sinkervitch is teaching this year in Grades 3 thru 5, and Mr. Romuald Sinkervitch is handling Grades 6 thru 8, in addition to his responsibility as Principal of the building. We have been very fortunate to have Mr. and Mrs. Sinkervitch with us for this second year. It is sincerely felt that a stable staff develops the strongest schools. In such a situation a constant philosophy can be developed, and adjustments between pupils, parents and teachers, kept to a minimum.

Miss Elsie Wheeler continues to do a fine job as Music Supervisor and teacher. Her recent Christmas Program was very well received. Miss Sybil M. Beatham continues to do a fine job in supervising the health of our children with the assistance of Dr. Robert Wellwood.

One of the greatest problems facing school administrators and school boards today is to find qualified and certified elementary teachers to fill vacant positions and newly created positions. The supply from colleges, and former teachers who have been family raisers, is fast drying up. This scarcity, plus the fact that teachers are not inclined to search out positions involving multiple-graded rooms, makes Greenville's problem clear. Hold teachers doing a good job, and take steps to reduce three-graded room situations if at all possible.

Essentially there are two basic factors that influence the obtaining and holding of good teachers. First, salaries that are attractive, and secondly, good working conditions.

Working conditions, it seems, should be thoroughly explored, because this is perhaps the more important factor in Greenville, since salaries are comparable to those in this area. Working conditions includes many definite and some rather subtle factors. Definite factors for example, would be number of pupils and grades in a room, supplies to work with, proper heat, light, etc. More subtle factors which influence a teacher deciding to teach or not

to teach in Greenville might include; pupil, parental and general attitude toward school; pupil and parental feelings about teachers; respect for, critical of, cooperation with, sympathy for, etc. Such subtle feelings expressed directly or indirectly, determine whether a teacher is happy or not on the job, whether the teacher decides to accept or reject a contract. It is generally agreed that a teacher, or anyone else for that matter, does his or her best work when she or he is happy. Under such conditions greatest educational progress is made. It therefore becomes, at any time, but especially in these days of teacher shortage, a pupil, parental, and citizenry responsibility to each to do his or her little part to attract and hold good teachers. Responsibility thus assumed will result in the best quality of education for Greenville's children.

Good progress is being made at the Greenville school, considering the conditions under which teachers are operating. Three grades under the direction of a single teacher requires about twenty-four different preparations a day, not considering different levels of instruction within a single academic area. Under such circumstances a teacher's effort is being quite thinly spread, but in spite of this it is felt that proper academic progress is being achieved.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS

The general condition of the plant is good. A portable protective shelter has been erected over the west side door to make the opening and closing of the door easier under the high winds that blast that area, and also to save heat within the building by permitting the door to close rapidly.

Several areas within the building have been in need of painting, and within this year's budget provisions have been made to take care of this need. Maintenance work of this sort should be regularly planned to properly maintain the building and spread costs over several budgets.

SPECIAL ARTICLES

Article 9 and 10 of the Warrant provide an opportunity for the District to make a decision relative to the matter of providing additional educational opportunity for all Greenville youngsters. Actually there are three choices: One, maintain the current arrangement; Two, provide an additional room in the current building; and Three, send 7th and 8th grade children to Appleton Academy.

Noted below are the room arrangements and primary consideration for each Plan A, B, and C.

- e. Study periods are used in the 7th and 8th grades and use is made of the library.
- f. Having pupils attend in the 7th and 8th grades might help them to adjust to High School life and thus perhaps encourage them to stay in school after 14 yrs. of age rather than drop out as has been the case in the past.
5. One disadvantage in having these youngsters attend Appleton Academy would be that the school day would be longer.

FINANCE

The School Board's Budget for 1958-59 calls for an appropriation of \$46,812.11, an increase of \$6,525.45. The increase is brought about by additional costs in the following areas: Tax for State-Wide Supervision \$24.00; Salaries of Other Administrative Personnel \$103.80; Teachers' Salaries \$740.00; Repairs and Replacements \$130.00; Health Supervision \$25.00; Transportation \$358.00; Tuition \$5,645.00; Insurance and Bonds \$172.94. Decreases appear in the items of Superintendent's Salary (local share) \$227.10; Teachers' Retirement \$159.26; and Capital Outlay \$290.00.

Income of the District however is expected to increase from \$905.39 in this current year to \$2,490.00 in 1958-59, making the Estimated Assessment required to meet School Board's Budget \$44,322.11 an increase of \$4,940.84 over this current year's assessment.

It will be noted that the largest area of increase is Tuition, a statutory obligation, and one caused by increased high school tuition costs at both Appleton and Peterborough. Both schools will charge the State Average of \$367, compared with \$325 and \$354 costs per pupil for this year. This item has also increased because of the greater number of children planning on attending high school, 60 next year compared with 43 during this current year. These costs and numbers of high school pupils it appears will continue on upward in years to come. For example in 1962-63, based on current census projections, over 100 pupils in Greenville could be attending high school and perhaps at a rate of \$400 per pupil, or \$40,000, which is equal to the current assessment. It would seem wise to investigate the possibility of obtaining a lower cost per pupil rate by considering an exclusive contract arrangement with Appleton Academy, or some other school.

CONCLUSION

I wish to thank the Greenville School Board, Staff, and Townspeople for their cooperation, assistance and help in continuing the fine educational program of the Greenville School.
