TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Community Hall in the Town House in said Greenville on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Town Clerk for one year; one Selectman for three years; Town Treasurer for one year; Tax Collector for one year; Highway Agent for one year; one Water Commissioner for three years; one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years; one Library Trustee for three years; two Auditors for one year; and three Firewards for one year.

And at eight of the clock in the afternoon of the same day, at the Town Hall Auditorium, to act upon the following subjecs:

Article 1. To choose all necessary officers not chosen by the Australian Ballot.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

Article 3. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any action thereon.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and raise and appropriate a sum of money to cover the expenses of such an audit.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to have a Town Budget Committee to be appointed by the Moderator, or take any other action thereon.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to paint and repair the Community Hall so-called.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to clean and widen brook from George Lord's residence to Robert Pelletier's or take any action thereon.

Article 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to finish construction of the road at Rousseau's, or take any action thereon.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee to investigate the possibilities of setting up a signal system for fire and police departments by telephone when the dial system is installed.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to establish a street light on the pole near the residence of Jean B. Gamache.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen the authority to appoint the Chief Fire Ward effective after the expiration of the term of the present Fire Ward.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee of three to look into the advisability of replacing the floor in the Town Hall Auditorium.

Article 14. To see if the Town will appoint a committee of five at this meeting to investigate the advisability of centralizing the supervision of all the Town Departments, said committee to be appointed from the floor and report at the next Annual Town Meeting.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to extend the fire alarm system from the last box on lower Mill Street to residence of Harold Martin or take any action thereon.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to purchase an Air-Pac for the fire department or take any action thereon.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$395.00 to purchase a portable pump for the Fire Department or take any action thereon.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 to paint two sides of the fire station or take any action thereon.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$120.00 to purchase and install an overhead door at the fire station or take any action thereon.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$2,300.00 to purchase a car for the Police Department, or take any action thereon.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow the sum of \$2,900.00 to have Anderson-Nichols & Company, Inc., Consulting Engineers of Concord, New Hampshire, conduct a preliminary engineering investigation of the Town's water system and prepare a preliminary report of their findings, said amount to be repaid by the Water Commissioners.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to buy athletic equipment for the Greenville Boys' Club or take any action thereon.

Synopsis of 1960 Annual Town Meeting March 8, 1960

Number of Ballots Cast - 483

The Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, William H. Doonan, at 10:00 A.M. After the reading of the Warrant by the Moderator, the polls were opened for voting by Australian ballot. At 10:15 A.M., it was voted to close the polls at 6:00 P.M., and to adjourn action on the articles in the Warrant to Thursday, March 10, at 8:00 P.M.

At 8:00 P.M., on March 10, 1960, the meeting was called to order by the Moderator and the articles in the Warrant were disposed of as follows:

- Article 1: For Town Officers chosen, see page 3 of this report.
- Article 2: See Selectmen's report for appropriations made.
- Article 3: Voted to accept reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers as printed in the Town Report.
- Article 4: Voted to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 5: Voted not to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, State Tax Commission.
- Article 6: Voted to instruct the Moderator to appoint a committee of nine, consisting of one Selectman, one School Board member, and the majority of the other seven property owners, as a Budget Committee for the ensuing year. The following persons were named to the committee.

Joseph C. Caouette, Chairman Priscilla Phipps Napoleon Bouley Marcel Gauvin J. W. Buttrick, Jr. Guy Arnold Clyde S. Eaton Rosario Bernier James C. McCuddy Article 8: Voted to appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to purchase a fence and gate, and make other improvements at the easterly part of the Pleasant Street Cemetery, this money to be taken from the Myrtle M. Marsh Fund "for the improvement of the new part of the Cemetery."

Article 8: Voted to establish a "mercury" street light at the junction of Pleasant and Main Streets. Voted to adjourn at 8:55 P.M.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN CHAMBERLIN FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY YEAR OF 1960

Once again it is time for the Librarian to make her an-

nual report to the trustees.

We feel that the Library has been a vital part of the community this past year. More and more school children are using the Library for reference work and just reading for pleasure.

The Story Hour for Grades 1, 2 and 3 was well patronized and the Reading Contest for Grades 4, 5 and 6 was

quite successful, with Jane Eaton the top reader.

The number of patrons of the Library this year was 5,660 and 6,896 books were loaned. Of these 2,679 were non-fiction, which is always gratifying to a librarian.

The Library observed National Library Week by holding Open House on April 7 and on April 3 the librarian, Mr. Kimball, Mrs. J. W. Buttrick, Sr, trustee, Esther Kimball and Doris Wheeler attended the Open House of the Peterborough Library.

In March Mrs. Kimball and Mr. Robert Taft, trustee, attended the neighborhood meeting held in Mason Library. This meeting was devoted to a discussion of children's books and reading programs for elementary grades.

For attending this meeting the Library was presented by the New Hampshire State Library with three books: "The Way of The Story Teller", by Ruth Sawyer and two books of interest to young people, "Witches, Witches, Witches" and "Champlain of the St. Lawrence."

In November Mrs. Buttrick, trustee and Mrs. Kimball went to the Fall Neighborhood Meeting at the Gregg Free Library in Wilton. The theme of this meeting was "Teen-

Agers and their reading interests."

We gratefully acknowledge the many books given to the Library during the past year by interested friends of the library. Miss Esther Kimball presented the Library with a subscription to the magazine, N. H. Profiles, and Mrs. Florence Robbins Clarke gave many old Town Reports in memory of her father, George Robbins, Memorial Books were also given by the Greenville Women's Club and friends in memory of Mrs. Adelaide Parker and Mrs. Jeanne Poirier.

On December 15 the Librarian met with Mrs. Marjorie Hopkins, Public Library Consultant, of the State Library for an afternoon of exchange of ideas and the understanding that the State Library is always ready and willing to give any assistance needed.

The Bookmobile has made its usual visits to the Library and it was with regret that we learned the Bookmobile Librarian, Mr. Charles Mauru, was leaving to take a position as Librarian at Plymouth Teacher's College. We are looking forward to a pleasant association with the new Bookmobile Librarian. This year we have borrowed an average of 150 books each trip. As usual we have filled many requests for "technical", "How-to-do-it" and non-fiction books, through the State Library extension service.

The trustees and the Librarian met with a representative of the Collier Corp. and as a result of this meeting purchased a 20 volume set of the 1960 edition of Collier's Encyclopedia, and a book-case for the set. This encyclopedia fills a need for a set on the Junior and Senior High School levels, filling the gap between Jr. Britannica and the Encyclopedia Britannica which we owned. Also bringing our reference material up to date, "The Atlantic Monthly," has been added to our list of magazines.

December 29 the Library sponsored a "film showing" for the children who participated in the Summer Reading Contest and the Story Hour. The films are loaned to us by the State Library at no cost except for the return mailing fee. We are grateful to the Public School for the use of their projector and to the Federated Church for the

loan of a screen.

About 30 youngsters, in spite of a snowy night, enjoyed the films, "The Legend of the Christmas Deer," "A Trip to the Moon," "In Paris Parks," and "The Magic Fiddle." It is the hope of the Librarian to make this a regular service of the Library and in the Spring we will have a "movie" for all the school children.

In 1961 the Library will again participate in National Library Week with Libraries all over the United States. The date will be April 16-22. Visit your Library during this week and make it a habit in the New Year.

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

The 1960 Budget Committee recommended that the Town pay the expenses of lighting and janitor service for the library in lieu of an increased appropriation. The trustees were also advised to use the balance on hand of \$263.89 for the purchase of a set of reference material. Collier's Encyclopedia in twenty volumes and a bookcase were chosen at a cost of \$216.60, a special educational discount price. Some science material has also been purchased.

The need for a substitute librarian is still acute. No money is available to pay a person while learning and no interested townspeople have volunteered as a civic duty. The trustees appreciate Mr. Russell Kimball's service all year long and especially while Mrs. Kimball was ill—without his assistance, the library would have been closed. It is the feeling of the trustees that we have in Mrs. Kimball, the finest type of librarian, always familiar with her resources in our library and always cheerful about obtaining books elsewhere when the need is made known.

Formation of a civic group known as "Friends of the Library" would certainly be a great asset in view of the limited funds available to operate our library. Many towns throughout the state are organizing such groups which help to stimulate interest in the libraries and sponsor fund raising programs. The trustees urge the townspeople to visit our library to see for themselves what it offers.

In 1932 Mr. Eugene H. Coffin was elected to serve as a library trustee and he also served as chairman of the board for a number of years. Following the death of Mr. J. C. Taft, he was made treasurer in 1947 and continues in that capacity, taking over the duties during the months he is in Greenville. His record of interest in serving the community is an outstanding one and we honor him for continuing in office.

- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$22,600.00 for the tuition of High School children of Greenville attending Appleton Academy in lieu of \$24,300.00 currently stated in the School Board's Budget for this purpose, or take any action relating thereto.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenville, I respectfully submit my fourth annual report as your Super-intendent of Schools.

STAFF AND INSTRUCTION

The Greenville school opened this past fall with but a single change in staff. Mr. Lawson Hatfield, of Scarborough, Maine, was hired to teach in grades seven and eight, replacing Miss Joanne O'Sullivan. Mr. Hatfield is a graduate of Gorham State Teachers' College in Maine, with two years of teaching experience in the elementary schools in Scarborough. Fortunately, other teachers of the staff continued in the positions which they held during the previous year. Miss Elsie Wheeler continues as Music Supervisor, Charles Roots as Custodian, and Mrs. Laila Luhtala as School Nurse, and Dr. Robert Wellwood as School Health Officer.

There is no question but that the continuing of the major part of the school staff has greatly strengthened the academic program being offered to the children of the community. At the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grade levels, Mr. Manley and Mr. Hatfield are teaching in special areas of their particular interests, Mr. Manley in Social Studies and Mr. Hatfield in Language Arts and Science.

You will be pleased to know that a careful analysis of the annual achievement test results shows that the Greenville children are making excellent academic progress when compared with children throughout the country. On the average, more than a year of academic growth took place during the past year. The average grade achieve-ment level of children in some cases is six to eight months above the national average. In addition, the analysis shows that achievement at most grade levels is beyond that which could be expected from intelligence test scores. A comparison with similar results tabulated in 1955 shows that today 14% more children are achieving above the normal for them than was the case in 1955. These results show, without any doubt, that real academic progress is being made by the children at the school. It is felt that if the present staff could be maintained for at least another year or two, even more remarkable achievement gains could be established for Greenville children. A good part of the progress being made academically can also be accounted for by the able leadership shown by the school Principal, Mr. Manley.

At this writing, television programs are a regular part

of class instruction and the offerings will be expanded as additional programs are presented. There is no doubt that children have benefited from these offerings.

A day of outdoor education was provided for the upper rooms during the past fall. This was accomplished through cooperation with Mr. Waldo Stone, the Director of Camp Union in Greenfield. The children and teachers reacted enthusiastically to this day of outdoor experience. Outdoor instruction, when followed up in various and sundry classroom activities, has been found to greatly stimulate the interest of children in the out-of-doors and also in all academic areas.

Use of the Science Research Associates Elementary Reading Laboratory is doing much to improve the individual reading ability of children in grades four through eight. This individualized program puts children under pressure to read rapidly and to also read with full comprehension. The program is set up so that each child competes with himself and tries during each practice period to do better than he has done in his previous reading experience. All children in the upper rooms are reading on an individual basis at levels they find to be most suitable

to their individual skills and abilities.

The problem of finding and holding good teachers in Greenville, and in the Supervisory Union, is an ever present one. This year, the Board has been exceedingly fortunate in the replacement found. Mr. Hatfield was hired as a result of advertising which was placed in the middle of April. All citizens should be aware, however, that a final selection was made only after a great deal of effort and energy was expended in finding and interviewing candidates well qualified to meet Greenville's needs. Greenville is always going to be on the fringe of having difficuties in finding and holding teachers because of the smallness of the school and the multiple-graded teaching assignments that are necessary. It is felt that the only real solution lies in the development of a school unit large enough to provide single grade classes. Only then will a real, stable, steady educational system be developed. Until that time, it is fair to expect that the Greenville school might well have ups and down, depending upon the teaching staff it is able to interest and hold. This, of course, is because the real key to the success of any school is directly dependent upon the quality, interest, conscientiousness and vigor of the individual teacher.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS

Generally the plant is being properly maintained. The budget for the coming school year calls for the painting of an additional room and the installation of curtains within another room. In order to better utilize the space where the Principal's office has been, some partitions are going to be removed. This will result in a more efficient and businesslike arrangement for this area.

SPECIAL ARTICLES

Article 9 is similar to articles that have been submitted in previous Warrants offering the citizens of the community an opportunity to accept a flat fee for sending high school children to Appleton Academy. The flat fee offering at Appleton Academy calls for \$22,620.00, arrived at by multiplying the per pupil cost of \$435.00 by the fifty-two children which the Academy expects will be attending from Greenville on a full time basis. The amount the School Board has budgeted for Academy tuitions, \$24,300.-00, has been arrived at by:

(1) Using the latest estimated enrollment figure for 1961-62-60;

(2) Multiplying by cost per pupil \$435.00; and
(3) Reducing this amount by 7% or \$1,800.00 (one-half the average drop-out rate for Greenville of 14%).

This drop-out procedure has not been followed in the past. Previously, the Board felt that money should be provided for all of the children who it seems would attend the Academy. However, during this present year, a rather high drop-out has taken place and this is the reason for there being such a large balance estimated on hand June 30, 1961, namely \$4,500.00. The Board, therefore, has made this adjustment for drop-outs this year, feeling that it is not quite right to request money which will probably not be necessary for the operation of the schools. This should be well understood, however, by the citizens because it is quite possible that the drop-out factor for the coming year will not match the average of the previous years and require an additional expenditure for tuitions. History indicates, however, that the Board is following a course of action which is in the best interests of all the citizens of Greenville.

FINANCE

The School Board's total budget comes to \$59,943.26 which is an increase of \$1,879.35 over the budget for the present school year. Due to a considerable increase in income, mainly \$3,658.93 over that which was estimated for the present school year, the school assessment is \$1,915.88 less than the Tax Commission's figure. There are only two increases of a considerable amount in the proposed budget as compared with the present budget. In Item 6, Teachers' Salaries, an increase of \$1,400.00 is shown. This does not indicate the real increase in teachers' salaries being budgeted because teachers were not hired during this present school year at the amount budgeted but some \$500.00 above that amount. In Item 18a, an apparent increase of \$165.00 is shown. However, this is brought about merely by a change in accounting which has been requested by the State Department of Education. In Item J in the budget, an item of a like amount will be found under income anticipated from School Milk Reimbursement. This makes the net cost of the milk program the same as that of the past.

CONCLUSION

I wish to express to the teachers of the school my personal appreciation for the diligence and devotion they have shown in their work with the children of Greenville. This conscientious application to their responsibilities has certainly greatly eased my task in fulfilling my obligation to Greenville children. The Greenville School Board has always in the past had the best interests of the children and teachers of the school in mind and have constantly expended many hours in attending to these needs. With such interest, cooperation and understanding, it is comparatively easy to understand why an excellent program of instruction is being provided in spite of the difficulties that are usually associated with the operation of a small community school.
