# TOWN WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Community Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Bring in your Ballots for:

Town Clerk for one year, one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer for one year, Tax Collector for one year, Highway Agent for one year, one Water Commissioner for three years, one Water Commissioner for two years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, two Auditors for one year and three Fire Wards for one year.

And at eight of the clock in the afternoon of Wednesday, March 10th at the Town Hall Auditorium to act upon the following subjects:

#### Article 1

To choose all necessary officers not chosen by the Australian ballot.

#### Article 2

To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

#### Article 3

To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

#### Article 4

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any action thereon.

#### Article 5

To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and raise and appropriate a sum of money to cover the expense of such an audit.

#### Article 6

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$252.42 (six cents per \$1,000 of the Town's equalized valuation) to the Monadnock Region Association, an agency to advertise, promote and preserve the natural advantages and resources of the town, in cooperation with the other 37 towns of the Monadnock Region.

#### Article 7

To see if the Town will vote to have a Town Budget Committee appointed by the Moderator, or take any other action.

#### Article 8

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to install two toilets in separate cells in the town jail, or take any other action thereon.

#### Article 9

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to install a street light on Temple Road between the residences of Yvon Leger and Armand Morneau, or take any action thereon. (By Petition)

#### Article 10

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the three Fire Wards to advertise for bids to paint the exterior of the Fire House, raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$750.00, or take any action thereon.

#### Article 11

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract with Mutual of Omaha, for insurance for volunteer firemen, and raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$300.00, or take any other action thereon.

#### Article 12

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and three Fire Wards to purchase for the Fire Department a front end pump for the forestry tanker, raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$750.00, or take any other action thereon.

#### Article 13

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and three Fire Wards to purchase a portable generator, and raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$390.00, or take any other action thereon.

#### Article 14

To see if the Town will vote to accept a tract of land situated between Mill Street and the Mill Yard Fence, bounded by properties of Charles Proulx and others on one side and the east bank of the Souhegan River on the other side, as described in a certain deed to be transferred to the Town of Greenville by the Greenville Real Estate Company, or take any action thereon.

#### Article 15

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$3000.00 to build a salt and tool shed for the Highway Department, or take any action thereon.

#### Article 16

To see what action the Town will take to extend and improve its water supply and distribution system, including without limitation:

(a) Authorizing the execution and delivery of a contract between the Town and the New Hampshire Water Resources Board under and pursuant to RSA Chapter 481, as amended (including any amendment passed by the current session of the State Legislature), and under any other enabling authority under which contract said Board will construct dams and a reservoir and will provide a supply of water for the inhabitants of the Town for a term of up to fifty years.

- (b) Amending, rescinding, in whole or in part, or supplementing votes adopted by the Town relating to its water supply system, including votes under Article 8 of the Warrant for the 1915 Annual Town Meeting, under Article 16 of the Warrant for the 1962 Annual Town Meeting, Articles 2 and 3 of the Warrant for the October 1962 Special Town Meeting; and under Articles 13 and 14 of the Warrant for the 1963 Annual Town Meeting.
- (c) Appropriating any funds required to pay for the Town's obligation under the said contract and determining how any such appropriation or fund shall be raised.
- (d) Authorizing any officer or officers of the Town or appointing any committee or committees to act in the name of and on behalf of the Town in connection with the foregoing matters, or any of them, and, in the case of any committee or committees, to define the authority thereof, and to take any and all action necessary, incidental or related to the foregoing matters or any of them.

### BUDGET COMMITTEE REPORT

During January and February the Budget Committee met with the various Town department heads to discuss their budgets for this year. The amounts as printed in the budget for 1965 expenditures have been recommended and approved by the committee.

Except for the School and Water Department budgets, we found no significant changes from last year's departmental requests. The School Board's budget for 1965-66 shows an increase of approximately \$15,000 over the previous year's amount caused mainly by the increase in Appleton Academy's tuition charges. This we felt cannot now be controlled so the budget was accepted. The Water Department budget shows an approximate \$12,000 increase over the previous year's budget. This is attributed in part to the added expenses incurred in hauling water and to expenses incurred in the movement toward the proposed reservoir in Temple.

The following recommendations were made regarding the operation of the Water Department:

- To have a survey made and printed with a plan showing the location of mains, valves, meters, and house entrances, an extra copy of which to be retained in the Selectmen's files as insurance that such a record will be available in the future.
- To purchase and install a master meter at the pumping station in order to determine the amount of water being pumped into the system, thus affording a basis from which to determine water loss.
- 3. To charge for all water used including the School and the Town Hall, thus relieving the Water Department from the obligation of subsidizing other Town departments.

The Committee members express their thanks for the cooperation and consideration given them by the Department heads.

## SYNOPSIS OF 1964 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING March 10, 1964

Number of Ballots Cast - 537

The meeting was called to order by the moderator, Charles E. Sawyer, at 9:50 A. M., and after the reading of the Warrant, the polls were opened for voting by Australian ballot. At 10:15 A. M., it was voted to close the polls at 6:30 P. M.

On March 11, 1964, the meeting was called to order by the moderator at 8:00 P. M. and the articles in the Warrant were disposed of as follows:

Article 1: For Town Officers chosen, see pages 3, 4 and 5 of this report.

Article 2: See Selectmen's report for appropriations made.

Article 3: Voted to accept reports as printed in the Town Report.

Article 4: Voted to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5: Voted not to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, State Tax Commission.

Article 6: Alexander M. Taft, having a plurality of votes given in, was declared elected Delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

Article 7: Voted to have sweepstakes tickets sold in this town.

Article 8: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$252.42 to the Monadnock Region Association.

Article 9: Voted to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$8,000.00 for Class V roads, as outlined in the Warrant.

Article 10: Voted to maintain the Municipal Court as noted in the Warrant.

Article 11: Voted to have a Town Budget Committee of nine appointed by the moderator. The following persons were named to the committee: Florence Cook, J. W. Buttrick, Jr., John Stencavage, Paul Vaillancourt, Ernest Rousseau, Robert Wirtanen, Harold Martin, Jr., Loretta Desrosiers, and Philip Alix.

Paul Vaillancourt, Ernest Rousseau and Robert Wirtanen later resigned from the committee and were replaced by: Roland Thibault, Raymond Vaillancourt, and Virgil Rassier.

Article 12: Voted to pass over the petition to have a light

installed on a pole located midway between Gauvin's Garage and the corner of Temple Street and Dunster Avenue.

Article 13: Voted to convert the Community Hall into a Municipal Court Room and Police Headquarters, this action taken after assurance from Judge Taft that the hall would be available for community activities as in the past.

Article 14: Voted to raise and appropriate \$500 to paint and finish the floors in the Community Hall.

Article 15: Voted to pass over the petition to authorize the Selectmen to appoint the First Fireward to act as Chief, said Chief to appoint the second Fireward as Assistant Chief, and the members of the Fire Company to choose the third Fireward.

Article 16: Voted to raise and appropriate \$300 to install a Base Station at the Fire House.

Article 17: Voted to raise and appropriate \$300 to purchase an Air Pac for the Fire Department.

Article 18: Voted not to accept the 1927 Seagrave Fire Truck.

Article 19: Voted to approve the action of the Greenville Fire Department in joining Greenville to the Souhegan Valley Mutual Aid System.

Article 20: Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,000 for the purpose of installing a hydrant on Adams Street near the ball park, this hydrant to be used for fire protection purposes and for flooding the skating rink.

Article 21: Voted to withdraw \$506 from the Myrtle M. Marsh Fund for the Parks and Playgrounds.

Article 22: Voted to pass over the petition to appropriate the sum of \$500 to install a water line from the main hydrant line on River Street to the playground, for the purpose of flooding the skating rink.

Article 23: Voted to give the Highway Department the use of the last two west stalls of the Fire House.

Article 24: Voted to pass over the petition to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a piece of land and erect a building thereon for the use of the Highway Department.

Article 25: Voted to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$1,700 for painting the exterior of the Town Hall.

Article 26: Voted not to rescind the action taken at the

second recessed meeting of the 1963 Annual Meeting, to obtain Site 12-A, so-called, in Temple.

Article 27: No action was taken on the petition to see what percentage of the cost of amortizing the cost of Site 12-A, so-called, will be charged to the general assessment each year.

Voted to adjourn at 10:35 P. M.

## SPECIAL TOWN MEETING November 24, 1964

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 P. M. by the moderator, Charles E. Sawyer, who read the court permission for the special Town Meeting and the Warrant. The following action was taken on the articles of the Warrant.

Article 1: Voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$2,000 for the Greenville Water Commissioners to defray the expense of transportation of water during the existing emergency, said loan to be repaid by the said Greenville Water Commissioners at the rate of \$1,000 per year for the next two years, plus interest.

Article 2: Mr. Sawyer turned the moderator's chair over to J. W. Buttrick, Jr.

Voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum of money not exceeding \$3,500 for the purpose of engaging a bond counsel, in order that the Town may proceed with the proposed new water system, said loan to be repaid by the Greenville Water Commissioners at the rate of \$1,500 per year for the next two years and \$500 for the third year, plus interest.

Voted to adjourn at 8:50 P. M.

#### REPORT OF THE WATER COMMISSION

This report is written by the chairman of the water commission, but I am sure that the other two members have so much confidence in me that they will readily agree that I have reported the events of the past ten and one-half months correctly.

The year 1964 has been a challenging one, full of trials and tribulations, failures, successes, you name it and we have experienced it.

I do not subscribe to the doctrine that the public, who pays the bill, has no right to know what goes on in their community, so instead of just giving plain figures for you to digest, I am going to give this report in chronology form and hope that it is complete and meets with your approval.

I was elected to the water commission last March, on a platform which stated that I was opposed to going to Temple for the town water supply because of the cost, feeling that a vast majority of Greenville citizens could not afford it.

Being moderator and also a candidate, I designated one of the selectmen and the assistant moderator to count the town ballots. When the tally was announced I had won by one vote. In the subsequent recount I gained fourteen votes and was declared elected by fifteen votes.

Things immediately commenced to happen. Over four hundred dollars had been spent by the then town house janitor to change the piping in the basement of the town building. When I asked him what it was all about and where he was going with the pipe, he told me that it was none of my business. I then consulted with the board of selectmen, who said that they knew nothing about the matter. Neither would any of the previous water commission admit that they had ordered the work done. Then with the approval of the other two members of the commission I ordered the work stopped and refused to pay two bills, that had been submitted for payment, in the amount of approximately \$150.00

In April I went to Concord to see what preparations should be made in case the water supply got low in the coming summer. I was told that all we could do was to haul water by tank truck.

The water gave out May first, much sooner than anyone anticipated. We commenced hauling water then and spent for this purpose during the rest of the year, nearly \$5,000.00.

Mr. Brainerd Rogers, of Pleasant Street, wanted to see if he could not help the town solve the shortage and went with me to Fitchburg, Leominster and Lunenburg, where we learned that if the selectmen would declare an emergency that we could get pipe and pumps from the civil defense. The selectmen refused to do this. Then it suggested that we lay a four-inch main on top of the ground which would have given us all the water we needed until frost time. We had no money to do this and again we were turned down by those who could help us. The water in the reservoir is checked almost daily and only once have we been without water since the shortage.

Subsequently there was a meeting of the selectmen, the water commissioners and members of the N. H. Water Resources Board. It was brought out at that meeting that the selectmen and water commissioners would have to approve a contract to be submitted in the future.

Mr. Alton stated that he would not sign and I stated that if I signed that it would be with reservations. When I gave some of my reservations, it drew the ire of one of the selectmen and the meeting adjourned. Mr. Doucet was not at this meeting.

The three commissioners then held a meeting of their own and Mr. Alton and Mr. Doucet voted not to sign the contract. That being a majority of the board, I did not have to vote and I then notified the selectmen and the water resources board of our action.

Following this it was thought best to have a public meeting where the commissioners could state their views. One was held and it proved to be such a hot meeting that both Mr. Alton and Mr. Doucet resigned. I was then told that I had no authority to appoint the new members, so I consulted Leonard & Leonard, attorneys, for legal advice. They told me that in their opinion, I being the surviving member of the board, had all the authority to appoint new members. I immediately appointed Chief of Police Robert L. Pelletier as the second member and he and I appointed Gerard Boisse as the third member.

We then held a referendum to see if we could learn definitely what the townspeople wanted to do. We used the checklist and the records show that 340 people voted although it was a dismal day. The result was that 175 people indicated that they wanted

to go to Temple, while 165 did not so declare themselves as wanting to go there.

Following this meeting we met with the Governor and Council in Concord, who after several weeks, approved the Temple project.

Chairman Walter White then met with the selectmen and water commissioners and told us that the Water Resources Board had no money and that the town would have to raise approximately \$524,000.00 before work on the project could begin. To get this kind of money would necessitate selling bonds. Mr. White suggested that he engage bond counsel and that the town raise \$3,500.00 to pay for same and incidental expenses. The town voted to do this at a special meeting in November. The check for \$3,500.00 was turned over to the treasurer of the water commission in January and immediately forwarded to Mr. White. He acknowledged receipt of the check and wrote me that he would keep me informed. There the matter rests as of February 9th.

The commission treasury being empty we had no alternative but to raise the water rates, which we did. They are probably high, and when we get both feet on the ground, so to speak, it will be necessary to engage a rate expert to fix prices. Only one or two have complained regarding the price of water, knowing that we have to haul it and that that costs money.

Then came time to settle the year's business and have the books audited. I let the town auditors have the books before they were actually ready to be audited and they came up with a figure that said I had \$700.00 more cash than I should have had. I knew that I had been a good collector, but not at that rate, so engaged an auditor of my own. He came up with a figure whereby I owed the water commission \$11.55. Ordinarily it would not be necessary to tell the public all this, but I don't believe in hiding things that the public is entitled to know.

In December Commissioner Pelletier obtained the use of a Civil Defense tank truck, which was put into service before being thoroughly cleaned, with the result that for a few days our water had a kerosene flavor.

The commission feels that there is water enough at Vaillancourt's well to supply all that we can haul by truck tank, and if the present members are re-elected in March or whoever is elected, I shall recommend that we take off all restrictions this summer. If there is not enough water, we will then revert to the limited use of water as we have done in the past.

One other thing that I would like to call your attention to is that our report is for eleven and one-half months. The previous commission kept their 1963 report open until January 15 of 1964, which tends to make their report look better and ours worse. My auditor discovered this and wonders why the town auditors permitted this to be done.

We appreciate the fact that people have been so tolerant. The water question is the most difficult problem we have in Greenville.

The city of Nashua is going to take water from the Souhegan river, why cannot the town of Greenville?

So many people have asked the members of the water commission how much has Greenville spent looking for water over the past twenty years and as near as I can figure it out from vouchers and town reports, we have spent over \$70,000.00.

We have also been asked how much did the water commissioners spend driving wells on Vaillancourt's land and for testing, and in a letter received from the Chapman Co., of West Boylston, Mass., the amount spent is \$4,366.00, which does not include material left in the ground. We understand that Mr. Vaillancourt has purchased three pipes that were left by the Chapman Co. The water commissioners in 1964 paid the Chapman Co. on this account \$1,000.00 and there is a balance of approximately \$400.00 plus interest still due.

Some people have also wondered why the rates are so high and so we give the amount of the water bills sent out as of January first, at the new 15c rate. Total amount of bills sent out is \$8,462.50, but a rebate of some kind is due the Rowse Co., whose bill at 15 cents amounted to \$819.00 for three months.

The water commission is contacting other water departments to see where they make their breaks in price. Nearly all we have been in contact with state that it must cost Greenville at the present time approximately ten cents per cubic foot to deliver water to our customers.

How long we will have to continue to haul water is anyone's guess, but the recent thaw helped and for three days of the week of February 7 the reservoir was filled to its limit.

I trust that I have given the people of Greenville the information that they have been asking for.

# REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964

as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy — both industrial and recreational — is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area — 4,350,000 acres — is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

- 1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.
- 2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.
- 3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out. A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fire cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire record in 1965.

#### REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

#### To the Trustees for the Year Ending December 31, 1964

Once again it is time to evaluate the past year. The Library has seen an increase in patronage and circulation. The total number of visitors during the year was 8,877 and 11,202 books and magazines were loaned. About 230 more adults than last year have used the Library facilities for study and pleasure. Forty-three books and periodicals were borrowed from the State Library for our patrons. These books covered various fields in the Sciences and the Arts.

The Bookmobile made four visits during the year, with an average of 204 books left at each visit. We were sorry to lose our Bookmobile Librarian, Miss Alice Carter, who resigned in June, due to ill health. In December, Miss Elizabeth Anne Emerson was sent as our new Bookmobile Librarian. We are now under the Exeter Extension Service, rather than Keene, but we will continue to receive the same excellent service we've had in the past.

After six years of service as a Library trustee, Mrs. J. W. Buttrick did not run for re-election, and Mrs. Howard Greene was elected trustee. Both Mrs. Buttrick and Mrs. Greene have been very interested in the Library and have been most helpful to the Librarian in many ways.

At the State level, Mrs. Mildred McKay, State Librarian, retired after twenty years of devoted service to the libraries of the State. Mr. and Mrs. Russell Kimball and Mrs. J. W. Buttrick attended the party held in Mrs. McKay's honor at the N. H. Highway Motel on February 8, 1964.

Mr. Emil W. Allen, Jr., assistant State Librarian, was elected to succeed Mrs. McKay as State Librarian, and Miss Elizabeth Ann Kingseed began her duties as Assistant State Librarian on September 8, 1964.

On May 16, 1964, Mr. and Mrs. Kimball and Mrs. Howard Greene attended a Library Meeting in Bedford. There was a panel discussion on the new statewide Library Development System, and Robert Taft, trustee, acted as Moderator for the discussion.

On May 14, 1964, Mrs. Greene and Mrs. Kimball attended the annual meeting of the N. H. Library Association at St. Paul's School in Concord. The morning session was devoted to business and the election of officers, plus two very interesting lectures. In the afternoon, informative lectures were offered on many different phases of library work. In the evening, following a banquet, we were entertained by Louis Untermeyer, who paid tribute to Robert Frost and gave readings of some of Frost's poems.

In October, the Librarian and Mrs. Greene went to a Workshop on Book Selection. This meeting was held at the State House and proved to be not only very interesting but also very worthwhile.

During National Library Week in April, the Chamberlin Free Library held an open House on Tuesday, April 14. The "Friends of the Library" served as hostesses and furnished refreshments. There were 75 persons attending, 40 adults and 35 young people. A book-cover contest was held for the pupils of the Sacred Heart School, and the public school children wrote essays on the subject, "Why I Like to Read." Prizes were awarded by the "Friends of the Library." The youngest users of the Library, Ronald Spinney and John Tallarico, were each presented a book and a rosebud by the Librarian. Mr. Gerald Miller, Librarian at Appleton Academy and a professor at Franklin Pierce College in Rindge, was the guest speaker.

The Third Annual Pops Concert, sponsored by the "Friends of the Library," held on April 17, 1964, climaxed the National Library Week celebration. It was a most successful affair and the "Friends of the Library" gave \$275.00 to the Library trustees. This money was used to buy biographies for young people and to purchase plastic letters for making signs.

Twelve story hours were held during the year for children six to nine years of age. At the end of the summer a party was given, to all the children attending, at the Library, by the Librarian and the Assistant Librarian. A Reading Contest was held during July and August, for the older children, ending with a cook-out at the home of the Librarian. All who had fulfilled the contest requirements were eligible to attend, and 22 youngsters had fun and all they could eat! Mr. Kimball and Mrs. Violet Buttrick, Assistant Librarian, gave much help towards the success of the party.

New books have been given to the Library by Mr. Wilber Cate, Michele Gebler, Mrs. Leon Russell, Mrs. Russell Kimball, Richard Desrosiers, Mrs. Felix Beausoleil, Mrs. Maurice Caouette and Mrs. Cameron Burnap. We are always grateful for gifts of books.

The American Legion Auxiliary gave the Library ten books. These books were historical novels or factual books on America. Book-plates were given by the Auxiliary for each book, and they have been a welcome addition to our American History section.

Miss Esther Kimball has continued her gift subscription to the N. H. Profile Magazine and the National Geographic. The American Legion and the Greenville Women's Club give a subscription to the American Legion Magazine and the N. H. Clubwoman. The Girl Scout Council gives two subscriptions to the American Girl. Look, and U. S. News and World Report are donated by Miss Elsie Wheeler and Mr. J. W. Buttrick. A subscription to Nation's Business is also given by Mr. Buttrick. One year of Holiday was given by Mrs. Pearl Foster, and copies of Red Book and Horticulture Magazine were given by Miss Nina Doonan.

The "Saturday Review" was added to our list of magazines this year, and we hope to add a subscription to the Scientific American in the near future, as we lack any type of Science magazine.

"Books in Print," "The Publisher's Trade List Annual" and the "Subject Guide to Books in Print" were added to our Reference Department. We wish to thank the Mason Village Savings Bank for making "N. H. Register" available to us.

We appreciate the gift of book-marks from Mr. T. A. Eaton. They are used by the children, and thus dog-eared pages are prevented.

A new filing cabinet and stand was purchased for the Library

this year. The junior catalog file cards are now in the new cabinet, making it easier for the young people to find the desired books, and also giving us much needed room in the old file.

The number of volumes in the Library on December 31, 1963, was 7,942. During the year, 255 adult books and 162 children's books have been added, making the total volumes to date 8,359.

The Librarian wishes to thank all who have helped make the Library a useful and vital part of the community. She especially thanks her assistant, Mrs. Violet Buttrick, for her willing and ready help, and her husband, Mr. Kimball, who is always on the job as an unofficial assistant.

"Reading is the Key" was the motto for National Library Week. It is the key to so many things — study, pleasure, success. Make use of this key — it is available to all who can and will read.

# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE CHAMBERLIN FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Trustees of the Chamberlin Free Public Library are asking for an additional \$300 in the Library budget for 1965, for a total appropriation of \$1900. In 1964, \$732.65 was budgeted for new books, \$1067.03 was actually spent for new books, the difference being made up by gifts of money and books.

The cost of books has increased about 25 per cent in the last ten years, so in order to continue our modest book buying program, we must ask for additional funds. There is never enough money to buy all the books which the Library needs, so the book buyer must use discrimination and judgment, selecting those books which are most urgently needed and which will be most widely read.

There are many more young people than adults who use the Greenville Library. Out of the 8,877 patrons who used the Library last year, approximately 7,000 were children. The encyclopedias, almanacs, and other types of reference books are used extensively by these young people in their search for knowledge. Science and history books, and current and back issues of periodicals are also in great demand as subject aids.

This type of use of the Library requires a great deal in time, energy and knowledge from the Librarian. Mrs. Kimball devotes a lot of her time to helping students locate the materials they need for their research work. Libraries in all localities are becoming more and more important adjuncts to the educational system.

The Trustees wish to thank Mrs. Kimball for her untiring efforts in behalf of the Chamberlin Free Public Library, and we are also most grateful for the time and work Mr. Kimball donates to it. Mrs. Violet Buttrick has proved to be a welcome addition to the Library staff.

#### SCHOOL WARRANT

#### The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Greenville qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the eighth day of March, 1965, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$46,495. to enter into a one year exclusive contract with Appleton Academy, for the tuition of all high school children of Greenville in lieu of \$49,280. currently stated in the School Board's Budget for this purpose, or take any action relating thereto.
- 10. To see if the District will vote to form an AREA School Planning Committee as prescribed in R.S.A.195-A:3, and to elect the members thereof, or determine that they shall be appointed by the Moderator, or take any action relating thereto.
- 11. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate \$300 to paint a classroom at the school, or take any action relating thereto.
- 12. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate \$200 to renovate landing entrances to the school, or take any action relating thereto.
- 13. If Article 9 is not passed, to see if the District will vote to pay excess tuition costs above those stated in RSA 194:27 for any child attending such high schools, or take any action relating thereto.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the school board and citizens of Greenville, I respectfully submit my seventh annual report as your superintendent of schools.

#### Staff and Instruction

The Greenville Public School opened this fall with just one change in staff. Mr. William Manley who had been the principal of the school for the past six years accepted a position as principal of the Temple Street School in Nashua. Mr. Manley's leaving is regrettable since he did much in his tenure of office to improve the image of the school and establish a close working relationship between the school and the community. The Greenville Board was very fortunate, however, in being able to hire Mr. Richard Metivier of Peterborough as Principal. Mr. Metivier is fairly well known in Greenville and in this supervisory union since he taught for two years in Mason, after graduating from Keene State College and then acted as principal of the Greenfield school in Greenfield.

Since Mr. Metivier has been in the supervisory union for six years, it was possible for him to make adjustment to the Greenville Public School situation and properly continue the program of modern mathematics and the phonetic approach to reading that has been operating within the supervisory union in the past.

Two children from Greenville have been participating in the special class being held for the first time in Wilton. This has been a most satisfactory arrangement for the children involved and also for the regular classroom children. In this special class children are receiving a specialized type of instruction that is best suited to their needs. In the regular classrooms youngsters are receiving a better share of teacher's time since these youngsters, who have had difficulty in learning, have not been slowing up the educational process. For the coming year provision is being made for two additional youngsters to attend special classes. The School Board feels that this would be proper use of sweepstakes money, made available for schools this year.

The School Board is going along with other towns in the area serviced by Appleton Academy in providing money for the hiring of a remedial reading teacher. \$1,300 has been set aside

for this purpose and this amount of money will buy about one day per week of this teacher's time. The remedial reading teacher is being provided for those children who are experiencing particular difficulty in progressing satisfactorily. This kind of help certainly is very much needed in Greenville since many youngsters seem to have a reading difficulty.

Early in the year all school boards of the supervisory union heartily endorsed a program of physical fitness in keeping with the late President Kennedy's recommended program. A workshop was held in Wilton for the information and instruction of all elementary teachers and the program was promptly put into effect. Teachers of the school are devoting daily fifteen minutes to continuous and strenuous exercising by the children and later in the year will administer tests of physical fitness. This exercising and testing program will be continued throughout the remainder of the year and in the years to come. It is hoped that such a program will raise the physical fitness level of each and every individual of the school. In the case of Greenville, this exercising is planned to be done to musical records especially designed for this purpose and combine physical development and rhythms at the same time.

#### **Building and Grounds**

Money is being provided within special articles for the painting of one of the classrooms within the school and to replace deteriorated flooring and posts at the side entrances to the building. The entrances have been a little shaky for several years and it seems wise to strengthen these stairways before a serious accident occurs.

#### Sweepstakes

This year will probably go down in New Hampshire education as the "year of the sweepstakes." This was the first year that funds were made available through this lottery to schools in New Hampshire. The Greenville Public School finally received \$3,681.56 from this source. The best estimation at this time indicates that the Greenville School District will receive \$5,180 during the coming school year. One thing that has concerned the board was how to best use this money and keep within the statutes and intent of the law, namely, to improve education. Some of this money has been already set aside for items reported,

namely, \$1,300 for a remedial reading teacher and \$1,000 for two additional children to attend a special class.

Other items are included within the budget for the purpose of "improving education." \$600 has been included in the 210 series to provide for the services of a part-time Art teacher. The Mason school has had art instruction for two years with very successful results. Art is now a required offering at the secondary level, and it seems only proper that some background should be provided for children at the elementary level so that they can make a sound selection of courses when in high school.

\$400 has been provided in the 500 series under Pupil Transportation for the carrying of children to a special class. No specific amount of money was set aside for this purpose in this present year's budget and some difficulty was experienced in making transportation arrangements because of the lack of funds. This amount seems fair and proper. If children are going to be assigned to a special class it seems morally right that transportation should be provided for them to reach this class.

Under item #1267, an amount of \$135 appears. This money has been budgeted for the purchasing of an overhead projector. An overhead projector makes it possible for the teacher to project onto a screen various kinds of transparencies. This gives the teacher one additional audio-visual device to make classroom instruction interesting and stimulating to children.

The Greenville School Board, feeling that teachers are the most vital ingredient in a good education program, have provided additional monies in the area of Teachers' Salaries. This is the best way in which sweepstakes money could be expended to "improve education." The attracting, hiring and holding of good teachers is the only way that the educational program in Greenville will improve.

#### **Finance**

There are two major areas of increase in the budget other than items already noted. In the 500 series, transportation costs increased by approximately \$1,000. \$400 of this has already been referred to, the additional \$600 is made necessary because of the increased enrollment at Appleton. With an anticipated high school enrollment next year of somewhere in the vicinity of 85 pupils, some rearrangement of buses is going to be necessary, either in hiring an additional bus or in purchasing buses

with a larger capacity. In view of these changes, this increased cost is being anticipated and budgeted for. However, it is important to note the cost per pupil for transportation will not increase. This estimated amount will be included in a three-year contract which means that for the next three-year period this item should not increase.

In the 1477.1 item, Tuitions, one finds the largest increase in the Greenville school budget. As many as 88 youngsters could be attending Appleton Academy next year and on a per/pupil tuition basis a charge of \$560 per pupil would be made. This total \$49,280 plus the \$2,000 budgeted for special class makes a total of \$51,280, almost \$16,000 more than was budgeted for the present year. Under an article in the warrant opportunity is provided for an exclusive contract arrangement for the coming year in which case 85 youngsters will be planned for at a rate of \$547, making a total of \$46,495; approximately \$3,000 less than the above figure. However, voting the exclusive contract would result in an increase of about \$13,000 in this item. This, of course, is the major reason for an increase in the overall Greenville budget.

On the income side of the ledger a balance of about \$1,500 is estimated. \$1,000 of this balance is "excess sweepstakes" money, this is the difference between the amount of sweepstakes money estimated to be received by Greenville by the State Tax Commission and the amount actually received. Since the school board has no special use for this money during the current year, this sweepstakes excess will show up as a balance. This balance, with estimated sweepstakes income and other incidental income, increases the revenue from some \$3,000 this year, to some \$7,500 in 1965-66. This increased income reduces the overall appropriation of \$94,369.95 to \$86,792.77; some \$14,700 more than the school assessment for the present year.

#### **Special Articles**

There are several special articles that appear in the warrant, one which has already been referred to, namely, the voting of an exclusive contract with Appleton Academy. A second article is a request that the district vote to form an AREA School Planning Committee as prescribed under the statutes. The School Board feels that this article should be included in the warrant so that an AREA Planning Committee can be formed and give

Greenville complete freedom to make any arrangement that it might desire for its high school youngsters, either in the form of a Cooperative which is being presently studied, or in the form of an AREA School which might be a possibility for the near future. As previously noted, two articles appear in the warrant to improve the building, one requesting \$300 to paint a classroom and another requesting \$200 to renovate the landing entrances. Another article asks the district to pay tuition costs above the State Average plus a 2% rental fee as prescribed under RSA 194:27 to high schools, if the exclusive contract with Appleton Academy is not approved.

#### Conclusion

The Greenville Public School is making good progress through the conscientious and diligent efforts of its teachers. For a variety of reasons a good number of children have difficulty in making satisfactory progress, a situation that distresses but challenges conscientious teachers. I am proud to have worked closely with such conscientious and dedicated teachers. The Greenville School Board has been extremely helpful, exceptionally cooperative and outstandingly understanding of school problems and has worked diligently to the best of their abilities to provide the type of education needed. With such favorable working partners, board and teachers, the duties as superintendent have been distinctly pleasurable. Many thanks are extended to all those concerned.
