TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Community Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Bring in your ballots for:

Town Clerk for one year, one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer for one year, one Water Commissioner for three years, one Water Commissioner for one year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, two Auditors for one year and one Fire Ward for three years.

And at eight of the clock in the afternoon of the same day, at the Town Hall Auditorium to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1.

To choose all necessary officers not chosen by the Australian Ballot.

Article 2.

To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

Article 3.

To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 4.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes or take any action thereon.

Article 5.

To see if the Town will vote to have a Town Budget Committee of seven (7) to be appointed by the Moderator, or take any action thereon.

Article 6.

To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money, not to exceed fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) from the Myrtle M. Marsh Fund, so-called, for improvement of the Ida Taft Memorial Field.

Article 7.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$800.00) eight hundred dollars for the purpose of buying a new communication radio for the Police Department or take any action relating thereto.

Article 8.

To see if the Town will vote to accept the following parcels of land:

Cross Street — which runs east and west

Adams Avenue — which runs north and south

Bacon Avenue — which runs north and south

Extension of Old Mason Road, so-called, which runs east and
west,

Also necessary drainage rights;

From Honore Rousseau and Marie Anne Rousseau to be used as future public highways in accordance with a plan entitled "Property of Honore and Marie Anne Rousseau" surveyed by William Falconer, yet to be recorded.

Article 9.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed three thousand dollars (\$3000.00) to rough Bacon Avenue and Adams Avenue, so-called, for a town highway, or take any other action thereon.

Article 10.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds or take any other action thereon.

Article 11.

To see if the Town will vote to continue the present policy "No Smoking" and "No Alcoholic Beverages" in the Town Hall Auditorium, or take any action thereon.

Article 12.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the purpose of cutting dangerous and hazardous trees along or beside public highways or take any action thereon.

Article 13.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to purchase an exhaust fan for the use of the Fire Department or take any action thereon.

Article 14

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) to purchase new boots, coats and hats to be used by the Fire Department replacing half of old equipment or take any action thereon.

Article 15.

To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote pertaining to the management of all matters concerning the supplying of water for drinking and domestic purposes for the citizens of the Town of Greenville passed at the Annual Town Meeting held on March 9, 1915, and place the management in the hands of a superintendent, said superintendent and a treasurer to be appointed and supervised by the Selectmen, remuneration for services of said Superintendent and Treasurer to be fixed by the Board of Selectmen and to be paid out of receipts of the water department.

Article 16.

To transact any other business that may properly come before this meeting.

Article 1: For Town Officers chosen, see page 3 of this report.

Article 2: See Selectmen's report for appropriations made.

Article 3: Voted to accept reports as printed in the Town Report.

Article 4: Voted to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5: Voted to have a Town Budget Committee of seven members appointed by the moderator.

Article 6: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 a year for six years for the purpose of replacing the 1939 Chevrolet fire truck.

Article 7: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700 for two asbestos suits for the Fire Department.

Article 8: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to initial a program to map the streets and roads of the Town and to name such streets and roads, and to erect a metal sign on each street and road. Voted to have Alexander M. Taft be chairman of a committee to undertake this project, with co-chairmen Albert Bourke and James S. McCreery. Mr. Taft offered a contribution of \$100 from the Greenville Electric Lighting Company if signs were placed at the intersections of Route 31 with Pleasant Street, Mill Street and Wilton Road.

Article 9: Voted to establish a Town Conservation Commission.

Article 10: Voted to authorize the Selectmen to do whatever may be required for an advance to be made by the United States to the Town of Greenville to aid in preparing report on sewage treatment facilities for the Town.

It was voted to send a telegram of good wishes to Jane Eaton who was representing New Hampshire in the Junior Miss contest in Mobile, Alabama.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:45 p.m.

Water Treatment Plant — Foundation and floors essentially complete with electrical and mechanical installation progressing during the winter months.

Raw Water Intake & Pumping Station — Structure essentially complete with electrical and mechanical installation progressing during the winter months.

Earthen Dams — Seepage cutoff complete under both dams with remaining work scheduled to commence in the spring.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

To the Trustees of the Chamberlin Free Public Library December 31, 1967

This year has brought about a few changes. In June, Mrs. Violet Buttrick, Assistant Librarian, resigned to accept a position as school librarian at Appleton Academy. Miss Lorna Buttrick worked as an aide during part of the summer and continues to help out each Friday afternoon after school. In October, Miss Lise Thibault was engaged as a Library Aide for Tuesday and Friday afternoons, after school.

Due to there not being any assistant, the Library was closed during the Librarian's vacation. It is hoped that next year this closing will not be necessary, as Miss Thibault is being trained to take over the desk duties.

During the year 10,303 patrons used the Library, and 10,967 books and magazines were circulated.

Also during the year 532 new books have been added to the collection. This figure includes 61 books given to the Library by various friends, the American Legion, directly from the publishers and the State Library.

Memorial books have been given in memory of Mrs. Albina Emonds, Raymond Ouellette, Mrs. Fannie Wuth and a Past President of the N.H. Federation of Women's Clubs.

Our reference collection has been augmented by the following books, purchased with the \$100.00 grant from the State of New Hampshire:

Documents of American History — Commanger Flags of the U.S.A. — Eggenberger Flags of the World — Barraclough Art through the Ages — Gardner Spanish-English, English-Spanish Dictionary — Crowell Fun Encyclopedia — Harbin Oxford Dictionary of Quotations International Encyclopedia of Music and Musicians Motor Service's Automotive Engineering Manual U.S. Bureau of the Census, Statistical Abstract of the U.S. Political Atlas and Handbook of the World — Mallory Oxford Bible Atlas

We have been notified that we will receive \$100.00 again

in 1968 for reference books, and we are purchasing the Encycloperia Americana.

New magazines added this year are Look, The Minkus Stamp Collector's Magazine, and The East. We are grateful to all who have given magazines to the Library. Individuals have contributed subscriptions to N.H. Profiles, National Geographic, U.S. News and World Report, The Nation's Business, Newsweek and The American Legion Magazine. All gift books and magazines are deeply appreciated.

The librarian has attended the book selection meetings held in Bedford, Wilton, Amherst, Windham and Raymond. They all proved to be interesting and helpful.

From October 10 through December 12 the librarian and Mrs. Dorothy Russell took a course in Library Techniques. This course was held at Keene State College and was taught by Miss Cynthia Postal of the State Library staff.

In April, the librarian, Mrs. Russell, Mr. Albert Bourke and Mr. John Fortin, our State representative, attended the Legislative luncheon held at the Sheraton Wayfarer as a "kick-off" for National Library Week.

We celebrated National Library Week with an Open House on April 19. A hobby show of local arts and crafts created much interest in the library during the week. Book jackets designed by the school children were on display, and prizes were awarded to the best three in each group. Mr. Philip Heald was guest speaker at the Open House and showed colored slides and gave an informative talk on Conservation. In lieu of a fee Mr. Heald suggested two books, N.H. Nature Notes and the History of N.H. Game and Furbearers, which he thought would be of interest to the Library, with the result that they were purchased by the "Friends of the Library." Delicious refreshments also were served by the Friends to the seventy-five persons attending the Open House.

On April 21, the 7th Annual Pops Concert was again sponsored by the Friends of the Library. It was a huge success, and the Friends gave a check of \$300.00 to the Library for the purchase of books.

In June we welcomed a new bookmobile librarian, Mrs. Judith Kimball. The bookmobile has made its usual visits, and

a total of 754 books was borrowed — an average of 189 books per visit.

To help meet the requests of our patrons, 56 books have been borrowed directly from the State Library.

During June, July and August, story hours were held each Friday afternoon at the Library. An average of 20 six-year-olds and younger were in attendance. A party was held at the Library on the last day of the story hours. Refreshments were furnished by the Friends of the Library.

A nature reading program, for the older children, was conducted during June and July. Twenty-two youngsters completed the reading program and enjoyed an afternoon of games and a cook-out at the home of the Librarian. Miss Lorna Buttrick assisted with the games; the hamburgers and other "eats" were furnished by the Friends of the Library, and Mr. Kimball was the chef!

On October 28 the Friends of the Library held a Harvest Dance. This was a new undertaking, and although attendance was not large, everyone present had a wonderful time. A goodly sum was realized for their treasury, and time will tell if this, too, will become an annual affair.

We wish to salute Dr. James Hitchcock, who has been Chairman of the Friends of the Library and producer of the Pops Concerts! Dr. Hitchcock resigned as Chairman of the Friends of the Library in November. The group will miss his able chairmanship, but he will still be a valuable friend of the Library! We deeply appreciate all that he has done to help the Library become better.

The school children still come to the Library, by classes, on Friday afternoons. Because of the large 1st and 2nd grades the Librarian has opend the Library on Thursday afternoon of alternate weeks from 1 to 4, for the convenience of the 1st grade. Once a month the 1st graders have a story hour. A class of instruction in the use of the Library was given to the 7th and 8th graders. Collections of books have been lent to the Sacred Heart School for a two-month loan period.

The Librarian wishes to express her sincere appreciation to Mrs. Dorothy Russell, who furnished transportation to all the book selection meetings and to the course at Keene, and lends a helping hand whenever possible. Also, thanks are due Russell

Kimball, who helps in any way and "takes over" for the Librarian when she is absent because of illness.

Many more adults used the Library during the past year, so perhaps they did resolve to read a book a week. Keep coming — this is your Library!

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF CHAMBERLIN FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Trustees of the Chamberlin Free Public Library have had a busy year. They have set the date of their meetings for the first Wednesday of the month, meeting quarterly, at the library. These meetings are open to the public.

This year the Trustees voted to do away with the fines on overdue books. It has not seemed to meet its purpose (the prompt return of borrowed books), so it seemed feasible to discontinue the practice, for a while at least. It was voted that a lost or damaged book must be paid for at the list price of the book.

A policy for the library is in the process of being written. This policy is required of all libraries affiliated with the State wide library system and is due to be in effect by July 1, 1968.

Mrs. Dorothy Russell was elected as an alternate to the Advisory Council meetings, since the delegate, Mrs. Robert Taft, could not always attend the meetings.

The Trustees owe a debt of thanks to the American Legion for their gift to the Library of a movie projector and screen. This will prove to be of value to all the young people, as films are available to the Library free of charge from the State Library. A program will be worked out by the Librarian, and films will be shown on a regular schedule.

- 5. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to request the Municipal Accounting Division of the State Tax Commission to audit the accounts of the District as of June 30, 1968.
- 6. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to convey to the Mascenic Regional School District, by Quitclaim Deed, the present Greenville Public School, together with the contents thereof, and all land owned by the District, or take any action relating thereto.
- 7. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate an amount of money not to exceed \$1,000.00 to cover any deficit that has occurred up to the time of the annual school district meeting, or any deficit that might occur between the annual school district meeting and the end of the fiscal year, June 30, 1968; such funds to be expended at the discretion of the School Board, or take any action relating thereto.

- 8. To see if the District will vote to direct the Treasurer to pay over to the Treasurer of the Mascenic Regional School District any cash balance to include any unused portion of money raised under Article 7 above, in her hands or money due the District as of July 1, 1968 or thereafter, less any outstanding bills or debts; any sum so transferred to be used as a credit against the Mascenic Regional School District assessment to be raised by the pre-existing Greenville School District, to defray its share of the cost of operation of the Mascenic Regional School District during the first year of operation.
- 9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and citizens of Greenville, I respectfully submit my final report as the Greenville School District Superintended of Schools. The report of the Greenville School District will not include some of the items usually covered, namely a budget for the coming school year, since this will be taken care of by a Mascenic Regional School District Report which will outline this proposal for Greenville.

Staff and Instruction

Only minor changes in staff were necessary this year, fortunately, and thus the school program with its full complement of regular teachers is carrying out a most satisfactory educational program. With the retirement of Miss Elsie Wheeler, Music Teacher, Mr. Clark Greene of Ashby, Massachusetts, a graduate of the New England Conservatory, was hired to fill this need within our school. Mrs. Edna Matson was hired to teach Art within the school, replacing Mrs. Alice Stearns.

A real problem developed in the Primary Room of the school since far more youngsters were on hand at the beginning of the year in the first grade than had been anticipated. These twentyone youngsters, along with the thirteen second grade children, made an almost impossible load for Mrs. Soule. It was decided that a teacher aide be hired to perform routine responsibilities with these children, allowing Mrs. Soule the opportunity to concentrate on the distinctly educational needs of the children. This arrangement was tried for some period of time and still did not provide adequately for all of the first graders and all of the second graders, so the rooming arrangements of the children within the entire school were changed. This rearrangement left Mrs. Soule with twenty-one first grade children; Mrs. Gray with the second and third grade youngsters and Mr. Britton and Mr. Johnson — fourth and fifth grade youngsters in one room and sixth, seventh and eighth grade youngsters in another room. The services of the aide, Mrs. Dorothy Baker, were continued to be used with the upper five grades, as well as with Mrs. Soule. This arrangement seems to be working out far more satisfactorily.

Since it was found impossible to find a fully qualified reading teacher to work with youngsters of the public school, as well as the parochial school, utilizing TITLE I funds, it was decided to use these funds to defray the costs of Mrs. Baker's services, and arrangements have just been completed to hire the services of another aide, utilizing TITLE I money at the parochial school.

Even though we were very fortunate in Greenville that we did not have to seek out any full-time teachers and were quite successful in finding qualified part-time staff help, citizens of the community should be aware of the fact that the critical shortage of teachers at the elementary level, especially at the primary level, continues. At the beginning of the school year there were many more classrooms in New Hampshire this year, than last, that did not have qualified teachers. In spite of the fact that Greenville is going to be a part of a cooperative which will help to reduce the teacher recruitment problem to some extent, finding teachers to work in small communities in multiple graded classrooms is going to continue to be a very serious problem until the critical shortage is relieved. Perhaps the best course of action should be to make every effort to hold good staff members that are already employed, by providing satisfactory competitive salaries and fringe benefits.

I have every reason to believe that the present attitude of the Mascenic School Board will be to follow this recommendation and help to simplify this very serious and critical problem.

Sacred Heart School

A copy of a letter to the Chairman of the Greenville School Board has just been received from the Pastor of the Sacred Heart Parish of Greenville indicating that their school will be closed as of June 1968. Ordinarily, activities of the Sacred Heart School would not be included in the School District Report; however the impact of the closing of this school on the public I am sure is appreciated by all.

For many years the town of Greenville has been fortunate in having parochial education available for children interested in this type of instructional program. This has not only met special needs of the majority of elementary children of the town, but also has relieved the town of the financial burden of this education. I am sure folks of the town fully appreciate the tax savings that Sacred Heart has made possible over the years. The announced closing changes this favorable financial and educational picture.

The additional anticipated Sacred Heart enrollment, grades

one through four, of about eighty-seven pupils now becomes a town educational responsibility. Naturally, this means more classrooms, more staff, additional text materials and scholar supplies. These costs, when added to those already expected for educating Sacred Heart children in grades five through eight, are going to be noticeably felt by all citizens.

Due to the fact that the added costs will be determined only after the overall Mascenic Budget has been established and prorated back to Greenville, it is quite difficult to present any well supported cost estimate at this time.

The increased and consolidated primary enrollment has definite educational advantages for the children. Single gradedness, and even sections of grades are now possible. In addition, better continuity from primary grades to the Mascenic School will be possible. In the near future it is hoped that citizens will clearly witness a markedly improved educational product, made possible by this change in organization.

Building and Grounds

Everyone thought that the Greenville School was not in very bad condition considering its age, but shortly after school started the heavy rains revealed the fact that the south-side roof was peppered with holes and we had a very serious problem of leakage. Immediate steps were taken to have a roofing job done on this part of the roof even though funds had not been provided for this task. It seems quite probable that the remainder of the roof should also be taken care of within the upcoming budget, since we should expect that the other roof areas are going to leak in the near future if positive action is not taken.

Except for the above problem, the school generally is in pretty good condition, although some painting could profitably be done in the lavatory areas. For several years the Board has considered doing something with the floors of the building. They are still unvarnished and therefore not up to modern standards of sanitation. It makes sense to sand and seal floors of the classrooms on a once-a-year basis so that cleaning could be performed more efficiently, and the general level of floor sanitation of the building could be improved.

Cooperative Plan

After many years of fruitless cooperative planning, studying,

and voting, everyone knows that the Mascenic Regional School District is a reality and will have full educational responsibility for Greenville children as of 1 July 1968. Citizens of Greenville should be thankful that there were interested citizens of the community who were willing to devote their time and energy, not only for this study, but to the several studies that have taken place previously, finally resulting in Mascenic.

No thinking citizen, I am sure, will expect that Mascenic is going to solve all the educational problems of the children of Greenville, but within the cooperative structure which is established by this organization, hopefully, education for children of Greenville will be markedly improved. Certainly the biggest plus factor will be that of providing departmentalized junior high education for children of grades seven and eight, as well as grades five and six. This is a need that has existed for some time and should prove to be extremely beneficial to Greenville children.

Warrant Articles

Warrant Articles are designed to assure a school district organization through the end of June, to oversee the interests of the district during that period of time. In addition, specific provisions are made for handling any deficit or balance that might occur, to transfer all Greenville School District property to the Mascenic Regional School District, and also satisfactorily closing out the financial accounts of the district.

Conclusion

The teachers of the Greenville School are to be complimented for the efforts that they are making in behalf of the children of the community. It was heartwarming to see the way teachers accepted a change in the organizational pattern of the school in consideration of the best interests of the children. This change brought about considerable additional effort on the teachers' part, is still requiring this additional effort. It is nice to know that we have teachers in Greenville who place the needs of the children first, and their own personal interests and desires, second. The efforts of Mr. Caouette, School Custodian, has long complemented the efforts of the instructional staff and has helped to provide a good school program and an atmosphere that is quite acceptable.

It has been a pleasure for me to have worked with the

Greenville School Board during this past year and over the past ten years as your Superintendent of Schools. I have always found the Board to be understanding of serious school problems, sensitive to the responsibilities that they have to the community, and especially alert to the educational needs of children. Close cooperation has always existed between the staff, the School Board, the citizens, and the Superintendent, and has thus resulted in a most satisfactory educational program for the children.

I am sure that continued interest on the part of citizens and parents, working closely with the staff of the Mascenic District, will assure for Greenville an even better educational program than that which has existed in the past, and one of which all may be exceedingly proud.

H. came to Appleton Academy in New Ipswich, N. H. to take X-rays for this area. All that showed a positive reaction and their contacts reported for X-rays. No active cases were found.

Assisted with Measles Clinic. 64 children were immunized. Dental Clinic for public school was held. The Dental work was done in Dr. Roy's Wilton office.

Mrs. Davis, State Dental Hygienist, spoke to all children on dental hygiene and answered their questions.

Nurse's work included:

Heights and weights on all children Routine inspections on hair and hygiene First Aid for cuts, bruises, scratches, etc. Children running a fever were sent home.

Dental Program stressed where carious teeth seem to be the main health problem. Crest toothbrushes and paste were given to the third grade in the public school. A filmstrip was shown to all pupils.

Titmus Vision Test given to all pupils. Anyone showing any defect was referred for further examination.

Pre-school Registration for Public School was held May 8, 1967; 13 children reported.

Sacred Heart Registration had 19 children report for first grade.

Pre-school Immunization Clinics were held at the Legion Hall. Immunization against whooping cough, diphtheria and tetanus, small pox and polio were given. March 10, 45 children were immunized; April 14th, 61 children were immunized, and on May 10th, 62 children were immunized.
